The Ranger National Guard Unit spent last Sunday getting shots and winding up last minute details in preparing for their annual two weeks training at Fort Hood.

As Eastland men will be commanding officer of the Ranger National Guard battery this year at summer camp.

When Service Battery Guardsmen load out for Fort Hood Sunday they will be under command of Lt. Walker B. Ragudale, who in private life is an Eastland second teacher and coach.

There are many other Eastland men in the ranks of the battery, which is a part of the 132 Field Artillery 4th Division, Texas National Guard.

In all there will be 47 Ranger Guardsmen at Fort Hood this year.

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Final Rites Held
Monday For
Warren Cozby

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. Monday for the Rev. Warren Abram Cozby, 81, who died last Tuesday in Safford, Ariz.

The Rev. Cozby moved to Ranger in 1921 and lived here until moving to Arizona in 1942. He was a traveling minister for the Claret Conference of the Methodist Church.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church where he was a member, with the pastor, the Rev. Lively Brown, officiating. Burial was in Evergreen cemetery under direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

The Rev. Cozby was born July 26, 1878 in Wolfe City, Texas, and married the former Miss Mary Frances Atterbury in 1916. She died Dec. 29, 1932.

Survivors include one son, Capt. Warren Cozby in the Air Force at Mountain Home AFB, Idaho; four brothers, John of Hamlin, Earl and Mont, both of Dallas and Elford of Stamford; two sisters, Mrs. Alice Howard of Greenville and Mrs. Lucy White of Casa Grande, Ariz.; and seven grandchildren.

Good Pecan Crop Is Expected In County This Year

Eastland County pecan growers are anticipating a good pecan crop this year, a survey just completed by County Agent J. M. Cooper reveals.

The survey shows that growers overall expect to harvest 50 percent of the potential crop, which would be a big improvement over last year's small harvest.

Some growers, Cooper found, are anticipating a harvest of as high as 75 percent of potential. The lowest estimate was 10 percent.

Last year disease wiped out most of the crop, but Cooper believes that most trees have escaped disease damage this year. "It takes moisture and heat for disease to damage pecans," he said, "and we haven't had the moisture."

The agricultural agent mailed out postcards to county growers and most returned the cards. That way he received a good picture of the county pecan situation.

Cooper also predicts a good peach crop.

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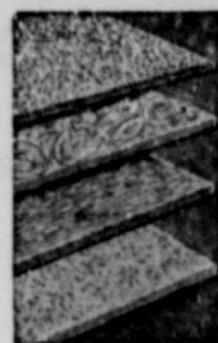
