





However, the heat rom resinous woods produces a ot, quick fire which also con umes the wood and releases the heat quickly. As a result, it is difficult to maintain a uniform

temperature when burning resin-ous woods, because the best is intense at first aand then quickly

The denser hardwoods take longer to ignite and whe nburn-ing, release their heat more slowly than pine. Long experience has taught us to start our fires with p'ne and maintain them with hickery, oak, or similar hardwood
