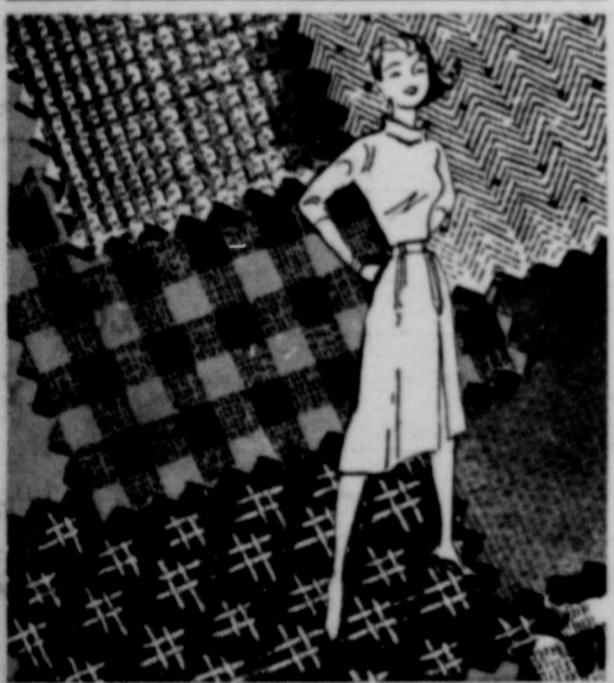

**Farm Bureau  
Members To  
Tour Mexico**

One of the outstanding events in Good Neighbor exchanges between Texas and Mexico is the 11-day tour of Mexican agricultural centers being sponsored July 14-24 by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Heading the tour is J. H. West of Bishop, president of the state farm organization, and Mrs. West. The visit to Mexico was planned as a combination goodwill, pleasure and educational trip.

In his official invitation, Sr. Julian Rodriguez Adame, Minister of Agriculture of Mexico, stated that "it is my sincere hope that as many members of the Texas Farm Bureau as possible may be able to come. We are looking forward to showing our good Texas neighbors what we are doing in the field of agriculture to advance the welfare of our farmers."

Included in the itinerary of the tour will be many points of agricultural interest, such as the highly regarded National School of Agriculture at Chapingo. Sight-seeing excursions will be made in and around Mexico City, including visits to the Floating Gardens of Xochimilco, the picturesque mountainside spa of San Jose Purua, a day at the fabulous Pacific resort of Acapulco, with stopovers in historic towns and cities such as Taxco, Cuernavaca and Morelia.

Joining Sr. Rodriguez in his invitation for the Farm Bureau tour was Prof. Carlos Paxy Fuentes, executive secretary of the National Confederation of Small Landowners of Mexico. Professor Paz was an honored guest at the 1958 Texas Farm Bureau convention in Corpus Christi in 1958.

One of the highlights of the tour will come on July 18, when the visitors will be special guests of Governor Gustavo Bar in Toluca, capital of the State of Mexico. On the way to a special hospitality program in Toluca, the Texans will stop at the Rancho Dona Rosa to inspect the principal crops of potatoes, corn and alfalfa. They will also inspect the Santa Elena Experimental Farm, which specializes

in certified seeds for corn and potatoes.

The July 18 trip will be part of a three-day tour out of Mexico City which, in addition to Toluca, will also take in San Jose Purua, Morelia and Patzcuaro. On July 21, the group will leave Mexico City for a four-day schedule of visits which will include Cuernavaca, Taxco and Acapulco, returning to the capital on July 24 in time to depart for home.

It is anticipated that the Good Neighbor policy of Texas and Mexico will gain materially in this exchange of agricultural viewpoints and personal experience.

Add to sifted dry ingredients, stirring only until combined. Fold in corn flake crumbs. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 20 minutes.

### WORKING WITH WOOD

Wood for Fuel

Almost everyone enjoys the cozy heat of a fireplace in winter and each of us prefers a certain kind of fuelwood for his fire. General preferences of long standing frequently lead to misconceptions regarding wood, such as the notion that oak has a higher fuel value than pine. Such is not the case. In fact, pound for pound, the wood of pine and other similar resinous species will generate more heat than the hardwoods. However, the heat from resinous woods produces a hot, quick fire which also consumes the wood and releases the heat quickly. As a result, it is difficult to maintain a uniform temperature when burning resinous woods, because the heat is intense at first and then quickly cools.

The denser hardwoods take longer to ignite and when burning, release their heat more slowly than pine. Long experience has taught us to start our fires with pine and maintain them with hickory, oak, or similar hardwood species.
