Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 1b, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, giving the Legislature authority to fix maximum rates of interest on loans and leases, license and regulate loan and lease companies, and to provide for a maximum rate of interest and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed ten per centum per annum and ten per centum in contracts where no rate of interest is agreed upon; providing for a right of appeal and trial de novo in any court or regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the secretary, elector, and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary ratification procedure.

BY IT RESOLVED IN THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

That Section 1b, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"**SECTION 1b.** The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and leases, license and regulate lenders, and fix maximum rates of interest; and to fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

SECTION 2. That the Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the aid election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
