Ranger Couple Turns Hobby Into Business

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McKinney have turned a hobby into what is fast becoming a profitable business. The hobby started from a request of McKinney's mother for him to make her a bird house.

At the time the McKinneys were living in Fort Worth and he was working for a construction company. He could only work at his hobby on his off hours.

They were transferred out of state for awhile and had to temporarily suspend their hobby and part time business, but on returning to Texas they soon had all of their accounts back and also some new ones.

A few months ago McKinney became ill and had to take a sick leave for his company. They returned to Ranger and while he has been convalescing from his illness, they have had quite a bit of time to put in on their hobby or business.

They recently completed an order for a firm in Wichita Falls. The order included several bird houses, of several different designs.

The feeders are completely hand made. Each piece is cut from redwood, sanded and put together and painted by the McKinneys.

The feeders are made from glass or plastic according to the design. The glass is hand cut by McKinney and hand fitted into the feeder.

They also make another small feeder which is for holding suet or bread. This type of feeder is usually tacked to a tree and has a rail in front for the birds to stand on while eating out of the feeder.

McKinney does all the sawing out of the parts and bevels the edges. Mrs. McKinney then sands the parts. He put the feeders together, and then Mrs. McKinney paints them.

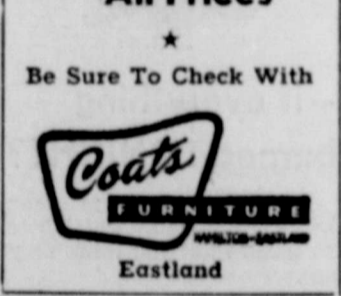
