



WHITE-WINGED DOVES: Daily bag limit-10. Possession limit-10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-winged doves are posses sed-Possession limit-30, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be whitewinged doves.



SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State
Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary."
SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge, Hunting doves

with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 3, 10 and 11 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves,


