Improvements At Club House Made

Recent visitors to the Community Club House have been pleasantly surprised to see that the exterior of the building has been freshly painted and the surrounding yard very much improved by trimming and clean up. Some old trees have been removed, and all the shrubbery has been neatly trimmed so that the club house now presents a much neater appearance than in recent years. The entry hall has also been painted and minor repairs made throughout. The Community Club House, which houses Ranger Community Library, also provides a meeting room for various clubs to meet and has kitchen facilities. The 1920 Club maintains its own club room in the building.

The club house, located in Wilcox Park, had its beginning as a result of the efforts of interested citizens of Ranger who felt the need for such a building. The building was completed in March of 1948 and was actually started by the city commission which was at the time headed by Mayor J. J. Kelly and was completed by the commission headed by the late Mayor Lee Dockery.

Along with the plans for the club house, plans were made for the establishment of the Ranger Community Library. Mrs. G. D. Chastain, member of the library board at that time, spearheaded the drive for the library. The organization was carried through by the library committee of the Ranger Civic League of which Mrs. J. R. McLaughlin was chairman. Mrs. McLaughlin, who served as the first librarian, returned to Ranger a year ago and succeeded the late Mrs. R. A. Jamison who had served as librarian for several years. Mrs. McLaughlin reports that there are over 8,000 volumes in the library at the present time which are available to both adults and children. All citizens of Ranger are eligible to become members of the library and are cordially invited to visit the library at any time. Mrs. Joe Wehler assists Mrs. McLaughlin.

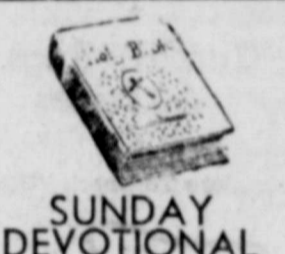
Cisco Plans Meeting

In the dark days of America's Civil War a curious custom was practiced. A man who had been drafted into the army could hire another man to serve in his place. This was acceptable to the officials as long as someone served the term of duty. Many wealthy people were thus allowed to escape the fighting in that war by paying others to do their work. This custom was called proxy.

Today we have the same idea practiced in many areas of life. I have even heard of some being married by proxy. That strange practice is seeking to rear its head in religion also. Some of our people seem to have the idea that they can hire someone to do their religious work and they will then be relieved of all responsibility of service. While this may have been true in the armies of the Civil War it is certainly not so in the Lord's army. God does not recognize religion by proxy.

We need to realize that the Lord expects each of us to do his own share of the work in spreading the Gospel. No one will be able to escape any responsibility by hiring someone else to do the work for him. For instance, some have seemed to grasp the idea that all the visiting for the Lord and the church ought to be done by the preacher because "that's his job." The preachers or paid church workers ought to take care of all benevolence, prayer and Bible study because they are paid to do so. This trend amounts to our saying the preachers to do our serious Bible studying, praying, worshipping and deeds of Christian service; and then coming to church every now and then to hear his report of how our work is coming along. Such a conception is religion by proxy, and is not as God has ordained it.

Each of us is responsible to God to study the Bible, to pray diligently and daily, and to do works of righteousness. We can hire no one to take our place. We must all do our parts or they may not be done. And then, too, let us remember Romans 14:12: "So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God."

Do not let the thought of religion by proxy engulf you and rob you of your Christ in joy in service. Join in the battle. Contend for the faith. Put into your church life and service more than just money. Put yourself in the place of action for Christ. You will find that there is unexplainable joy in working hard for Jesus Christ. You will rediscover the thrill of doing

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Rules Clinic Held by Ranger SFOA Chapter

Members of the Ranger Chapter of the Southwest Football Officials Association met with area coaches at Ranger College Friday night and conducted a football rules clinic.

There are three prominent rules changes in high school football this year. They are (1) Exception has been amended to permit one substitute to enter the game at any time between successive downs. (2) Free kick regulations for illegal and forced touching amended to conform substantially with rules governing scrimmage kicks. (3) Coaching from sidelines rewritten to cover all forms of communication with players on the field except by substitutes entering the game.

These rules were read and discussed by those attending. In addition many questions were asked and discussed on interpretation of rules.

This meeting was for eleven-man football coaches. The chapter plans to hold another meeting Monday night at the College for 6-man coaches.

County Retail Sales Show Large Increase

Eastland County's retail sales in 1959 showed an increase of almost two million dollars over the preceding year, reports just issued on a study of West Texas counties reveals.

The county was a bright spot in West Texas. Retail sales were listed at \$23,317,000 for 1959 compared to \$21,769,000 in 1958 and \$23,253,000 in 1957.

The county's effective buying income also was high. It is listed at \$29,385,000, compared to 28,800,000 in 1958.

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Many 4-H Club Scholarships Are Offered

Scholarships worth \$3600 await 4-H Club members who are pursuing certain college courses. Two home economics scholarships of \$800 each, four forestry at \$1600 each, and two at \$800 each in agronomy and related subjects having to do with crop protection and production will be awarded to successful applicants this fall.

The eight scholarships are part of a national 4-H scholarship fund administered by the National 4-H Service Committee, Chicago, in cooperation with the Extension Service and land-grant colleges and universities. Funds come from industrial concerns that have supported the 4-H educational program for some time.

The home economics scholarships are given annually by Sunbeam Corporation, Chicago, to girls in their junior or senior college year.

The California Spray-Chemical Corporation of Richmond provides scholarships to junior or senior students majoring or minoring in agronomy, soils, entomology, plant pathology and vegetable or fruit horticulture.

College freshmen planning to study forestry are eligible for scholarships offered by Homelite, Division of Tectron Inc., Fort Chester, New York.

Students should apply directly to the state 4-H Club office for further information or contact the county Extension agent. Applicants must be present or former 4-H members, and have a good scholastic record.

Winners will be selected by a group of Cooperative Extension persons meeting at the 4-H Committee headquarters in mid-November. The winning candidates will be notified during the National 4-H Club Congress held the last week in November in Chicago.
