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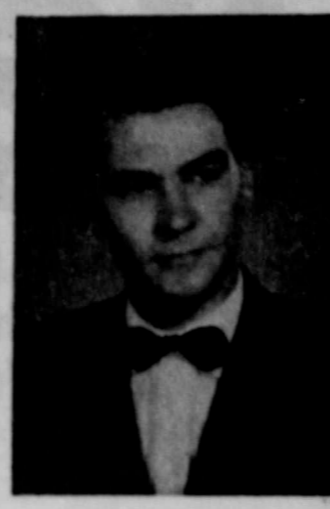
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Eastland County Woman Candidate For State HD President at Large

Mrs. Wilmer Smith, Route 1, Wilson, president of the state organization, will officially open the general assembly session Wednesday morning, Sept. 14. 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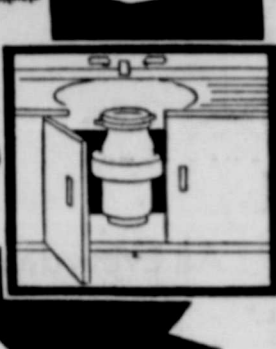

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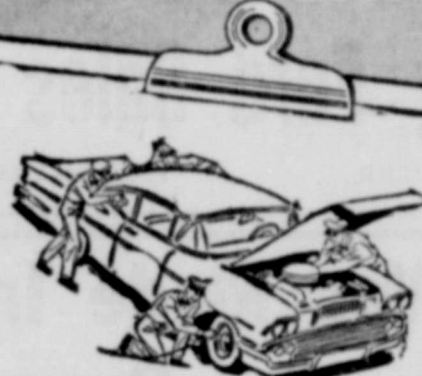
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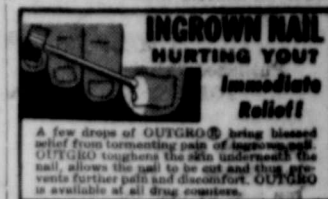

Mrs. Allen Tells How to Care for House Plants

The following article was submitted by Mrs. Robert Allen on the request of the Ranger Garden Club members.

How To Grow House Plants
House plants are being used with a much bolder and a more generous hand than they were in grandmother's day. Larger windows and a greater expanse of glass have created growing conditions far beyond the window sill. The greatest number of indoor plants are admired for their foliage. The large bold leaves of the rubber plant or the ornamental palm may give a pattern to a blank wall and many of our indoor plants not only enjoy life but can be used in the summer to build a most interesting tropical corner of the garden.

Anyone, and that includes you, can grow plants successfully. There is no such thing as a green thumb. All that plants really need

is a little interest and care, just like your pet dog or cat. Your plants need to be fed and watered at regular intervals. They need light and air. This does not mean that a plant should be babbled, but on the other hand it should not be thought of as a piece of furniture or bric-a-brac that dust cannot harm. A plant is a living thing. It breathes in and exhales, it takes water and food, and it reflects love and care even as you and I. An important point to remember about watering is that it should be done regularly. A plant is just as sensitive to the proper timing for a drink of water as an animal, bird or even a human being; therefore it is wise to form a habit of watering. If you water at 8 o'clock in the morning, then do it regularly at 8 o'clock in the morning. Generally speaking water should be reduced somewhat during the winter months, from October to March, as most plants are dormant at that time and do not require so much water.

Some women water their plants very sparingly because they are afraid the water will overflow on their woodwork. This fear is understandable, but the result is unfortunate for the plants. This may be avoided however by placing the plant in a saucer into which excess water may drain. Then be sure this excess water is removed. Keeping a plant standing in water continuously can be as harmful as the lack of water.

Considering the harmful effects of standing water, it follows that one should never water a plant by pouring water in the pot saucer and depending on the roots to pick it up. Although some believe that the African violet should be watered from the bottom because water should not touch its leaves, this is not correct. By simply lifting up the leaves the plant can be watered at the top and benefit thereby. Water for all house plants should be at room temperature.

Another very important thing to remember is the proper soil. Use equal parts of leaf mold, well rotted manure and sand.

For best results use clay pots. They are porous and will allow the plant roots to breathe. Painting a pot is not advisable, for it clogs the breathing facilities. Be sure the hole in the bottom of the pot is not clogged and the water will drain off freely. A few pieces of broken clay pot permits good drainage. Pots with no drainage hole, or glazed pots should not be watered so often. Over watering is one of the chief evils of the eager beginner. A good policy is to wait until the soil looks dry before watering. Dust should be kept off the foliage at all times. Plants such as ivy, ferns, and palms can be kept fairly clean of insect when sprayed with a good force of water. A force of water is necessary so that dust which has accumulated on the plant can be washed off easily. Plants breathe through the pores in their leaves and if these are clogged up they may soon be overcome by disease. Spray your plants with water on an average of once every two weeks. This is usually all that is necessary to combat most diseases.

One of the most happiest aspects of floriculture today is the tremendous demands that flower lovers are expressing for foliage plants. They provide interest and variety with their everchanging growth and developments. They are fun to grown and fun to know.

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

Amendment to UMT Law Affects Reserves

Members of the Reservists and National Guard of the Armed Forces of the United States are affected by an amendment to the

Universal Military Training and Service Act which becomes effective on September 10, 1960. Regional Director George M. Dunlap of the U. S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Veterans Reemployment Rights said in Dallas that, in summary, the new law protects those who perform short tours of training duty from the loss of seniority, status, pay, and

vacation entitlements while on such training duty. If they become disabled while training and cannot perform the duties of their regular positions they are entitled to reemployment in other positions which they can perform in line with their disability, he said. Also, if they are hospitalized incident to their training duty they may delay application for reemployment for a period up to one year because of their hospitalization. "Under the new amendment," Dunlap went on to say, "those performing short tours of training duty only must now request a leave of absence from their employers before leaving for such training and must report for reemployment at the next regularly scheduled working period after necessary travel, or within a reasonable time thereafter if they are delayed because of factors beyond their control."

Failure to report as above subjects the Reservist or National Guardsman to the normal rules of explanation and discipline. Further, Dunlap said, the new legislation "equalizes the reemployment rights of Reservists and Guardsmen who are ordered to an initial period of active duty of not less than 3 to 6 months under the Reserve Forces Act." They must now apply for reemployment within 31 days after release from such training. They no longer have 60 days in which to apply. More information concerning the law or its application in particular cases may be obtained without cost from the U. S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Veterans Reemployment Rights, 1114 Commerce St., Dallas.

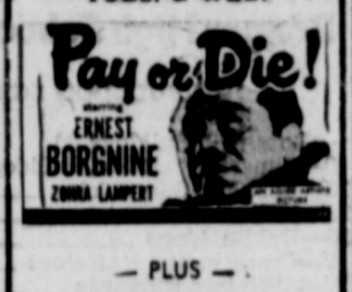

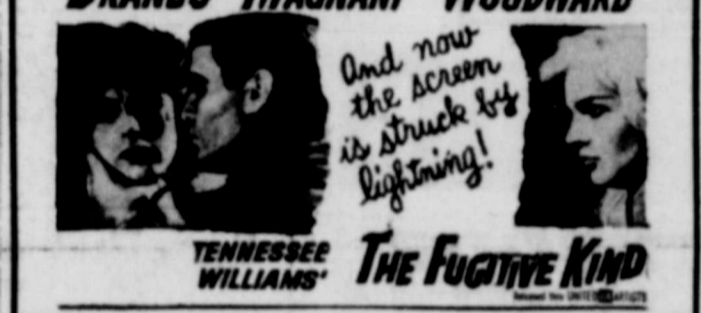

Texas Residents May Obtain Proof Of Age From Census Bureau Records

Last year, 10,610 residents of Texas turned to the U. S. Bureau of the Census for help in proving they were born. These persons

Labor Law Affects Many First Year

September 14 will mark the first anniversary of the Labor-Management Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1959, a Federal labor law enacted by Congress to eliminate or prevent improper practices on the part of labor organizations, employers, labor relations consultants, and their of-

affected by the law are some 17,000,000 union workers, including some 500,000 union officers, and an indeterminate number of employers and labor-management consultants.

During the year the Bureau of Labor-Management Reports, an agency set up by the U. S. Department of Labor to administer and enforce the new law, has processed more than 102,000 reports which are available for public inspection in the Public Documents room in Washington, provided answers to some 59,000 separate inquiries, and prepared and distributed more than two million pieces of educational material designed to encourage voluntary compliance.

"In addition to the reports which began flowing into the Bureau within a month after the enactment of the law, the Bureau was immediately confronted with enforcement actions," says Area Director Oscar P. Welch here. "As soon as the bill became law, scores of complaints alleging a wide variety of violations were received. The inflow of complaints is increasing as provisions of the law become better known."

"While many of the complaints received concern possible violations of the new law, a number simply reflect misunderstanding or ignorance of the requirements written into the statute," he said. "Because of its widespread impact on the manner in which unions, employers, and consultants must conduct their activities—and file reports on certain aspects and procedures—it is important that all persons or organizations subject to the law become as familiar as possible, as quickly as possible, with their responsibilities and obligations," he declared.

To assist in this endeavor, the Bureau has undertaken an extensive program of interpretation, information and technical assistance through twenty-five area offices located at strategic points in the United States, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico.

The Dallas office at 944 Rio Grande National Building, 251 North Field Street, serves unions, employers and consultants in Texas and Oklahoma. Simple explanatory pamphlets, reporting forms, and other literature concerning the law are available there without charge.

were among an estimated 30 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birth. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only source of this information for most of these 30 million people.

Proof of age or birth is needed today to collect social security and other retirement benefits. It is needed to obtain passports. It is needed to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. It is needed for some forms of insurance.

Since 1920 the Census Bureau has provided more than three and one-half million persons with copies of their Census records on age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship. Persons seeking such records of facts about themselves should write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg, Kansas, for a Census Records Search Application Form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are e-

usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests and the ease or difficulty in locating the information.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

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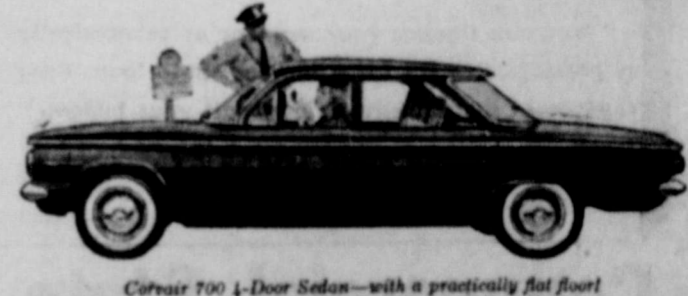


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
