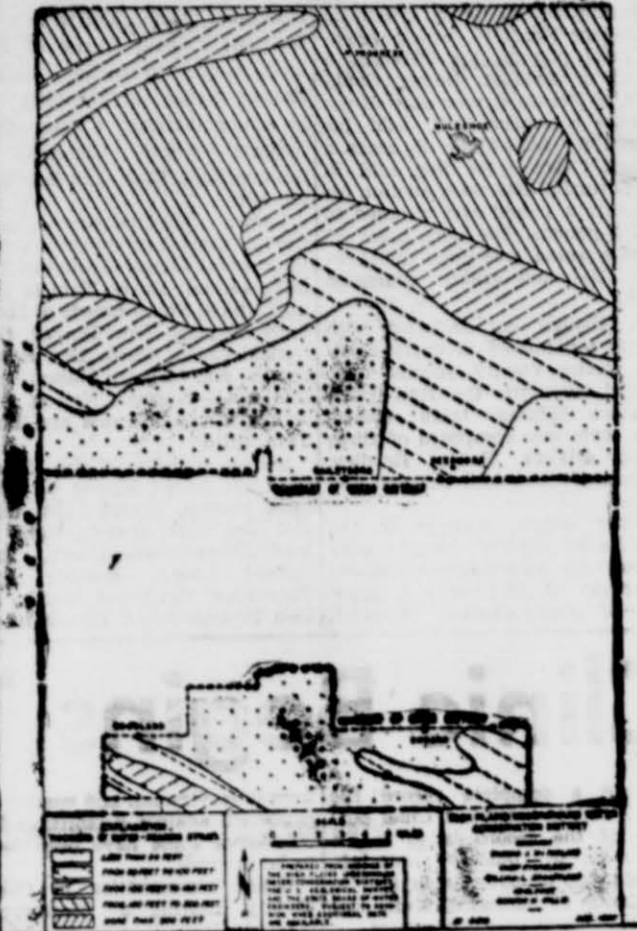

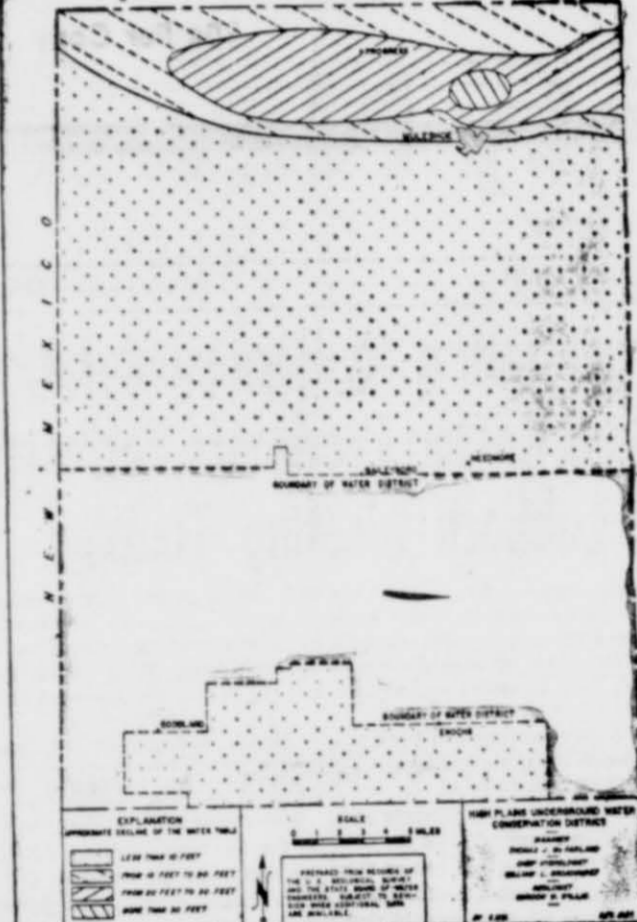

Bailey County Underground Water Shows 5 per cent Decrease Since 1938

The portion of Bailey county within the boundary of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District covers about 822,000 acres of land. The total area of the county is about 532,000 acres. The underground reservoir in the Ogallala formation beneath the area within the district contained approximately 5,770,000 acre-feet of ground water in storage available for pumping in January 1938. The above figures were prepared from data compiled from a study of about 500 logs of water wells and about 250 measurements of water levels in wells.

The map in plate 1 shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata between the water table and the red-beds in 1938 before an appreciable amount of water had been pumped from the reservoir. The map in plate 2 shows the decline of the water table from the spring of 1938 to January 1955.

The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of saturated material in 1955 from the volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent.

These data show that 6,100,000 acre-feet of water was in storage available for pumping in 1938, and that the net decrease in storage from 1938 to 1955 was 330,000 acre-feet. In other words, the net decrease in storage is 5 percent of the quantity available in 1938. The total pumpage, however, from 1938 to 1955 was considerably more than 330,000 acre-feet. The recharge which took place after the exceptionally heavy precipitation in 1941 added a large quantity of water to the underground reservoir. The 330,000 acre-feet plus the quantity added by recharge has been withdrawn by pumping.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent. Suppose the farm consists of 320 acres and has 200 feet of water-bearing

Health Officer Recommends Polio Vaccinations Now

AUSTIN, Jan. 26—State Health Commissioner Henry A. Hollie today appealed to Texas parents to have their children vaccinated now as protection against polio this spring and summer.

The polio season starts early in Texas, the Commissioner warned.

"This year, for the first time in history, we have a vaccine against the disease on hand before the Texas season opens in earnest in mid-April."

Dr. Hollie said the vaccine's effectiveness to date has been "astounding."

"Official records show paralytic polio during 1955 struck six times more frequently among unvaccinated children than among those who received prescribed amounts of the vaccine at the proper intervals."

Three shots are said to give a high level of protection against polio; the second shot given one month after the first shot, and the third shot following seven months later.

According to that schedule, all Texas children who received second shots summer or fall are now ready to have their third shot.

The success of the vaccine was announced April 12, 1955, after exhaustive nationwide studies. But by then countless numbers of children had already been exposed in a rising seasonal incidence. Result: 1955 was pretty much an ordinary year for polio for the nation as a whole, despite the fact that Texas' 1955 season was better than the 5-year median.

. . . But not a drop to waste

Officials of the High Plains Water District have been basing soundly lately on every tub they could find with a bottom for less water wastage.

They maintain, and for good reason, that we are using too much "fall water" and are unrecaptured overflow. They are right, for water in a bar ditch is lost and cannot be used again.

Water is our insurance against drought in the coming years. At the present rate we will someday use up all of our water—maybe not in our lifetime, but it will go as surely as a person withdraws more from his bank account than he puts in. Conservation practices right now will stretch our supply, and if done well enough and soon enough, several more generations might well be able to irrigate in this country.

Every farmer probably has his own method of licking the fall water problem. It's to his interest to do so, since the water costs him money and wasted water is wasted dollars and cents. On flat land the water can be shut off before waste begins, but on sloping land this water often has to be pumped on the land irrigated. If it falls to give it time to soak in. About the only remedy we could think of in this case is to have a turbine pump picking up collected fall water off all the rows and pumping it back via pipe to the main irrigating ditch again. This method would be pretty economical since a turbine pump with a 20-horsepower motor is a lot cheaper to run than a 250-foot well and

However, we were told on several occasions that if a driver hit a pedestrian it was a pretty serious offense. My observation was that it was the ability of the pedestrian and not the automobile of the driver that prevented many collisions.

The Free Market In Russia

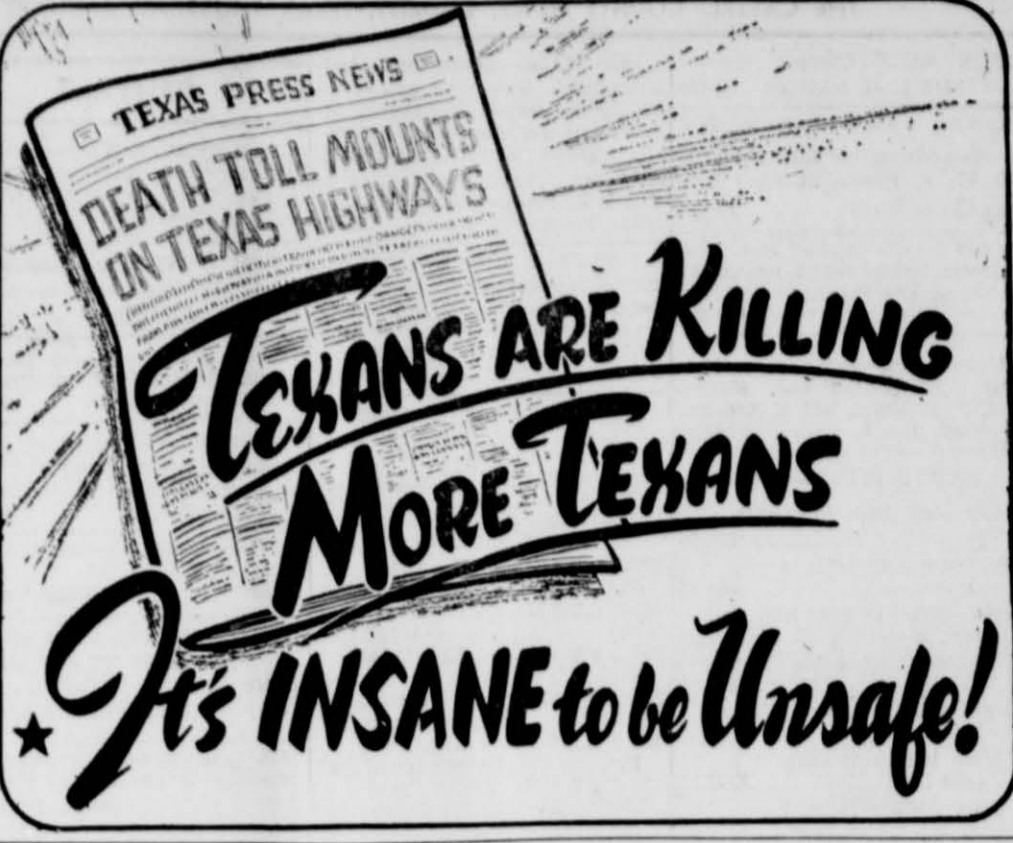
The last vestige of free enterprise in the USSR is a market place called the free market. It is very similar in appearance to our farmer markets or public markets. The products sold at these places are mostly agricultural products and other farm products of a collective farm. There is no set price on these products, as in the case concerning all other items in the USSR. The products can be sold in the free market for whatever the customer is willing to pay. We saw milk being sold at \$1.25 a pound at one stall and for \$2.00 just a few steps away. Suckling pigs are considered a delicacy in Russia, and the members of a collective farm group raise some livestock of their own, there were

the results, in effect, would be the same after the fall water began to collect.

We hope that someday soon someone will find some way of recharging our water sands. Most of the experiments today involve draining lake beds underground, but so far an effective and inexpensive way appears yet to be devised. And all the time the water level keeps dropping and dropping over the years.

Another alternative is a plan proposed several years ago which would call for a man-made series of rivers and canals draining the headwaters of the Missouri, Arkansas and other rivers running into the Mississippi. Primarily a flood control project, the system would also bring irrigation water to the High Plains of Texas and lower West Texas. Reportedly the project, in 1951, would cost about as much as the Tennessee Valley Authority and would be more effective. It is supposed to be in Congress now as it has been for several years. Whether we will ever hear from it we don't know, but it would make this a permanent farm belt and ease the yearly disastrous Mississippi floods.

But for the moment we must content ourselves with trying to inaugurate and maintain water conservation practices. Wasn't it Ben Franklin who said: "A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush?" Anyway whoever said it did coin a phrase that hits our irrigation problem pretty squarely on the button. Irrigation is our mainstay and it won't do to waste it hoping for plenty more tomorrow.

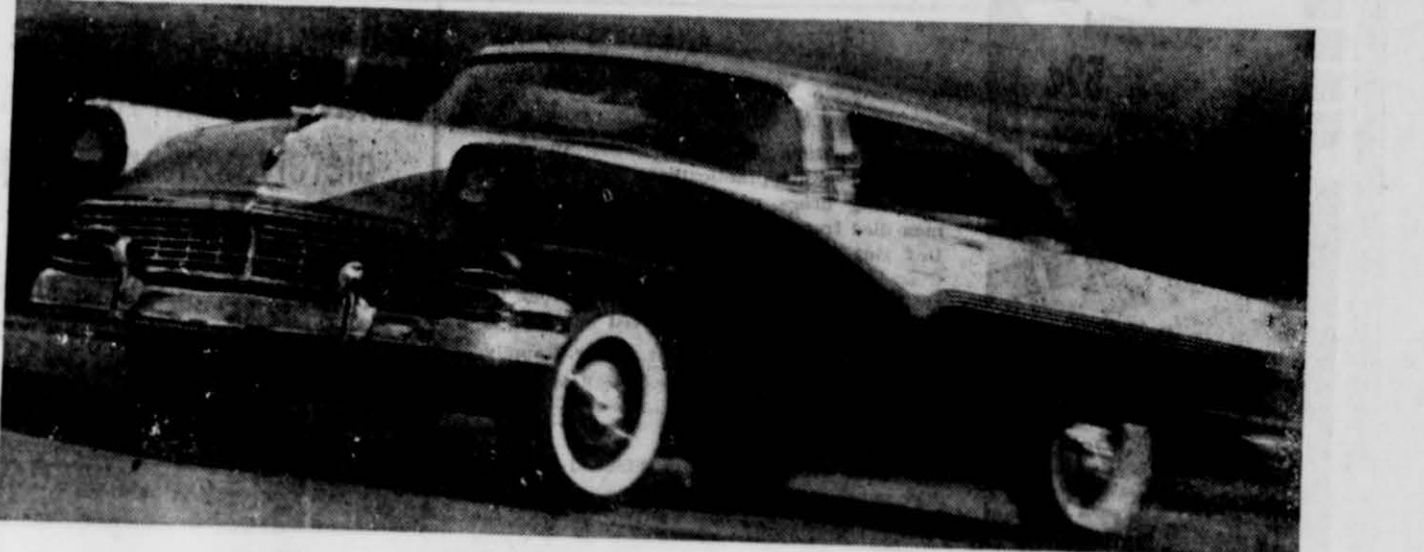
