Bulldogs Victory Shows New Power

The Ranger Bulldogs staged a last half rally Friday night that ran the Eastland Mavericks off the field and back to the Eastland corral as they took their first win of the season with a 20 to 8 victory.

The convincing victory Friday night shows a new power in District 7-AA, and causes opponents to look at the Dogs in a new light. The Bulldogs played a game of ball control in the last half and controlled the ball the entire fourth period. The Mavericks only got off eight offense plays in the last half which netted them a minus three yards rushing.

The Bulldog line showed amazing power by blasting holes in the Eastland defense for the slippery little Bulldog backs to plow through for a total of 13 first downs. Defensively the Bulldogs were at their greatest with each player contributing in team effort in holding the Mavericks to only eight first downs and a total of 96 yards gained.

The Mavericks took the opening kicks took the opening kickoff and started a convincing drive that carried them down to the Ranger 20 yard line but a fumble recovered by Charlie De Los Santos halted

the Mavs drive and set up the Bulldogs first score. The Bulldogs too over and moved the ball down to their 35 yard line where they were forced to punt. Dean Richey got off a booming 45-yard kick which was taken on the Maverick 30 yard line by Mickey Garner who ran back to the 30 where he was hit hard by Edward Mendez and Charlie De Los Santos, causing the ball to fly loose. Ronnie Dackevich jumped on the ball and the Bulldogs had first and ten from the Maverick's 20.

Funeral services will be from the Second Baptist Church at 3 p.m. Sunday with Rev. Frank Brooks, pastor and Rev. Richard Russell, pastor of the First Christian Church officiating.

Burial will be in the Evergreen Cemetery with the Killingsworth Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include the wife and one son, Billy of the home at 430 Hill Ave. in Ranger; parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Mathews of Ranger; one sister, Mrs. Vergie Mitchell of Carlisle, New Mexico; two brothers, Eddie Mathews of Farmington, New Mexico and Charlie Walton of Morton Valley; two uncles, four aunts, seven nephews and three nieces.

Water Supply District to Allow Discount

The Eastland County Water Supply District announced today that the district will this year allow a discount for prompt payment of the Water Supply District taxes.

This will apply to all taxable property in Ranger and Eastland. This is the first year that the district has allowed the discount.

If taxes are paid in October the taxpayers will be allowed a three percent discount. In November a two percent discount will be allowed and in December, a one percent discount will be allowed. Payment of taxes made in January will be the net amount of the taxes. Payment of taxes after January 31 will be penalized and charged interest.

The Water Supply District also issued a statement requiring all property owners building on property at Lake Leon to purchase a building permit.

The permit will cost \$10 and the money will be for the expense of an inspection of the property to see that sewage and sanitation requirements have been met. Jess White, superintendent of the filtration plant will make the inspection.

Permits can be purchased at Howard Bookkeeping Co. in Eastland and at the City Hall in Ranger.

Registration for Evening Classes To Be Continued

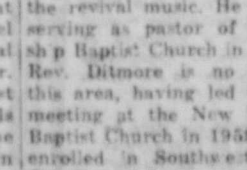

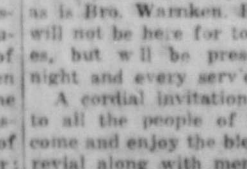

Luckily, Gravitt was driving through the small town where he grew up and he knew there was an emergency landing field near the town.

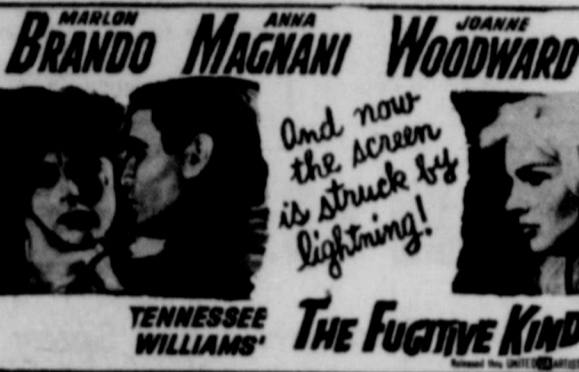
