Rangers Rally, Tie Wharton

The Ranger College Rangers put on a demonstration of come-from-behind football Saturday night in Bulldog Stadium that had these spectators standing almost the entire second half of the ballgame as they fought the big Wharton Pioneers to a 9 to 9 tie. The Rangers defense had their back to the wall for almost the entire first half, seeing the ball in Wharton territory only shortly before the half ended. The Pioneers took the opening kickoff and moved the ball down to the Ranger one yard where they fumbled and halfback Frank Rice recovered for the Rangers. The Rangers couldn't move the ball out and punted out to the 40 yard line where the Pioneers started another drive. Marvin Agnew, Pat Blakely and Butch Scott stopped this drive on the Ranger 17 yard line by stopping the ball carrier short of a first down. Again the Rangers couldn't move the ball and punted out to the 41. On this series of plays Wharton would not be denied the score and halfback Clarence Dettling took the ball over from five yards out. A tackle, Donald Schultz, kicked the extra point and Wharton led 7 to 0 with one minute left in the first quarter. On the following kickoff Ranger started play from scrimmage on the 21 yard line after a 11 yard kickoff return by Mike Leonard. Two plays later Ranger fumbled and Wharton recovered on the 8 yard line. Wharton couldn't move the ball and attempted a field goal from the 14 yard line and Sonny Oates took the attempted kick on the goal line and ran it out to the 12 yard line. From this point disaster struck again as the Wharton line rushing line blocked an attempted punt by the Rangers. The ball went out of the end zone, giving Wharton two points on a safety. This was the end of Wharton's scoring as they held a nine point lead and the Rangers began their long uphill fight to tie the score. It wasn't until late in the second quarter that Ranger made their move when freshman Martin Day took a 45 yards pass from quarterback Kenneth Hart to give the Rangers first and ten.

We had a lot more spirit than we had last week." Butch Scott, back: "If we stay fired up as we are tonight, we'll have a good season." Buton Humphrey, quarterback: "The winning of this game lifted the spirit of the boys."

N. C. (Nick) Gailey, 60, a rancher in the Strawn area for 30 years, died Saturday of a heart attack at his ranch eight miles south of Strawn. Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Strawn with the Rev. Tommy Knotts, pastor, and the Rev. W. H. Tucker, retired minister, officiating. Mr. Gailey was born in Eastland County March 26, 1900. He was married Aug. 2, 1922. He is survived by his wife; four sons, Billy of Abilene, Bobby and Byron of Ranger and Bennie of Strawn; three daughters, Mrs. L. S. Waddington and Mrs. Don Edmonds of Abilene, and Miss Bernita Gailey of Strawn; three brothers, Lottie of Strawn, John W. of El Paso and A. L. of Memphis, Tex.; four sisters, Mrs. C. F. Jones of Ranger, Mrs. Bob Ivey of El Paso, Texas; Mrs. Willie Jackson and Mrs. Dee Lee of Merkel, and seven grandchildren. Powers Elected Supervisor Palo Pinto Soil Dist.

Sam Powers, well known Desdemona stock farmer, was elected District Supervisor to represent Zone 2 of the Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District in an election held last Tuesday night at Desdemona. Powers replaces W. O. Dawson who has recently moved to Arkansas. Powers has long been an outstanding conservationist in this area. He lives on and operates about 400 acres of cropland and 700 acres of rangeland some three miles north of Desdemona on Hwy. 16. Powers' conservation program on this land has included complete cover crop, strip crop, and good residue management and good soil under dry land and on his sandy land in cultivation, and proper use brush control, and periodic deferments of his range land. His place might truly be called a show place, but unlike many show places its development has come about solely from the operators labor on the land. Powers is especially well known for his success with coastal bermuda. He was among the first in Central Texas to make use of this improved variety of bermuda grass. He sprigged his first coastal in the spring of 1954 having obtained his first planting stock from Tipton Georgia and later some certified sprigs from Iowa Park, Texas. Production from his coastal bermuda is almost unbelievable both under dry land and the acreage he has under irrigation. When he was elected to the supervisors position Powers accepted with the same enthusiasm which he shows by the results of his labor on his farm. The Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District includes all of Palo Pinto County and portions of Jack, Erath, and Eastland Counties. The District was organized in 1941. Zone 2 from which Powers was elected includes the eastern portion of Eastland County. The late Mr. Leslie Hagsman of Ranger served as supervisor for Zone 2 for many years before Dawson's term of office. Other supervisors now serving on the District Board are Bill Sanders of Strawn, A. L. Crawford of Perrin, C. B. Quantie of Santo, and Ted Fuller of Gordon. These supervisors meet regularly on the first Wednesday of each month at 8:30 a.m. at Mineral Wells. Stanford received honorable mention for All-State during his high school football career, and was also a runner up for honors in Junior College All-American. Ronnie Daskevich And Joe Barker Spark Bulldogs


The Bulldogs' defense which gave the Eastland Mavericks a hard time Friday night was sparked by Ronnie Daskevich who stopped 11 of the Mavericks' running attempts. Daskevich was backed up by Charlie De Los Santos, James Henry and Jim Robinson who each got eight tackles. Richard Robie and Alfonso Vasquez were in on seven tackles each. Other Bulldogs showing up well a defense were Charles Garrett, Dean Richey, Edward Mauder, and Joe Barker. Two newcomers on defense which bolstered the Bulldogs lines were David Lockwood and Jerry Jones. Lockwood who was out most of last season with an injured leg has showed up well in the last two games. The offensive Bulldog gun was loaded with 135 pound halfback Joe Barker. On 25 different plays quarterback Richard Robie pulled the triggers that sent Barker blasting through the Maverick defense for a total of 125 yards, an average of five yards per carry. Richard Wilhelm carried the ball six times for 27 yards for an average of 4.5 yards and pulled down three passes which netted 45 yards. Edward Mendes ran five plays which picked up 25 yards, and caught one pass for 14 yards. Robie completed four passes for a total of 69 yards and ran ten times for 21 yards. James Henry moved from end to halfback for one play that netted six yards. And Dean Richey picked up a fumbled pass from center on a punt attempt and made the extra point and kicked the ball for a ten yard gain, almost getting a first down. Barring injuries practice this week the Bulldogs should be at full strength Friday night as they go to De Leon.

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School Safety Week Is Set By Governor
Governor Price Daniel said today that Texas school superintendents, principals and classroom teachers have responded enthusiastically to his request for sponsorship of the third annual Texas School Traffic Safety Week during the week of Sept. 18-24.
The special observance was originated in 1958 at the request of the Governor and was directed toward schools teaching driver education. Last year, it was expanded to a statewide classroom project, and more than 33,000 teachers gave special safety instructions in daily classes.
Governor Daniel, in a special message to Texas public school newspaper editors, said: "The vital importance of this particular phase of the traffic safety movement in Texas cannot be underestimated nor can we afford to ignore it. The lives of the brightest and most active members of today's Texas civilization are at stake. When we realize that 545 of the 2,453 persons killed on our streets and 4 highways last year were young

Texans between the ages of 15 and 24, the high school and college age bracket, then we see how tragic our problem has actually become. Those 545 young Texans represented 22 per cent of all the traffic victims, despite their energy, and fast reactions.
"We have accurate figures which tell another part of this tragedy. Young Texans between 15 and 24 held about 18.3 per cent of all Texas driver's licenses last year, but they were involved in about 27 per cent of all the traffic crashes outside Texas cities. This, also, is much too high, considering the real ability of today's young Texans."
The Governor said these figures, and similar statistics for previous years, had led him to obtain the cooperation of the Texas Education Agency, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Safety Association in designing and planning Texas School Traffic Safety Week.
Special brochures have been mailed to nearly 20,000 schools whose classroom teachers have already ordered the teaching aids. The three agencies named, along with the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, prepared and printed the special materials. Orders already filled are more than half the total ordered last year, and officials expect at least 40,000 teachers to present the program this year.
"We know the boys and girls of Texas, anxious to become good citizens as well as good drivers, will be interested in what we are trying to do to help save their lives and those of their friends and relatives," the Governor said.

And so the children gave their pennies to build a statue; and each year, on his birthday, they decorate the statue with flowers.
