

Peanut Bowl Classic Slated For Saturday

The Ranger College Wranglers Saturday night in Maverick Stadium in Eastland in the big game of the year for the Wranglers.

There will be more riding on the outcome of this game than any other of the year. First, it will be the first appearance of the Wranglers or of any team in the Peanut Bowl, and the Eastland County Peanut Bowl championship is riding on the outcome of the game.

The series of football games between Cisco Junior College and Ranger is the oldest series of games for the Rangers.

Ten games have been played. Ranger College has won six and Cisco Junior College three with one game tied.

Brotherhood Sets Goal of 40 For Convention

Roy Barrett, president of the First Baptist Church Brotherhood announced today that the organization has set a goal of 40 members to attend the Texas Baptist Brotherhood convention in Abilene Sept. 26 and 27.

More than 2,000 men and boys are expected to attend the convention. "Preparing for the Master's Service" is the theme of the two-day meeting which will begin Monday night in Abilene's First Baptist Church and will close Tuesday night in the University Baptist Church.

Dr. John E. Haggs, Southern Baptist evangelist from Louisville, Ky., will speak on "God's Tall Men" in the opening session following special music by the Howard Payne College choir from Brownwood.

Tuesday morning's session will feature an address, "Capitalizing on Citizenship Opportunities," by Josh Lee, former U. S. Senator from Oklahoma. Others speaking at the same session will be Dr. L. D. Ball, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Pleasant Grove, and L. H. Tapscott, secretary of the Texas Baptist Brotherhood department.

Leading speaker at the Tuesday afternoon session will be James M. Sapp of Memphis, Tenn., associate in the Southern Baptist Brotherhood Commission. Rev. W. R. Miller, pastor of Central Baptist Church, San Antonio, will also speak Tuesday afternoon.

The convention will close Wednesday night with an address entitled "The Seeking Saviour," by Dr. C. Wade Freeman, director of the Texas Baptist evangelism division. During the same session H. C. Sivells, New Mexico Brotherhood secretary from Albuquerque, will talk on "Boys Will Be Men."

Each session will open with congregational singing directed by Dick Baker, evangelist, song leader and recording artist. A special feature Tuesday afternoon will be a Brotherhood barbecue.

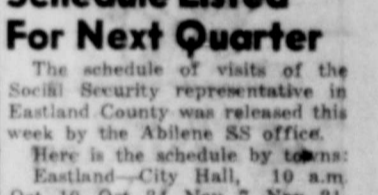

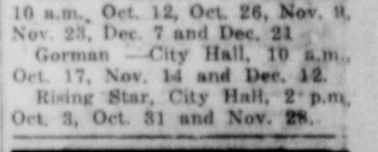

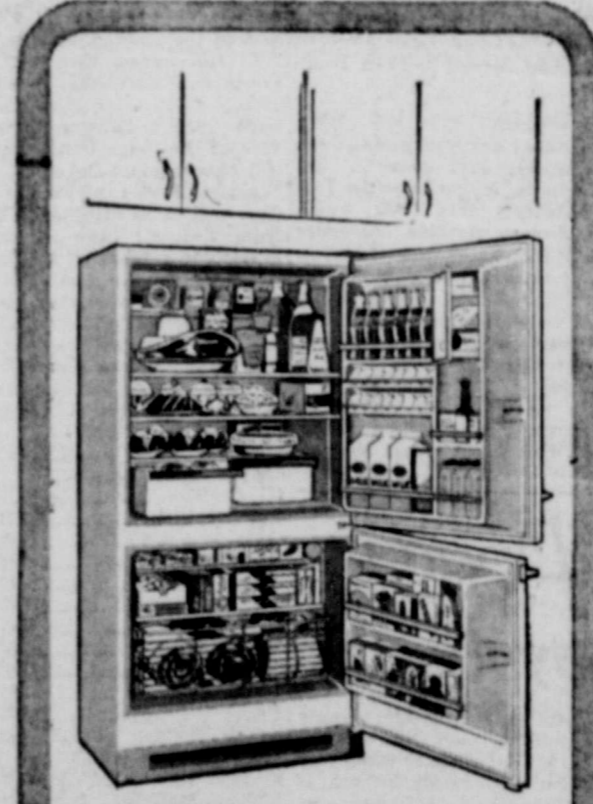

Board of Pardons And Paroles Asks For More Men

The State Board of Pardons and Paroles has approved its budget request for the years 1962-63 which is to be submitted to the Governor and to the next Legislature. This budget request is aimed toward fully implementing a five-year program for the gradual employment of 40 parole officers during 1958 and the addition of 30 parole officers in 1959. The Board was granted sufficient funds to employ only the 40 parole officers during 1958. Subsequently, the Legislature provided for the continuation of a force of 40 parole officers for the period through 1961.

While the parole staff has remained constant, the parole rate has grown sharply and steadily. In 1957, the year before professional parole supervision, the number of inmates paroled was 750. Following the establishment of a professional parole system, the parole rate climbed to 1,500 in 1958; 1,800 in 1959, and will surpass 2,000 in 1960.

This increase in rate has made an important contribution to public safety because a parole system is basically directed toward the prevention of crime. For without clemency of any kind 95 percent of the 17,000 inmates now in prison will eventually serve their sentence and be released in the community. Sixty percent will be in society in less than 5 years, while more than 50 percent will fully serve their sentence and walk the streets of our cities and towns in less than 4 years. These inmates can either serve their terms completely and be turned loose at the prison gates with no restrictions or assistance, or they can be released under the supervision and guidance of a trained parole officer.

Prior to January, 1958, the Board was unable to give any assistance to inmates in developing release plans. Consequently, an

over growing number of inmates had to stay in the penitentiary because of the lack of any program to which they could be released. Most of these inmates were subsequently released by discharge, usually, supervision was provided entirely by volunteers. Many individuals gave generously of their time, but inevitably there could neither be standard procedure nor frequent regular contacts with parolees in the field or with community agencies. As the number on parole began to rise, this system was taxed beyond its capacity. As a result of these two factors, the public was being afforded the protection of a parole system in an increasingly smaller percentage of cases and a growing number of inmates was being released by discharge. This situation, coupled with the swelling prison population, brought about the establishment of the first professional parole supervision program in the history of the State in January of 1958.

Since the beginning of that system, there has been a sharp improvement in guidance and supervision for the thousands of persons on parole in its wider use as a method of release. For example, from 1955 through 1957, 29 percent of those released from prison were under parole supervision, while 71 percent completed their sentence and were simply turned loose by discharge. By the end of this year, the percentage released under parole supervision, as opposed to discharge, will have climbed to nearly 50 percent.

Despite the sharp shift in the use of parole, the violation rate has not increased. Especially significant has been the record with respect to new felony convictions among those on parole. During the last 12 months, the Board has had over 5,800 individual parolees under its jurisdiction. During the same period, only 117 individual parolees were convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for new felonies; and of this number, only 12 were convicted for crimes against persons.

On the other hand, over 90 percent of the parolees under super-

vision at the present time are gainfully employed and are earning more than \$10,000,000 a year in salary and wages. At the same time, they are supporting over 1,600 minor dependents.

While an increased parole rate has made a contribution to public safety and rehabilitation for offenders, it has also resulted in a substantial tax savings to the State. Present estimates show that it costs about \$1.24 a day to keep an inmate in prison. At the same time, the State Welfare Department pays an average of 13 cents per prisoner each day for relief to inmates' families. Also prison facilities are filled to capacity, and additional inmates mean more construction at an average cost of approximately \$3,000 per inmate.

After all parole costs have been deducted, the State will have made a tax saving of over \$4,000,000 between 1958 and 1961 because of the increased parole rate.

The Board feels that it is imperative that the second phase of its original program be adopted, so that parole supervision can be used to its full effectiveness. The present authorized expenditure for the Board is \$492,978.00 per year. The Board is requesting 30 additional parole officers, as well as appropriate administrative and clerical staff, which will bring the cost to \$687,230.00 for 1962 and \$779,579.00 for 1963. After all

Decorative Properties of Wood
Wood is an extremely variable material. For example, there is virtually no limit to the natural color combinations available. The sapwood of most species is light colored. Some are almost white. Some woods show color difference between the sapwood and the heartwood. However, the heartwood of most species is darker colored than the sapwood. The figure of a piece of wood depends not only on the species, but also on the way the wood is sawn. Sawing accentuates certain grain characteristics associated

with a particular wood. Some are preferred because of the figured stripes or ribbon effect and others because of elliptical or curved patterns. It is the matching of these patterns and color shades that gives rare beauty to some pieces of expensive furniture.

The size character of the wood grain also influences wood appearance. Open grained wood, like red oak, refers to the relative size of its pores. When applying finishes to such wood, fillers must be used. Such woods are often filled with colors which contrast with the basic color of the wood. Such color applications can be used with startling effectiveness. When selecting wood, there are many characteristics to choose from and sufficient combinations to please any taste and requirement.

Baking Contest Scheduled for State Fair

The second annual Yeast Baking Contest has been scheduled by the Women's Department during the 1960 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 8-23, in Dallas.

The contest, open to non-professionals, is set for Oct. 14 and will feature, in addition to others, two novel areas of competition. Premiums will be given to the best bread or roll baked in original shapes depicting Texas or Western ideas. An additional feature will be the foreign breads division, such as stollen and kulich.

The "Best of Show" winner will be awarded \$50 cash and a diamond-studded gold ribbon pin. Every homemaker who enters the contest will be given a five-pound sack of flour by Burrus Mills.

First, second, and third prizes of \$5, \$3 and \$2 will be offered in each of the nine classes, which are white bread, batter bread, graham or wholewheat bread, fancy wheat bread, plain rolls, sweet rolls, fancy or foreign rolls, coffee cakes, and foreign sweet breads.

A contestant may enter all nine classifications, but may submit only one item in each class. Entries must be brought or mailed to the Women's Building by 10 a.m. Oct. 14, the day of the contest.

Judges will test each entry on uniform browning of crust for bread and rolls, symmetry of shape, attractiveness of decoration for sweet bread and rolls, tenderness of crust and interior, lightness, uniform color, moistness without sogginess, and nut-like flavor.

Each entry should be placed on a thin board or paper plate. Contestants should pick up their entries after judging is completed.

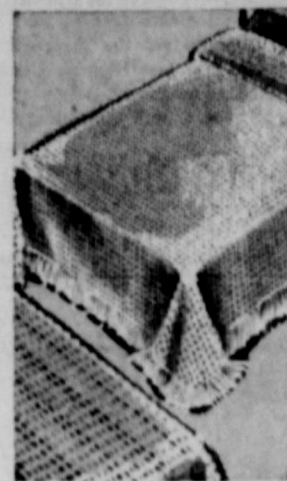
