## As I See Ranger

This is the 23rd year the Post Office Department has sponsored an annual Letter Writing Week—an event celebrated to emphasize the meaning and value of letter writing as a link between people both at home and abroad.

During this period, Oct. 2-9, personal letter writing has shown a remarkable increase. A personal letter is the most economical, longest lasting, and most sincere means of extending greetings, communicating social news, and exchanging ideas.

Postmasters throughout the United States have all agreed to exchange letters with Postmasters in foreign countries during this week.

Delbert Capps said Monday morning that the ballgame in Eastland Saturday night was the hardest ballgame that he had ever played in. The idea for a system for sounding the end of each quarter was brought up at a meeting two weeks ago by a committee composed of Roy Barrett, Pete Brasher and Morris Campbell begin work on the project. They received the help of Talmage Craig, who furnished the transformer, W. P. Hatfield, the siren, Byron Galley, switch; Clyde Reid and Bob Galley, who did the wiring. The wire was furnished by the High School Shop. The whole project was completed in two weeks and the cost to the club was nothing. This is an example of what a club can do if they get organized and want to work at a project. Several other projects have been undertaken by the Booster Club and progress is being made on all of them.

The opportunities of the frontier has been proven by success over a wide spectrum of enterprise before the Texas Electric people began this concerted effort to attract more business and industry to the area.

## Congressman Wright To Address Demos

Congressman Jim Wright of Weatherford will be the featured speaker at the Eastland County Democratic Campaign Fund luncheon and rally to be held in the Eastland City Park at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 4.

Grady Hogue, president of Cisco Junior College will be Master of Ceremonies and will introduce Congressman Wright.

At 37, Wright is one of the youngest members of Congress. Born in Fort Worth, he received his education in the public schools, Weatherford College, and the University of Texas, where he majored in government and economics.

In World War II, he enlisted as a private in the Air Force three weeks after Pearl Harbor, later went through the aviation cadet program, was commissioned and flew combat missions in B-24's in the South Pacific, receiving decorations including the D.F.C.

Returning after the war, he bought a GI business loan and bought an interest in an advertising business. He served in the Texas Legislature and later was elected to fill part of an unexpired term as mayor of Weatherford. He was twice re-elected. The city officials of Texas chose him in 1952 to serve as president of the League of Texas Municipalities, which represents more than 600 incorporated cities and towns in Texas. He was honored by the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of the five outstanding young men in Texas for 1953.

In 1954, he became a candidate for Congress and was elected by a 15,000 vote margin. Three times the people of his district have re-elected him without opposition.

In Washington, he is a member of the important House Public Works Committee. In 1957, he served as Chairman of a subcommittee investigating the floods in the Southwestern states which resulted in several bills authorizing corrective action. During the past five years he has been the author of an unusual number of public laws. In 1958, he came forward with the idea for a Future Scientists of America program and P. L. 85-875 of his authorship was enacted, creating this nationwide program.

Other public laws bearing his name include P. L. 85-213 of 1957 extending Vocational Educational Act and P. L. 170 of 1955 permitting churches to make free use of second-class mailing permit. Wright has been co-author of several successful bills embodying major recommendations of the Hoover Commission for streamlining and eliminating duplication in governmental operations. He is author of a bill which would create a systematic plan for repaying the National Debt.

He has helped to steer passage of such major legislation as the pay-as-you-go Interstate Highway Act of 1956 and the Omnibus Rivers and Harbors Bill of 1958. He was appointed at the end of the last session as a member of the Special Select Committee to investigate the Interstate Highway System and has been one of the most active members of that important body.

He is an active churchman, an Elder in the Presbyterian Church and a frequent contributor to Christian journals and periodicals. In Washington, he is teacher of the couples' class in Washington's historic New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church for the U. S. A. last Spring elected him a member of the Permanent Judicial Committee, which is the ruling court of that church in matters of ecclesiastical law.

In September of 1958, he was one of five members of Congress cited by a national magazine as "Continued on Page Two"

The Bulldogs passing attack looked better against DeLeon last week than it has all season, and things could pick up in this department. The defense worked real good last week and should pick up against Dublin.

Rangers Face Tough Opponent  
The Rangers will undoubtedly face the toughest competition this week that they have faced all season.

Del Mar, who went to the Little Rose Bowl last year, has 22 boys back from last season's team. Two of these boys made Little All-America. Del Mar will be making their second appearance of the season Saturday night. They defeated Blinn Junior College 66 to 8 in the season opener. They run most of the offense from a straight T formation, occasionally

switching to a split end and/or back variation. They have done very little passing this year, but haven't had to show much in their easy wins over Blinn.

The Rangers will be counting strongly on their hard hitting defense to keep them in the game. The Ranger defense looked real strong against Wharton and Cisco, and is expected to be improved even more against Del Mar. The four interior linemen on the Ranger defense will be Fredman Tackles Marvin Agnew and Wayne Durham, and Guards Bud Bridges and Warren Steeler. Each game should show an improvement in these boys as they gain in added experience.

The Rangers offense will probably keep the ball in the air a lot Saturday night as the two quarterbacks, Kenneth Hart and Burton Humphrey, are hitting their receivers well as was noted in the Cisco game last Saturday.

The only serious injury Saturday night was to Back Mike Leonard who received a sprained ankle which will cause him to see limited action this week.

The Rangers will leave Ranger Friday morning and will stay in Corpus Christi Friday night. They will return to Ranger Saturday night following the game.

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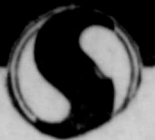
