# Gorman to Kokomo Road Is Approved

Eastland County commissioners Monday approved a farm-to-market road project which will connect Gorman and Kokomo. The approval came after commissioners got some things off their chests in a talk with R. P. (Buddy) Haun, newly appointed resident engineer.

The project, which has to be approved by both the county and the City of Gorman, will cost an estimated \$140,000. The county will provide right-of-way for the highway except in Gorman, and the City will secure right-of-way there.

The vote on approving project was three to one with Commissioner Bob Carter of Rising Star abstaining.

## Burton-Lingo Heir Dies In Fort Worth

Funeral services for Mrs. Willard Burton of 1102 Penn, Fort Worth, wife of the late Willard Burton, former mayor of Fort Worth and founder of Burton-Lingo Company, will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday in St. Andrews Episcopal Church of Fort Worth with Rev. Louis T. Martin officiating.

The Burton-Lingo Lumber Co. in Ranger will be closed from 10 to 11 a.m. Wednesday during the services.

Mrs. Burton was the former Hortense Lingo of Denison. Her late husband, who rode into Fort Worth on the first train into the city in 1876, was associated in business enterprises with his cousins, Paul and John Waples, who founded Waples-Platter Company in 1875.

Mrs. Burton was a life member of the Fort Worth Woman's Club. She was a member of the Worth Club and St. Andrews Episcopal Church. She was a founder of the Fort Worth Day Nursery.

She is survived by a niece, Mrs. Janet Brown of Sweetwater, and four nephews, Lingo Platter of Houston, Harry Platter of Port Sulphur, La., John Leeper of San Antonio and Townner Leeper of El Paso.

Courthouse authorities couldn't remember when an acceptance vote on state funds for a farm-to-market road in Eastland had met with anything but a unanimous vote.

The State Highway Dept. in the past has withdrawn money from a county when the right-of-way was not secured by commissioners. This has never happened in Eastland County, but funds forfeited in other counties in the district has been used here.

"I'm all for Froggie (Commissioner of Precinct 2 J. M. Bennett of Gorman) getting all the roads he can, but I want some thing for myself," Commissioner Carter said.

Commissioner Carl Lamb of Cisco said he was going along on the project since he thought the entire county was helped anytime pavement is put down. But he too said he thought his precinct should get more attention, and he pointed to the Airport Road leading to Lake Cisco as a road he thinks should be put on the FM Road program.

Haun told commissioners that the Highway Department decides what roads should be paved strictly on need. He said that the only yardstick used in traffic count, Commissioners J. B. (Tip) Arthur and Bennett said they thought Highway Dept. recommendations should be followed at all times.





raced 29 yards for a touchdown. Again the try for extra point was no good and Ranger led 19 to 8.

The final Ranger core came with two minutes left in the half with a fumble recovered by Philip Reed putting the Rangers in business on the Tyler 47 yard line. Fullback Printis Gidney Gidney made the final yard in the drive to give the Rangers a 25 to 8 halftime lead.

In the opening minutes of the second half Ranger stopped a Tyler drive on their own six yard line, but Tyler held and forced Ranger to attempt to put out of the end zone and blocked the punt for a safety and two points.

This break seemed to give Tyler the needed spirit to make their comeback.

On the next kickoff Boxler again made an outstanding return of 58 yards and gave the Tyler Apaches a first and ten situation on the Ranger 11 yard line. Quarterback Jimmy Lyons scored the touchdown on a one yard keeper play and Boxler ran the extra points.

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
