Enrollment Drops in GI School Training

Some 250,000 veterans are expected to be in training this fall under the Korean GI Bill, a 40 percent drop under last fall's manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas, Texas predicted today.

At the same time, enrollments of disabled Korean veterans under VA's vocational rehabilitation training program probably will drop to 7500 this fall from last fall's figure of 10,000. However, a smaller, newer program administered by VA, War Orphans Education, is expected to increase its enrollments from last fall's 9,000 to around 12,000 this fall. This program is for the sons and daughters of veterans who died of service-connected conditions.

Well over half of the 250,000 Korean GI Bill trainees will be in the nation's colleges and universities, Mr. Onatot said. The rest will be in schools below the college level, and in on-the-job and on-the-farm training.

The Veterans Administration expects GI enrollments to continue to decline until 1965, when the GI Bill program comes to an end. Vocational training for disabled Korea veterans also is expected to drop. But the War Orphans Education program most likely will continue to go up for several years; this program has no terminal deadline.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

Thomas Wolfe says, in one of his novels, that you can't go back. Literally, of course you can return to the scenes you knew in bygone years but the places have been changed. The buildings are older and more faded—or they are gone.

A recent return to Memphis, Tennessee, where I grew up, brought this forcefully to mind. The old, dim, second-hand book store I used to visit has been replaced by a "bargain" clothing store. The bakery shop where you could get three big sugar-coated cookies for a nickel or a lavender coffee cake, encrusted with brown sugar and spicy with cinnamon, for a dime, has vanished.

So has the old hotel which was the scene of an exciting occurrence when I was a schoolboy. A man barricaded himself in an upper floor and stood off the police in a battle that lasted an hour or longer. When the chief called for volunteers, almost every officer present stepped forward. A policeman had been wounded and the chief had asked who would volunteer to go with the wounded man.

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Local Mail Increase Causes Two Additional Dispatches

Mail volume in the Ranger area contributed to a new national record of nearly 64 billion pieces of mail, including a billion pieces of parcel post, during fiscal year 1960 ending last June 30. Acting Postmaster Ellis White said.

Based on advance information from the Annual Report of the Department, which has been made available to Postmaster White, it was revealed that the present day figures represent an increase of 25 percent over the 1955 volume which totaled 50.9 billion pieces.

This increase, along with a sharp discount in postage rates, has helped foster a complete revolution in postal transportation, including far more extensive use of highway vehicles, he said. Largely, a transportation pattern for Ranger has changed in the following manner: Two additional dispatches via Star Routes at 5:40 p.m. and 7 p.m. has been added.

Today, 85 percent of the vast postal vehicle fleet—operating under a modernization and improvement program initiated in 1954—is composed largely of new types of standard, commercial, light-weight, maneuverable vehicles. This conversion, he noted, has meant the "retirement" of worn-out units—many in use for ten years or more—which, in turn, has greatly reduced maintenance costs for the Postal Service.

Described as a vital part of this program which was launched approximately seven years ago under the direction of Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield, vehicle unit purchases during fiscal 1960 amounted to more than 8,500 compared with 115 similar purchases during fiscal year 1953.

"The motor vehicle inventory on June 30, 1953, was 18,969," Postmaster White said, "and although the 1960 statistics are not yet in final form, it is estimated that more than 34,000 new vehicles have been purchased since fiscal year 1954 and that with the retirement of old vehicles the inventory total on June 30 of this

year was just a little under 37,000 vehicles.

Texas post offices had a total of 688 government-owned vehicles on June 30, 1953. In the next seven years 1,575 vehicles were delivered, bringing the government-owned fleet in Texas offices to 1,953.

"Still another development of vital importance in connection with motor vehicle service is the fact that 119 new maintenance facilities have been constructed since January, 1953, to service a 5.5 fleet. Ten more were under construction on June 30 and 25 more are now in the planning stage.

"Other figures in the preliminary 1960 report reveal that post offices which now have a vehicle service available total more than 3,600 while the corresponding figure for fiscal year 1953 was 2,433. The total of miles traveled in fiscal year 1960 is estimated to be 400,000,000 compared with approximately 200,000,000 in fiscal year 1953.

"One of the most outstanding features of this motor vehicle improvement program is the mechanization of foot delivery routes, which was first mentioned in the Annual Report for fiscal year 1958. This revealed that the motor vehicle inventory for June 30 of that year showed 1,914 'very light vehicles and trailers' with the notation that this figure included certain vehicles previously reported in the truck category. In the 1960 report this total had climbed to a little over 5,000 and the preliminary estimate from the 1960 report shows 5,816.

(Continued from page one) ... much faster rate in fiscal 1961. Commitments already have been made for extensive installations of two-cylinder mailers and four-cylinder right-hand drive trucks which have undergone exhaustive tests and have been found to be highly satisfactory.

Postmaster White also pointed out that there have been literally scores of organizational and operational changes during this seven-year improvement program and that each one of them is directed toward the more efficient and more economical operation of the Post Office Department.

Some of the more significant of these are: Decentralization of postal operating management out of the Post Office Department in Washington, D. C., by setting up fifteen regional headquarters offices; adoption of modern business accounting and financial procedures; utilization of the latest types of electronic machines; elimination of hand-prepared checks, payroll and others, at each post office by making payments from regional offices with estimated net savings of \$20,000,000 a year; introduction of new concepts of personnel management for the benefit and welfare of more than half of a million postal employees, including both training programs for promotions and safety programs to reduce on-the-job accidents.

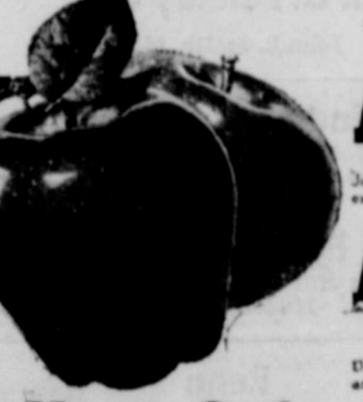

It's Time to Plan For Winter Pasture

Don't let this hot weather fool you. Winter is not far away, and now is the time to plan for winter pastures. Temporary pastures not only reduce the cost of winter livestock, they help maintain growth and production. Many dairymen have reported net returns of \$25 to \$50 per acre from winter temporary pastures, says George McBeck, extension pasture specialist.

Texas has had a good pasture year, but the summer grasses will be dormant during the winter months. Temporary pastures will supply the needed green grazing and will also help with erosion control, says McBeck.

The specialist advises starting at the proper time for your area. Seed that is already in the ground when the rains do come has a jump on seed that is not planted until after the rain.

Pastures, just like all other crops, need to be fertilized. A soil test is the only sure way to determine just what fertilizer is needed, and money spent for a soil test is never wasted. If the

Speakers Named For Baptist Convention
