I—told—her—to—get—in—a—id—she would find out but quick!

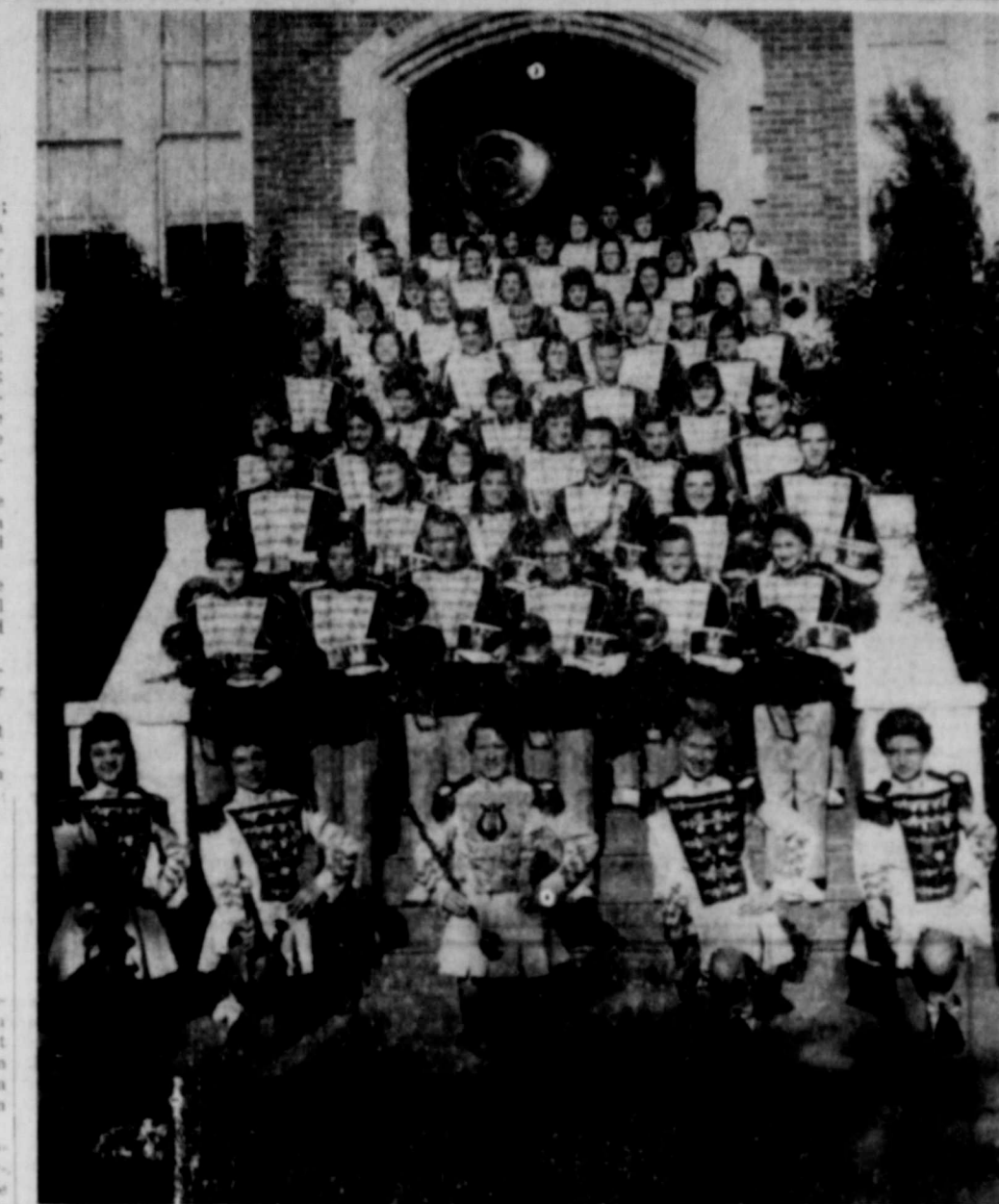
We had a nice discussion but the paddle did a better job of seeing that it didn't happen again—soon!
