It needs the businesses to Home owners dread termites and insecticides or wood preservatives properly applied to all lumber used on or near the ground.

A knowledge of the appearance and hab'ts of termites will enable us to better understand and combat the insect. Termites are about the same size as some ants. They nest in the soil and are often call ed white ants. But they are not ants. Ants have a pinched waist whereas, the termite body is thick throughout.
