IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Clean Hands. Our courts work with two sets of principles in meting out justice—those of "law" and those of "equity." Under "law" a court declares the parties' rights and duties and sets money damages for harm already done—as when someone goes back on his contract with you, or injures you in an automobile crash. But under principles of "honesty, equity, and conscience," for example, a court seeing harm on the way, may forestall it and enforce its orders by fines or jail terms. England used to have two kinds of courts to hear cases under law and equity. But today both England and America use the same judge to hear both kinds of cases. How did these two systems arise? Long ago the English king called upon the "chancery"—then largely made up of churchmen, (the keepers "of the King's conscience"), to give "relief" where the older Common Law courts, grown rigid, might fail. Unable to use the Common Law, the chancellors applied certain rules and maxims, sometimes borrowed from ancient Greece and Rome—"He who comes into equity must come with clean hands."

New Publications Are Released by Small Business Ad.

The impact of urban renewal projects on small business is summarized in a publication now available at the Dallas Regional Office of the Small Business Administration, Chris W. Ferguson, SBA, Regional Director for this area, announced today.

The summary is a condensation of a small business management research study, "The Impact of Dislocation from Urban Renewal Areas on Small Business," prepared by the University of Connecticut under a grant from the Small Business Administration.

The report said urban redevelopment and urban renewal programs now embrace 961 projects throughout the nation affecting nearly 100,000 firms, most of which are small businesses. By 1970, the report estimated, at least 50,000 more firms will be dislocated under the public improvement programs.

The report's conclusions and proposals are based on detailed analyses of the experience of businesses dislocated as a result of urban renewal project in Hartford and New Haven, Conn. However, supplemental information on firms in relocation projects in 11 other cities and reports from redevelopment agencies across the country were said to have corroborated the conclusion that the New-Hartford experience is representative of the pattern of experience in the United States.

The study, first to be issued under the SBA grants for small business research, concludes that of the nearly 25 per cent of the dislocated firms that go out of business, some are submarginal and sub-standard and could not exist in any area or in any circumstances other than those of a slum area. It is pointed out, however, that more than 75 per cent of the dislocated business relocate successfully, and 85 per cent of these show increased profits within a year.

Businesses which come under urban renewal program should make every effort to keep fully

informed of developments and avail themselves of financial and technical assistance offered under the program, the report advised. Under the Housing Act, a \$3,000 maximum may be allowed to compensate for moving and relocation costs. The average allowance, the study shows, is about \$1,500 per business.

A business which is faced with moving under these programs can increase its chance of successful relocation, the report said, by following the study's four recommendations:

- Work closely with redevelopment authorities and ignore rumors; carefully re-evaluate location and space needs; utilize available financial and technical assistance when needed, and prepare to act independently, if necessary.

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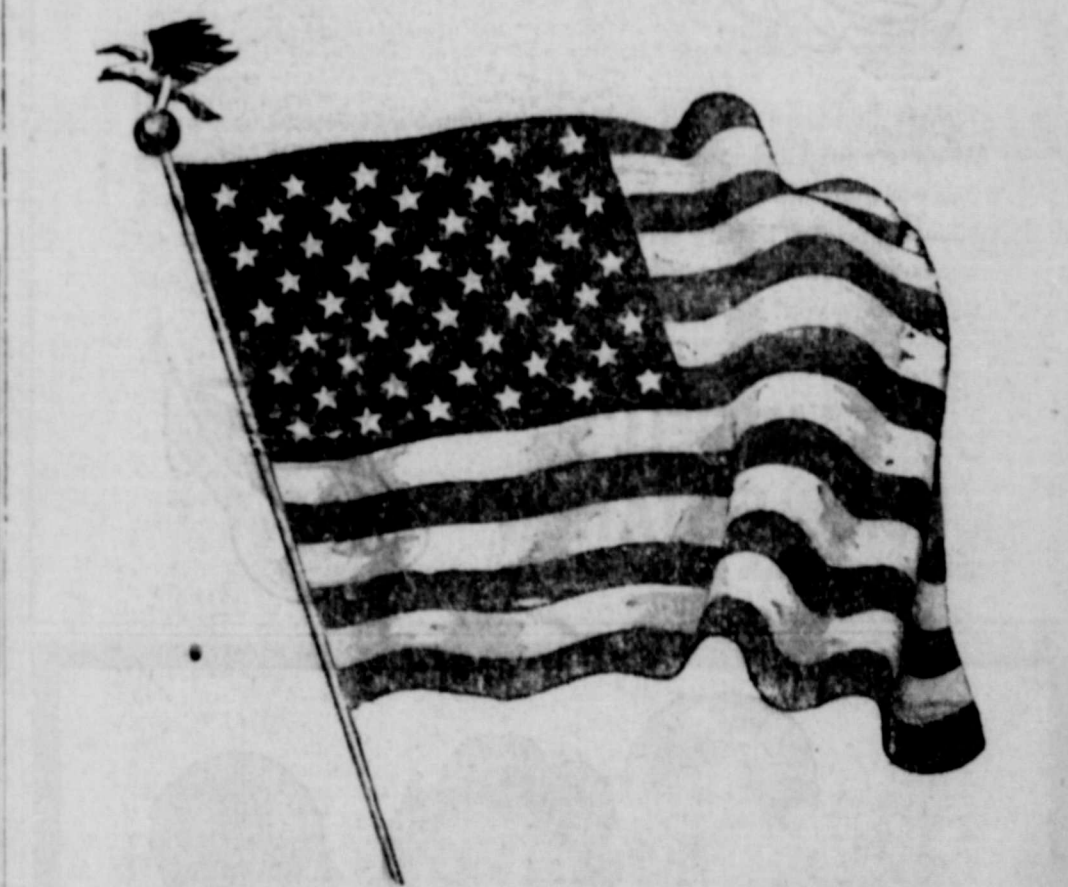
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
