

"WE NEED equity-we've got to have higher beef prices, higher commodity prices and lower gas prices," said Pecos farmer Mike Burkholder.

"At the state level, we've got to work for the abolishment of the pass-through clause, said attorney John Aikin of Hereford. "And at the federal level, I think a change in administrations is imperative.'

"We need a special gas rate for irrigation purposes," Dimmitt farmer Carl King said. "I think our odds are better in Washington than in Austin."

that same stage. One of the meeting's stated purposes was to urge a special session of the Legislature to consider the gas-cost problem. But Sen. Sherman held out no hope that a special session would be called, or that it would do any good if it were.

"IT ISN'T just a matter of calling a special session, Sherman advised. "You have to be prepared for what you want to accomplish and how you want to follow through when the session starts. But you'd better be prepared for other developments, too-adverse ones which you may not want, or bad legislation. I'm hesitant about a special session because some of the worst legislation we've ever had has come out of special sessions.

He added that any legislation adopted in a special legislative session couldn't go into effect until mid-September at the earliest, and advised the frustrated gas users to marshal their forces, agree on their plan of action, and be ready when the next regular session of the Legislature convenes in Jan-

King, who helped organize the meeting, said gas users might get more help at the federal level than from the state government.

"I TALKED to Gov. Briscoe in Austin . . . and he was surprised to learn that we were operating up here under an unregulated monopoly," King reported. "Ray Joe and I are scheduled to testify at hearings in Washington in June. We're going to attack this thing, and the association is going to have to have your dues to do it.
