build a new plant site south of the Red River. These lines will more firmly plays the part of Major Buford in link together 6,500,000 kilowatts of electric power generating capaof electric power generating capa-bility of the four companies into one of the nation's largest and strongest reservoirs of power. The four utility companies have a total of 27 steam-electric generating

> These projects will provide Texas with a super high - voltage "power highway," stretching some 800 miles from the Permian Basin through the Fort Worth-Dallas area to Houston and from the Fort Worth-Dallas area the Red River.

The new lines will benefit se vice users throughout a major portion of Texas, J. B. Thomas president and general manager of Texas Electric Service Company stated in making the announcement in Fort Worth.

Construction of the new supertransmission backbone-a 345,000 volt line extending from Houston to Fort Worth-Dallas area-wil begin in 1962.

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



Fruit with Cereal and Milk Adds Variety to Reducing-Diet Breakfast



Nutritionists recommend that dieters divide the day's caloric intake into three meals of equal size, starting with breakfast. A good breakfast is the key to successful weight-reduction plans. 400-Calorie Breakfast Corn Flakes (1 ounce) with Sliced Bananas,
Blueberries, or Apricots
Milk, nonfat, 15 cup for cereal
Toast, 1 slice, with Butter, 1 teaspoon
Milk, nonfat, 1 cup for beverage
Coffee, black

There are more than two dozen varieties of breakfast cereals, hot and ready to eat, both regular and pre-sweetened types, available at your grocery store. Fresh fruits will soon be in season in quantity. You will find that a breakfast planned according to a 400-calorie basic breakfast pattern is satisfying, inexpensive, and offers variety in your reducing dist.

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
