

Fish is easy to cook and can be prepared quickly. Fresh fish should not be stored longer than overnight, but should be used as soon as possible. If you use frozen fish, it is best to defrost it on a sheif in the refrigerator, Allow it to thaw enough so that the pieces can be separated easily. Fish is done the minute you can flake it easily with a fork or a toothpick. Be sure to avoid overcooking because this makes it dry and impairs the flavor. Flounder fillets are inexpensive but the following new recipe gives you a dish fit for a king.

FILLETS WITH ORANGE.

1 Thsp. prepared mustard 1 Thsp. L&P Worcestershire sauce fine dry bread crumbs

To the mustard, add Lea & Perrins Worcestershire and Tabasco, and stir well: Add crange juice and mix thoroughly. Add fillets and let stand 5 minutes. Then roll fillets in bread crumbs, coating them well. Saute in cil until golden brown (about 3 minutes on each side). Serve with a garnish of fresh parsiey and orange wedges.


