Let's Look At Ranger

This week we are taking a look at the Highway Committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

The Highway Committee is under the chairmanship of A. N. Larson and committee members are Emery Ford, Raymon Bryan. Buck Caraway, J. L. Jones, Morris Campbell and O. L. Cantrell.

The committee is set up for the purpose of dealing with any highway problems that may arise. Committee members are chosen from Chamber of Commerce members that are associated either in business or residence with the highway. This way the members are closer to the problems that might arise concerning the highway.

Prior to this year the only highway in the City limits was Highway 80, but now that the Highway Department has taken over the maintenance of Main Street, there are two more sections of highway inside

At a recent meeting of the Highway Committee, a highway problem, which is outside the city, but one that will be of benefit to Ranger, was discussed by the

The committee, upon checking area highway projects, found that the Highway Department in Stephens County plans to do some Farm to Market road work in the Ranger area.

Al Larson opened the meeting and since it was the first meeting held, most of the discussion was general. It was brought out that Stephens County was adding five or six miles to its Farm to Market roads from some point near Wayland or east of Wayland, almost to the Eastland County line, which would be of great benefit to Ranger if Eastland County could connect with it one mile west of Bullock. This would improve the school bus and postal routes. After discussing the proposal, it was suggested by R. P. Haun, resident engineer for the Highway Department, that the proposal should be taken up with the precinct commissioner and although the present two year Farm to Market paving program was already planned, it could be worked out for the future.

Haun then went over some of the plans on Highway 80 which he had with him and proved very enlightening. Stating that of course it was five years or more off in the making, but that Ranger would be in the best position of any city in the county, since it would be the only town in the county that would have three connections to it- one on the east, one on the west, and one on the south or in the middle. Also he said that it would be the first town west of Fort Worth to have this sort of setup. He also indicated that Highway 80, when opened would more than double in traffic and their estimate was from 4500
