

Let's Look At Ranger

(An Editorial)

Committeemen and committee chairmen of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce have you had a committee meeting this year to map out plans for projects to promote Ranger?

Three months of the year are almost gone and if your committee has not had a meeting—one fourth of the year has been wasted—as far as your committee is concerned.

To have an efficient Chamber of Commerce, 100 percent of its members and committees must be active and work for its promotion. At the present time the Ranger Chamber of Commerce has approximately 50 percent of its committees working on projects and only about 60 percent of the members of the active committees are taking part in the work being done by their committees. Can the Ranger Chamber of Commerce hope to be a progressive organization with this type of participation?

Let's review committee activities that have been reported to the Times to date.

The Sports and Recreation Committee with its chairman, Dr. W. P. Watkins and three of its seven committee members, James Townzen, Dwaine Dennis and Dick Henderson met and discussed plans for getting a running track built for the college and high school. Extensive planning has gone into this project and a definite report is due next week on beginning work on this project.

The Public Relations Committee, with almost 100 percent attendance, has held several meetings and outlined several projects which are now in progress. Committee chairman is C. B. Pruet, and six of its seven members have participated in the meetings. Its plans, of which some are well advanced, calls for the display of some of Ranger's products being placed in vacant store windows. SARCO and Social Science Laboratories have made attractive displays in the Joseph and Martin buildings. Also included in the plans were the building of several signs and replacing of the oil derrick. Progress is being made on these projects. Members of the committee who have participated in the meetings are: Dr. Ted Nicksick, Lester Crossley, Marjorie Maddocks, Dick Henderson, Mrs. J. B. Craig and Joe Dennis.

The Education and Youth Committee, with B. A. Tunnell as chairman, met with two of its three members, G. B. Rush and Eddie Jones present, and discussed plans to help promote a playing area at Young School and to help with the College Career Day.

The Highway Committee, with A. N. Larson as chairman, and one committee member, O. L. Cantrell, present, met and discussed the possibility of getting a Farm to Market Road out of Ranger to tie in with Farm to Market road work planned in Stephens County. Five members of this committee failed to show up for the meeting.

The Civic Committee, headed by Charles Milliken as chairman, met with three of its six members. Buck Wallace, Delbert Capps and Calvin Brown, present. The committee discussed plans to beautify the main street crossing. Water has been installed on each side of the crossing and the leveling and planting of grass and shrubbery is being held up awaiting development of the signs to be installed at this location.

The Agriculture and Livestock Committee has been working this week raising money to supplement the sale of Ranger youths livestock at the County Livestock Show sale. The committee also includes Olden livestock entries in the project. T. C. Wylie is chairman of the committee and members are R. V. Robinson, James Ratliff, Morris Newnam, B. S. Dudley Jr., and Ernen Haby.

The Special Committee on the National Guard with B. A. Tunnell as chairman has made plans to help the local Guard unit to promote a special open-house and program for Armed Services Day May 20. Members of this committee are Charles Milliken, D. C. Arterburn and J. E. Fletcher.

Several projects have been planned by the various committees mentioned. If all committees of the Chamber had projects underway there would be almost twice as much activity and twice as many results accomplished with the completion of the projects.

I Give You Texas

By BOYCE HOUSE

This tribute was written by Will Rogers to his sister: Today, as I write this, I am not in the Follies, the carefree comedian who jokes about everything. I am out in Oklahoma among my people, my Cherokee people, who don't expect a laugh for everything I say. Back home at the funeral of my sister.

She and my other sister started in this little western town—Chelsea, Oklahoma—some 35 years ago. They helped build the Methodist Church, the first church there. They have helped every movement that they knew was for the best upbuilding of their community. They have each raised a large family of boys and girls who are today a credit to their community. They have carried on the same as thousands of women have carried on in every small and big town in the world. They don't think they are doing anything out of the ordinary. They don't want credit. They do good simply because they don't know any other thing to do.

Death didn't scare her. It was only an episode in her life. If you live right, death is a joke to you as far as fear is concerned.

After all, there is nothing in the world like home. You can roam all over the world, but after all, it's what the people at home think of you that really counts. I have just today witnessed a funeral that for real sorrow and affection I don't think will ever be surpassed anywhere. They came in every mode of conveyance, on foot, in buggies, horseback, wagons, cars and trains and there wasn't a soul that came that she hadn't helped or favored at one time or another.

Some uninformed newspapers printed: "Mrs. C. L. Lane sister of the famous comedian, Will Rogers." They were greatly misinformed. It's the other way around. I am the brother of Mrs. C. L. Lane, "The Friend of Humanity." And all the honors that I could ever in my wildest dreams hope to reach, would never equal the honor paid on a little western prairie hilltop, among her people, to Maud Lane. If they will love me like that at the finish, my life will not have been in vain.

"Epidemiologists" are highly trained disease investigators. These investigators thoroughly scrutinize each link in chains of infection to insure that all persons in need of examination are placed under medical observation.

Investigation is aimed at persons who are the original source of infection as well as persons to whom the patient may have spread the infection. This service is made available through local health departments to public clinics and private physicians.

Today, State Health Department epidemiologists use long-distance telephone calls, enabling speedy intercity — even interstate — communication, via telephone, to trace down elusive cases which may move from area to area.

The lightning-fast results obtained from telephone calls, permits locating and curing infectious cases before further spread of the disease.
