New City Council Takes Over May 1



A total of 539 Ranger citizens turned out to the polls Tuesday and elected a new slate of City Officials for the next two years.

Voters elected Morris Newnam as Mayor. Newnam has been on the City Commission for the past two years as Finance Commissioner. He was opposed in the election by R. D. Jones.

In the only other contested race in the election, Joe Duskevich was re-elected as Street Commissioner. He was opposed in the election by W. M. Weber.

O. L. Cantrell and James Ratliff were re-elected unopposed to the Police and Fire and Water and Sanitation Commissioners. Ratliff will be filling his second full term. O. L. Cantrell completed the term of Marshal Angus, who moved to Coleman.

W. J. Spies, the only new member of the City Commission, was elected unopposed as Finance Commissioner. Spies led the ticket, getting a full 100 percent of the 539 votes cast.

The new slate of officers will take office May 1. W. F. Creager, who did not ask for re-election as Mayor, will swear in the new Mayor as he completes his final action after two full two-year terms as Mayor of Ranger. The new Mayor will swear in the Commissioners.

Fourth Annual Budding School Set for April 17

The fourth annual budding school has been set for April 17 at the Cisco Junior College. It was reported by Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper who will instruct those attending the one day affair.

"We are happy again to have the budding school here and are more than glad to cooperate," said A. Z. Myrick, chairman of the Agricultural Committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, who is sponsoring the school along with the Agricultural Extension Service.

The school has been moved from the Chamber of Commerce offices to the college where we

will have more room for those attending," Myrick concluded.

The school will begin on the above date at 9:30 o'clock in a room at the college. Where, when and how to bud, types of budwood, forcing the buds and other demonstrations and talks will be given by Cooper at the morning session. The afternoon part of the program will be on the Kent Word farm three miles south of Cisco in the Leon River bottom where the group will get a chance to practice budding.

A limited amount of cold storage budwood will be available to those desiring it. Varieties of pecan budwood now on cold storage include the two new varieties, Comanche and Choctaw and the Western Schley.

There is no charge for the school. Those interested are invited to attend the county agent said.

Three Towns Hit In Operation 'Dry-Up'

Eastland County law enforcement officers, strengthened by state Liquor Control Agents, carried off a series of liquor raids in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco Wednesday and by 2 a.m. today 10 cases had been filed in county court.

Sheriff's officers, city police in the three towns and Liquor Control Agents joined hand in the raids. Eastland was the heaviest hit town in the county.

Additional charges may be filed today.

Seven persons were charged with selling liquor in a dry area. They are Georgia Lee McKella, Jack Denison, Johnnie Jones, Gaudalope Castero, E. J. McKellor and Gus Orman.

Teenage League Organized, Boys Start Practice

Representatives of the Ranger Teenage baseball program met in Eastland Tuesday night and helped form a new Teenage League.

The League will consist of two teams from Eastland, one from Ranger and one from Carbon.

Teams will be made up of boys from 13 through 15 years of age and will operate under a franchise with the Texas Teenage League.

Randall Hoover, manager of the local team has called for a work night at the local park for Monday night at 6 p.m. All boys eligible for the league and parents interested in the league are urged to attend the meeting and help get the park in shape for the season. Practice will begin at 6 p.m. Tuesday.

League play will begin June 2 and league games will be played on Tuesday and Friday nights. Ranger will open the league play with Carbon at the Ranger park. All Ranger games will be played at their home park. All games will start not later than 7:30 p.m. and no inning can begin later than 10:15 p.m.

League teams can have practice games with teams not in their league prior to the season opening, but after league play starts they cannot play outside games.

C. of C. Directors To Be Elected by Membership Vote

The Chamber of Commerce operates under a provision of the City Charter and an ordinance pertaining to the selection of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce states that directors will be appointed by the City Commission from a list of three names for each director to be appointed, which is submitted by the Chamber of Commerce.

This ordinance has been changed and a new ordinance put in its place which will give the Chamber of Commerce the authority to elect their directors by a vote of the members.

The Chamber of Commerce will not act immediately on the new ordinance. They will, at their next meeting, set up their own by-laws pertaining to the election of directors.

Two new directors are due to be appointed for the Chamber of Commerce and they will be selected in the old manner. They will be directors to replace D. C. Arterburn and W. J. Spies, who have resigned.

next year, having league competition in football, basketball and track.

Ranger will enter approximately 20 junior high seventh and eighth graders in the track meet. There is expected to be from 75 to 100 athletes entered in the competition in the district meet of the League. The events will begin at 1 p.m. Friday at the Cisco track.

Events that Ranger athletes will be entered in will be the 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash, and 220 yard dash. Two relay events, the 440 yard relay and the 880 yard relay, will also be run. Three field events will include the 8 pound shot put, the high jump and the broad jump.

The following week the junior high athletes will join the freshmen in the 7-AA district track meet to be held at Winters on Thursday, April 13.

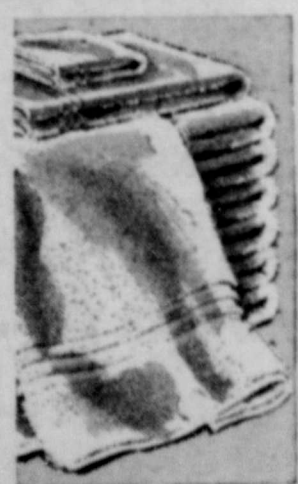

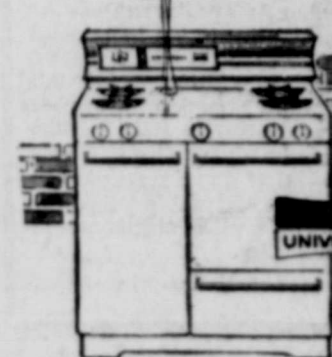

This is about 1700 years too late to be the gospel of Christ. Could it, as did Mr. Wesley, become the founder of still another gospel? Yes. But could my gospel save? No. And neither could Mr. Wesley's. The scriptures teach this, "But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed." (Gal. 1:8). All that are not saved by Christ's gospel will be lost. All that are displeased with the gospel of Christ and have "founded" and preached another have the curse of heaven on them. Now if the founder of another gospel is accursed, and he is, (Gal. 1:8-9) will not those that have believed and accepted another gospel also be accursed? And can you imagine God calling men to preach another gospel, as many declare to be so, that they would be accursed for? The gospel was preached and wrote in the New Testament by the Apostles and Prophets (Eph. 1:1-5). Now would this gospel have saved Mr. Wesley? It would have. So why the need of another? Will Christ's gospel save today? It will. Is it the same today as in the days of the apostles? It is, and it will never change (1 Pe. 1:25). This same gospel of Christ is preached at the Eastside church of Christ. You have a special invitation to visit with us to hear for yourself. A Gospel Meeting is now in progress and will continue through Sunday.
