2. Ranger—No. 1 team total 454.

3. Odessa—No. 1 team total 455.

4. Amarillo—No. 2 team total 463.

5. Ranger—No. 2 team total 469.

The Ranger team winning second place was composed of Billy Wiggs and Tommy Warford. The Ranger team ranking sixth was composed of Bob Thomson and Larry Richter.

The 54-hole total medalist honors went to Billy Wiggs of Ranger College. This honor goes to the golfer who has the lowest score.

Wiggs' total was 216. Bob Thomson, another Ranger, won fifth place medalist honors with a total of 227. The first five in medalist competition finished up in this order:

1. Billy Wiggs, Ranger, 216.

2. Billy Henderson, Amarillo, 219.

3. Marvin Dick, Amarillo, 222.

4. Charles Meisner, Odessa, 224.

5. Bob Thomson, Ranger, 227.
