Opening Postponed One Week

Little League Starts May 8

An Eastland County Pioneer, W. B. Starr, of Cicco, was recently honored in the State House of Representatives with a resolution honoring him in his contributions to the State of Texas.

The Resolution follows: Whereas, the Texas Legislature recognizes an outstanding and loyal citizen, W. B. Starr of Cicco, whose life of resourcefulness has been recognized by the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association of which he was a founder, and all the good peanut growers of Texas, in that the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station superintendent, D. C. Langley, has named a new variety of peanut, the Starr Spanish Peanut in his honor, and Whereas, W. B. Starr is esteemed and beloved by many farm groups because of his cooperative interest in all facets of agriculture. The people of Eastland County respect his pioneering in peanut growing so that every peanut farmer may now be successful in this area; and

WHEREAS, He celebrated his eighty-third birthday on April 17, 1961. He was born in the year 1878. He married Elizabeth Jeffries on August 6, 1903. They have lived on their farm near Cicco since 1904; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the House of Representatives of the Fifty-seventh Legislature congratulate W. B. Starr on his life of creative service and stands in humble appreciation of his wonderful contributions to the State of Texas.

R. C. Delta Tau Chapter Organized 16 Years Ago

The Delta Tau Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa of Ranger Junior College is sixteen years old. The chapter received its charter and was organized Feb. 17, 1946. Dr. Madge Davis, head of the English Department of Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, brought to Ranger Junior College several members of the national chapter of the junior college division of Midwestern in order to initiate the local members that formed the nucleus of the new chapter.

Those initiated as the first Delta Tau members included the following: Calla Mae Deaton, Ethleen Dunlap, Marie Green, Kathryn Britton, Roma Jewel Parker, Anita Walker, Mary Joy Wilson, Eunice Yancey, Jo Oyler, Cattie Woods, and Anna McEyer. Miss Wilson later became a teacher in Ranger Junior High School; Miss McEyer, who later became business administration instructor of the college, teaches business courses in Ranger High School at present; and Mrs. Kathryn Britton Gibson, who became Ranger College librarian, is now a librarian in the Odessa Public Schools. Sponsor of the original group was Miss Mary Virginia Williams.

Phi Theta Kappa is a recognized honorary scholarship society whose object is to promote scholarship, to develop character, and to cultivate fellowship among the students of both sexes in the junior colleges of the United States. Some of the requirements for membership, which are set up by the national organization, are as follows:

1. A student must be regularly enrolled in a junior college.
 2. A regularly enrolled student must be carrying at least 15 hours of work per week.
 3. The student must be of good moral character and of the upper scholastic ten per cent of the students enrolled in the college.
 4. Eligibility shall be based on the average of all the college work done by the student in the college division previous to election to membership.
 5. To maintain active membership the student must maintain a 2.0 grade point average.
- Eligibility of students is determined and approved by the faculty of Ranger Junior College. To be eligible, first-term freshmen must have a 2.5 grade point average on fifteen hours of work. Second-term freshmen and sophomores are admitted on a 2.2 grade point average.

Some Campaign Funds Deductible On Income Tax

District Director Campbell announced good news today for certain candidates for public office. District Director Campbell stated that IRS has ruled that filing fees paid by candidates to the county or state executive committee required by Article 13.15 of the Texas Election Code are deductible on tax returns filed for years prior to 1961.

The Director said that the IRS issued Revenue Ruling 57-345 in 1957 permitting the deduction of filing fees paid by candidates for an elective office as required by the New Mexico State Statutes. The IRS National Office has now advised that the fees required by the Texas law are similar to those in New Mexico and that the 1957 ruling is applicable to candidates in Texas. However, in December 1960 Revenue Ruling No. 60-366 was published which prohibits the deduction of filing fees required to be paid by all states for years beginning on or before Jan. 1, 1961.

The 1967 ruling has now been revoked but the filing fees will be allowable as deductions for years prior to 1961.

Campbell said that taxpayers who have paid filing fees required by the Texas Election Code should file claims for refund on forms 843 or amended tax returns for years on which the statute of limitations has not expired. Generally the earliest year not barred by the statute of limitations will be 1958. The deduction for filing fees is not a trade or business expense and therefore it is deductible only on page 2 of form 1040 provided the taxpayer does not use the standard deduction on tax table in computing his tax.

The Director further stated that the amount of the deduction for filing fees would be limited to payments made by the candidate from his personal funds which were not reimbursed by campaign contributions received by him.

Campbell cautioned that the filing fees required by the State of Texas is the only campaign expenditure which is allowable as a deduction for 1961 or later years, and that filing fees which may be required by municipalities or other political subdivisions not covered by Article 13.15 of the Texas Election Code do not constitute allowable deductions.

Anderson, Chairman of the Career Day Committee. For a girl to be eligible for queen, her high school had to be 100 per cent in attendance at Career Day. Desdemona, Strawn, and Gordon High Schools were represented by their senior class. Seniors were also here from Olden, Breckenridge, and Ranger High Schools.

The group assembled in the college auditorium at 9:30 a.m. for their first meeting. Rev. Ralph E. Perkins gave the invocation, and Dr. Theodore Nickisek Jr., welcomed the students. Dr. Charles C. Williams, Assistant Dean of the School of Education, North Texas State College, gave the keynote address. Dr. Williams stressed the importance of choosing the type of work that one is to follow, because what one chooses to do in life determines one's friends, the part of town in which one will live, even the town and the size of town, one's financial future, and one's happiness. He also pointed out that it is vital as far as happiness in one's profession is concerned to choose work with which one can be happy and which one can put oneself into rather than just a job.

After a film, "America's Rising New Giant," the students attended group conferences until noon. Lunch was served in the college cafeteria to all visiting seniors, sponsors, and speaker-consultants. The afternoon was devoted to additional conferences with experts in various fields.

Anderson reported that the day was a success. Interesting among students was keen, and conferences proved interesting and valuable.

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County Farmers Asked to Attend Farm Meeting

Texas Farmers Union President Alex Dickie Jr. has given Eastland County farmers a cordial invitation to attend a meeting to be held Monday April 24 at 5 p.m. in the DeLeon city hall.

Dickie stated that Farmers Union has just welcomed a vigorous young county unit in Comanche County into its state organization. It is felt that the good response from Comanche County farmers results to a large measure as appreciation for the role of Farmers Union in helping obtain increased peanut price supports of \$28.75 per ton for 1961, he said.

Dickie emphasized the fact that Eastland County farmers interested in learning about Farmers Union philosophy ought to take advantage of the opportunity to attend the DeLeon meeting Monday. Plans are being made to organize an Eastland County Unit at a later date. Several Eastland County farmers have already joined the group in Comanche County and have voiced enthusiastic relative to getting the program underway in Eastland County. Assisting Dickie in Monday's program will be Richard Alexander, state secretary for Texas Farmers Union.

The Administration's proposed Omnibus Farm Bill which Congress is currently considering will be discussed. This bill is supported by the National Farmers Union. Under this bill, if passed, peanut producers will be expected to formulate an improved peanut program which will increase income to producers and make for a sound defensible program.

When Water Won't Wash

Did you ever try to wash greasy, dirty hands with clear water? No, it just won't work, you must have a cleaning agent with the water to get the dirt and grease off.

Being baptized in water just will not wash the dirt (or sin) in one's life from our lives. We must have something with more cleansing power. Being baptized in water doesn't change our sinful nature, only the blood of Christ can do that.

Folks, something is wrong. I am afraid we are failing not only our God but our children also. Water is wonderful but water alone just won't do. Young Timothy was taught the scripture by parents and grand parents. Folks if we fail God and our children, all the water in the world just won't work.

Timothy not only knew the scripture but the spirit of God and a spiritual life. Let us not wait until we stand at Judgment to learn the lesson. When water won't wash we should now have our hearts, soul, mind washed by the blood of Christ and our lives without spot or wrinkle or any such thing for this is the type of people Christ is coming for.

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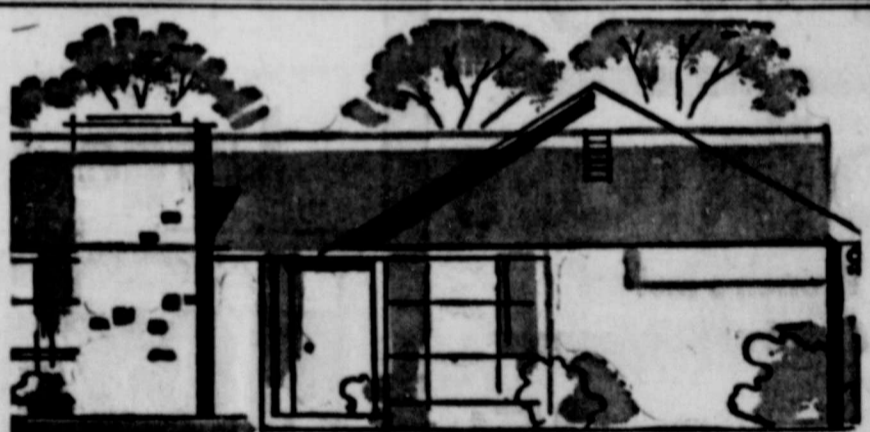
