Highway Dept. Lists State Events Calendar
State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer announced today that the summer edition of the Texas Calendar of Events—a Highway Department pamphlet listing tourist-attracting events throughout the state—is now ready for distribution.
Free copies of the Calendar of Events may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Travel Division, P. O. Box 5064, Austin.
Greer said that publication of the Calendar was another Highway Department endeavor to stimulate travel to and within Texas.
"The Highway Department has been given the responsibility of the tourist-advertising and travel-promotion program. For national media-advertising of Texas tourist attractions we have requested a legislative appropriation of \$300,000. With this media-advertising backing we can encourage out-of-state tourists to visit Texas—see the colorful events held here and the attractions we have to offer," Greer said.
The Calendar lists Texas events of interest from April through September and was compiled in cooperation with the Texas Chambers of Commerce.

Anglers Given Reminder About Fishing Permits
This is the time of the year when many fishermen get caught without licenses, according to Capt. E. M. Sprott, director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.
In the arrest report for the month of March, there were 111 persons who were arrested for fishing without first buying the regular \$2.15 license required. This license is required for all persons between the ages of 17 and 65, who fish outside their home county, or who fish with any type of winding device, such as rod and reel, regardless of where they fish. The \$2.15 license applies to residents and non-residents alike. It can be bought in practically all sporting goods stores and many other places through the State.
Game wardens also arrested 27 night hunters during the same period of time. Although several were arrested for netting violations, no arrests were made during the month for "telephoning" fish. In all, there were 245 arrests which netted fines and court costs of \$5,929.40.
The law enforcement director warned that with the approaching summer months, all fishermen should be careful to have their required licenses. While persons over 65 years of age are not required to have a license, there is exemption certificate available for the aging, and it is good to have one of these in possession because it properly establishes the age when the fisherman is checked by a game warden.

Car Crashes Into House, Woman Is Hospitalized
An Eastland woman was hospitalized Monday afternoon after the automobile she was driving crashed into a house.
Mrs. Edie Hurt's condition was not believed to be serious. She was admitted to Eastland Memorial Hospital following the accident, however.
Her late model Chevrolet crashed into the Emmett Powell home, 106 East Valley. Mrs. Hurt apparently blacked out. Her car, which was traveling east, veered across the street and into the Powell's living room.
Mrs. Powell was standing about five feet away from where the car came to a halt in the living room. She was not injured. Damage to the car was not believed to be heavy, but the front wall of the house was smashed open and some furniture was damaged.

National Merit Scholarship Program Explained

A new experimental dimension has been added to the National Merit Scholarship Program, John M. Stalnaker, president, has announced.

He said 85 special four-year National Merit Scholarships will be awarded this month out of the Merit Corporation's own resources. They will cost NMSC somewhat more than \$400,000 for the period they are in force, he stated.

The special National Merit Scholarships will be of four types:

1. For students whose records suggest promise for exceptional creative performance, 25 scholarships.

2. For students of marked academic ability who also have demonstrated an exceptionally determined effort to overcome severe financial or similar disadvantages, 20 scholarships.

3. For students who, while showing superior attainment and promise in one field, are not as distinguished in many fields as the typical National Merit Scholar, 20 scholarships.

4. For students who have shown an ability to depart from the traditional academic time pattern by entering college, with the approval of their secondary schools, with less than the full four years of secondary school education, 20 scholarships.

The recipients will be among the Merit Scholars to be announced on April 26, Mr. Stalnaker said, and all have been selected from among the Finalist group in the current competition.

However, he added, the particular students receiving these awards for obvious reasons, will not be individually identified—either to the public or to the recipients—as holders of the special scholarships in the experimental program.

Additional funds to finance the special scholarships were authorized by NMSC's board of directors at its last meeting. Many of the students to be offered these scholarships were chosen with the aid of the National Merit Scholarship Selection Committee, a group of educators who met last January to name National Merit Scholars.

"This experimental program results from three considerations," Mr. Stalnaker said. "We wished to apply the findings of research, to incorporate the lessons of experience, and to strengthen certain aspects of the Merit Program in ways not previously possible."

"It is likely that the results of this practical experiment will lead to further improvements in the Merit Program. But this is not our only goal."

"We hope too that the findings will in time have a value for all persons and organizations concerned with the discovery and development of the nation's talented young people."

The Merit Program's research studies and the studies of others have shown that among very superior students, like the Merit Finalists, scholastic achievement has little relationship to creative performance, Mr. Stalnaker pointed out. Similarly, he said, the traditional measures of scholastic aptitude are of little or no value for predicting creativity within the very superior group.

National Merit studies in this area began in 1958. The findings led to efforts to devise an experimental method to obtain some indication of a student's creative performance and potential. The work was conducted during 1959

and 1960. The results led to asking for various kinds of additional information from the Semifinalists in the current competition.

It was on the basis of information obtained in this way—a third through information provided by school counselors or principals—that the special awards in the first category were made, he stated.

"We shall of course follow the progress of all students who are in each of the four categories of this experimental program, and report the findings at each stage in their development."
