A landowner may, without liabity, cut off at his boundary line he branches and limbs of trees growing on neighboring premise Such overhanging branches are effect a nuisance which the adj ning landowner may prevent b moving them. However, he nited strictly to removal of over anging branches and if he cut beyond the boundry line, he emmitting a trespass upon h ighbor's property and may be l

ble for damages. If you desire to cut off the over anging branches of a neighbor's ree, you are not required to give otice unless you have in some wa uraged the continuance of the ingerous condition.

What if neither party cuts off he overhanging limbs and one falls injuring a person or damaging property? Who is responsible vner could have cut off that part of the tree protruding over

for falling to do so. He has no duty to cut off protruding limbs although he has a right to cut them if he so chooses

The owner of the land upon which the trees, stands, however, does have a duty to remove branches and limbs when it become apparent to him, or he should reasonably know, that they are in a dangerous condition. 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

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

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
