



TELEPHONES OF THE FUTURE

The other day I was having lunch with some friends and we got to talking about how much the telephone has changed in the last few years. We talked about the de-velopment of color phines, wall phones and the latest

one — the Princess, the first compact phone.

This conversation reminded me of some of the ideas for new kinds of telephones and communications services we're working on now. Some of these ideas will never leave the drawing board. Others will fall by the wayside during the test stage. And some, of course, will be succes-

sful — and will eventually be available for your use.

For instance, there's the 'dia-in-hand' phone. It has the dial in the receiver. You lift the receiver, hold it in your hand, and dial. The dial lights up when you lift the
