ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

AUSTIN—Accidents killed 93,000 Americans last year—including more than 5,200 Texans. How many of those people died because they were "accident prone?"

There is no way of knowing, of course. "Accident prone" is a phrase coined by the experts—psychologists, industry men and others on the theory that many accidents result from the victims' emotional make-up.

Studies by agencies interested in health and safety have shown that relatively few people are responsible for a high percentage of accidents. Conclusion: a person who has had one accident is more likely to be involved in another one than a person who has had none at all.

State Health Department studies confirm this. For example: An industrial firm tries to reduce accident rates among equipment operators by ordering a painstaking investigation into every mishap. Everything from shop environment to operator reaction time is checked.

The accidents continue despite an intensive educational campaign. But when the operators with bad records are transferred to other jobs, accidents involving heavy equipment fall to one-fifth of the former rate.

The transferred operators? They keep on having accidents on their new jobs and at home.

The experts have traced definite personality patterns among accident-prone people. Almost invariably they are impetuous, following impulses without deliberation or planning. Their decisiveness is, in reality, a drive for independence and self-reliance.

For the most part, investigators have found they have a history of neurotic traits in childhood. They simply reach a point, in their failure to handle an emotional situation, when an unpleasant happening becomes a physical and emotional necessity.

Result: an "accident."

But while admitting that such a thing as accident proneness exists, Texas health officials still prefer to stress environmental hazards and biological conditions such as fatigue, temporary stress-produced inattention, impaired vision or hearing or under-lying disease as the major culprit in accidents.

Too much emphasis on accident proneness, they feel, tends to obscure the need for correcting defects in industrial equipment, slum housing, inefficient traffic systems and inadequate playgrounds. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

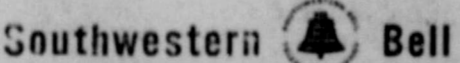
