### Sunday Devotional

Recent Trends

Pastor New Hope Baptist Church No. 3  
Recent moral trends in America are alarming. It is reported that the United States is second to France in the number of alcoholics per one-thousand. If this is true then someone has failed to give us the proper moral and spiritual qualities to be a strong nation.  
Who is to blame? Have our ministers failed to proclaim a high ethical standard through Bible centered preaching? Can it be that the Sunday Bible school is ineffective? Is the school system to blame for the moral standard that exists in the land?  
I do not believe that the ministers or the schools have failed. The problem then is somewhere else. I think that President Kennedy gave a correct answer to be questioned, "What do you propose to do about the juvenile problem?" when he said, "The government cannot do what homes have failed to do."  
If we are to deal effectively with moral decay we must come to a fresh understanding of the fact that the home was God's first institution in the creative plan. The home has an important function and responsibility.  
The formative years from birth to six are more important than we have previously recognized. These are important years in physical, moral, and spiritual growth.  
A juvenile worker on the court level has said recently, "It doesn't matter much what you teach a child at church, if it isn't reinforced in the home." How true that is!  
Some have correctly attributed our moral decay to what they call "environmental religion", that is we limit our praying and praise to the church building. Such religion never reaches out into all areas of life. It never reaches back into the home. It never goes with you to the hospital in the time of deep need. Environmental religion never helps influence life-choices and decisions.  
If I have pointed out a problem, what basic strategy should we follow to solve it. Any suggestion here would either be too simple or too complex but a good rule of thumb is: Love them, limit them, and help them to achieve.  
"And that from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Jesus Christ. All scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness."—II Tim. 3:16,16.

## Federal Wage-Hour Law Amendments Highlighted

Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Labor Department's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions in Dallas, urges Texas employers to give thought and submit questions now on the Fair Labor Standards Amendments of 1961, so they will be ready to come into compliance by next Sept. 3, when these amendments to the Federal Wage and Hour Law become effective.

According to Rogers, the major provisions of the amendments are:  
1. An increase in the minimum hourly wage from the present \$1 to \$1.15, as of Sept. 3, and two years later, to \$1.25, for employees already covered by the Fair Labor Standards Act. The Act applies, and will continue to apply, to employees engaged in interstate commerce or the production of goods for interstate commerce, unless specifically exempt.  
2. Extension of the Act's coverage to all employees of large enterprises with over \$1,000,000 annual sales volume engaged in interstate commerce or the production of goods for interstate commerce. Most of these are in the retail or service trades. Also included are gasoline service stations with annual sales of over \$250,000, local or interurban transit systems, and construction enterprises. In addition, coverage will apply to any other enterprise which has employees engaged in commerce or production of goods for commerce, that has a sales volume over \$1 million a year.

3. Newly covered employees will be due minimum wage pay of at least \$1 an hour, for three years beginning Sept. 3. The fourth year, their minimum will be \$1.15 and the fifth, \$1.25.  
Rogers added that the Act's overtime pay provisions, which require not less than time and one-half the employee's regular rate for all hours worked over 40 a week, continue to be applicable to workers who are already covered and non-exempt.  
For newly covered workers, unless specifically exempt, time and one-half will be due for hours worked beyond 44 a week, beginning Sept. 3, 1963; beyond 42 a week, a year later; and after 40 a week in 1965.

Referring to the newly protected workers, Rogers said coverage extends to all employees of an enterprise which has one or more retail or service establishments with a gross annual sales volume over \$1 million, provided it purchases or receives at least \$250,000 in goods for resale which move or have moved across State lines. If, however, an establishment of a retail chain has annual sales of \$1 million or more, the coverage extends to all employees of the chain.

Such establishments as hotels, motels, restaurants, hospitals, motels, and a few other service establishments, as well as "mom and pop" stores, continue to be exempt. There is also a minimum wage and overtime exemption for any retail or service firm primarily engaged in selling autos, trucks or farm implements. Rogers added that an exemption now applicable to retail or service establishments will continue in effect for such enterprises with less than \$1 million annual sales.  
As to gasoline service stations, their employees will be due minimum wage pay, but are exempt from overtime, if the station has an annual gross volume of sales amounting to at least \$250,000.

Also exempt from overtime, but due minimum wage pay for the first time, will be employees of any local or interurban transit system which does at least \$1 million in business annually.  
Another newly covered category includes any construction or reconstruction enterprise with an annual volume of business amounting to \$350,000 or more. The final extension of new coverage includes any establishment of any other kind of enterprise, which has employees engaged in commerce or production of goods for commerce, if the enterprise's annual volume of sales is not less than \$1 million.

Rogers also said that the 1961 Amendments eliminate or modify some exemptions contained in the current Act. For instance, seamen and employees of seafood processors will be entitled to minimum wage pay. Most switchboard operators will be subject to both minimum wage and overtime pay provisions, but those employed by an independently owned public telephone company with less than 750 stations are excluded.

Rogers invited employers and workers to contact the Division's local offices if they have any questions about the amended Act. In Texas such offices are located in Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth, El Paso, and San Antonio.

## I Give You Texas

A mob was clamoring at the gate of a walled county jail. The sheriff covered in the jailer's office shades pulled down. Suddenly, the silence in the room was broken by the ringing of the telephone. "Don't answer that!" the sheriff said. He was completely unable to deal with the crisis so the chief of police went out and I went with him, just the two of us—one really, because I didn't count) and he confronted the angry hundreds, persuaded them to send in a committee to see that the prisoner they sought was not there; and, after the inspection had been completed, the mob dispersed.

Then there was the time that a street car conductor had been wounded seriously. He had returned the fire and either the assailant or his companion was shot. The two were in the darkness and he told me that he did not know which one had wounded him.

The man he had shot was taken to the hospital. A mob of 150 or more gathered on the grounds and a group went in and brought the suspect out on a cot. They had him under a tree and someone had a rope when four officers and a reporter arrived. "Just a minute, men!" I yelled. Then after repeating the statement of the wounded conductor, I said, "This

may not be the one. If you take the life of an innocent man, you will always be sorry." The men desisted and the wounded suspect was taken back to the hospital ward. Let us hasten to say that my action took no courage because Captain Mike Kehoe was there—and he was equal to a regiment.

I have made many speeches but they were planned ahead of time. Occasionally an idea comes, a phrase occurs, a joke materializes while I'm on my feet but if I relied upon "the inspiration of the moment," there would be no speech.

Consequently I admire this facility in others. Years ago, a lawyer, Frank Jenkins, lived in Eastland. He was an excellent speaker. One night he was going to introduce a candidate and I asked him that afternoon what he was going to say. He replied that he hadn't the faintest idea, but he would just say what came to mind. (His speech was good, too.)

Judge Julien C. Hyer of Dallas, formerly of Fort Worth, is another fluent, ready speaker. He was going to discuss a number of campaign issues back in the 1930's in an address in Weatherford but when he reached the subject of the soldier bonus, he found the audience so receptive that he devoted all the rest of his remarks to that theme.
