June Is Dairy Month for 25th Year Observed

June is Dairy Month. This year the observance takes on added significance, said A. M. Meekins, extension dairy specialist, for a 25th birthday is to be celebrated.

He said Texans are happy to have a part in the nationwide tribute to the dairy industry. During the past 25 years, June has been a time of recognition by the nation of the industry's vital contribution to America's economy and the health of her citizens.

June is the month when milk production reaches a peak and the industry makes its greatest effort to tell its story and promote the use of its products. The observance is actively supported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and hundreds of special events are staged to make dairymen better known to the public they serve, Meekins said.

During the month, he added, food editors, nutritionists and others concerned with the diets of Americans are called upon to discuss "nature's most nearly perfect food" and its rightful place in the diet. Many special events planned for Texans will feature such discussions, the specialist said.

Troy E. Kern, a Delta county dairymen, is Texas chairman for June Dairy Month activities. He is a director of the North Texas Producers Association, the American Dairy Association of Texas and of the National A.D.A.

Kern and Meekins said emphasis will be placed on the fact that the industry is a vital part of the state's economy and that the industry is a source of pride and responsibility since then.

The DPS Story, 25 Years Of Service to Texas

(Editor's Note: Following is the first of a series of articles appearing in this newspaper detailing the evolution and organization of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the numerous vital services this agency provides for the people of Texas.)

The Texas Department of Public Safety on Aug. 10, 1936, rounded out a quartercentury of service and protection for the people of Texas in an era of trial and transition during which the present-day concept of law enforcement evolved.

Since its inception over 25 years ago, the department has become recognized as one of the most respected organizations of its kind in the nation.

The department was created by the legislature on Aug. 10, 1915, at a time when it was realized that the state's part in crime prevention and traffic control was inadequate and improperly organized.

A meager Highway Patrol at that time was under the jurisdiction of the State Highway Department, and the only existing state police force for criminal activity was the Texas Rangers, then under the supervision of the Adjutant General.

These two formed the nucleus of the department as it exists today, although it has been given many and varied duties and responsibilities since then.

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Consolidation School Bill Is Signed by Daniel

Gov. Price Daniel has signed into law the bill which will enable Eastland County voters to vote on an incentive aid school consolidation plan.

Dr. James Whittington, of Eastland, head of the special school study group, received the following telegram Wednesday from Gov. Daniel: "Senate Bill 80 signed into law today. Best wishes in your campaign for Eastland County to be the first to move towards consolidation for better education through the voluntary incentive aid plan as provided by the new law."

The bill will allow consolidation of districts without loss of state money for a 10 year period. It is mandatory that citizens of each district which consolidates must vote for consolidation.

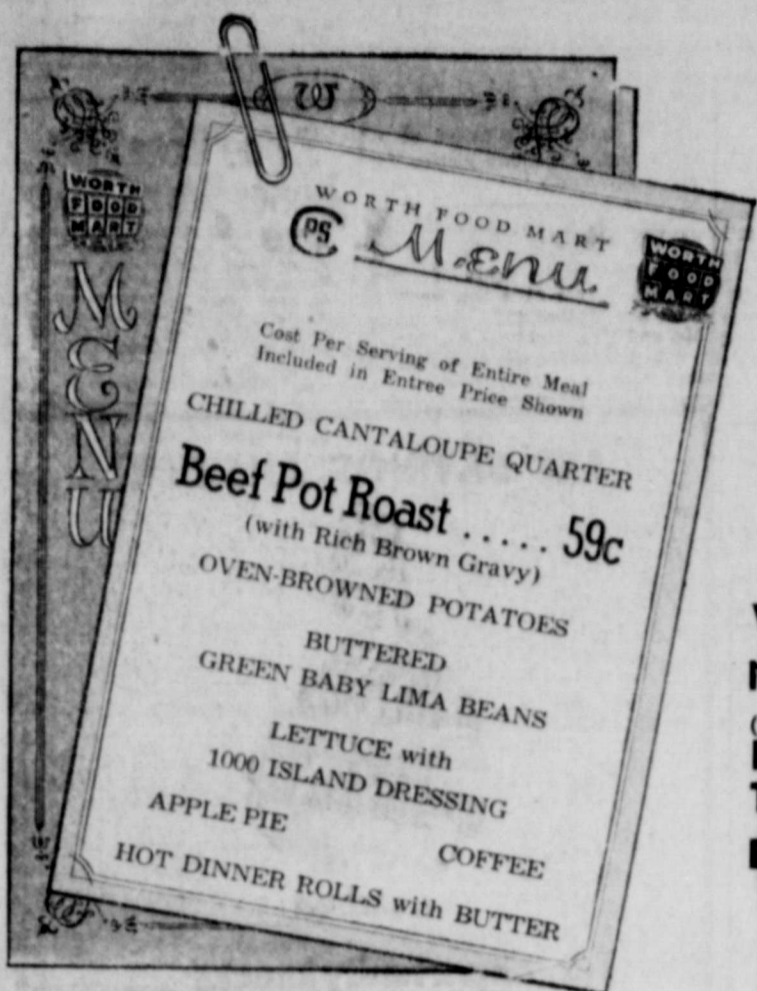

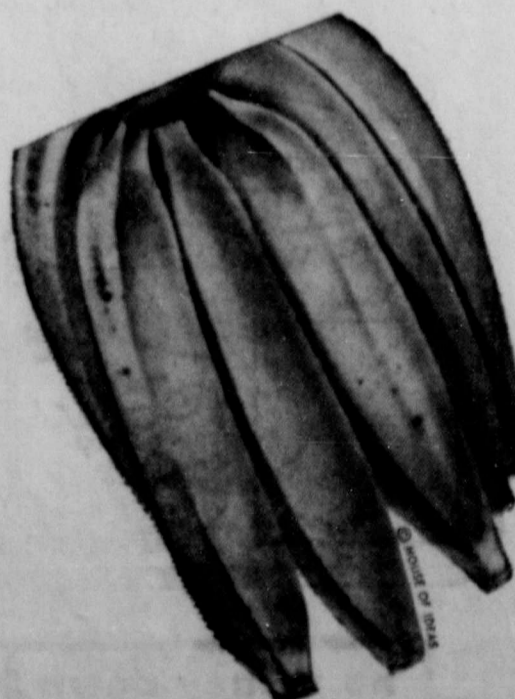

AUSTIN REPORT

By SCOTT BAILEY
REP. OF 76th DISTRICT

The regular session of the 57th Legislature ended Monday, May 29. In reviewing your Representative's Legislative program during the 57th Session, I would like to submit a brief summary of some of the measures I have introduced and their disposition:

1. House Bill 330. This bill relates to the investment procedure as authorized in the Texas Probate Code. House Bill 330 was referred to the House Judiciary Committee. From there, it went to a Sub-Committee, which reported it favorably. At that time, the Senate had passed Senate Bill No. 38, which embodied the same procedure as House Bill 330. In order to expedite this bill's legislative route, I moved to substitute Senate Bill 38 for House Bill 330. I was able to gain passage of this measure and it is now Texas Law. Under the terms of this act, trustees may invest a minor's excess funds in Federally insured savings accounts. This law will be of real benefit to the smaller towns and cities, where other types of investments are not available.

2. House Bill 503. This measure, which passed the House of Representatives last week, will allow the State Parks Board to contract with local units of Government for the operation of park facilities. This was a much needed provision and was recommended by the Texas Research League. It is now pending in the Texas Senate.

3. House Bill 900. This measure would save the State Available School Fund about \$500,000 a year, by reallocating the per capita funds that now go to wealthy 'budget balanced' school districts. I was able to embody this proposal in House Bill 334, and secured final passage in the House of Representatives. The Texas Senate has now deleted this feature from House Bill 334, however.

4. House Bill 709. This measure is a reorganization proposal which would place the executive director of the Game and Fish Commission under the Constitutional Oath of Office. It also requires that he be bonded. The Committee on Game and Fisheries has okayed this measure and I hope to gain final passage of it this week.

5. House Concurrent Resolution No. 38. After considerable delay in getting this measure approved by the Rules Committee, it was passed by the House of Representatives, has now cleared the Senate and been signed by the Governor. This proposal granted permission to the Veterans of World War One to erect a monument on the Capitol grounds. This monument will be subject to the approval of the Board of Control and will be erected at no cost to the State. A number of World War One Veterans came to Austin for the formal signing ceremony of this resolution.

I have listed the successful measures that I have sponsored; now I will list some that have been, so far, unsuccessful:

6. House Bill 615. This measure sought to clarify the Title Limitations Law in Texas. It was referred to the Judiciary Committee and from there to a Sub-Committee which has yet to take any action.

7. House Joint Resolution 65. This is a proposed Constitutional Amendment which would divert the two per cent ad valorem tax money which was formerly used for Confederate pensions, into a fund to be used for the relief of needy and destitute aging veterans and their widows. At present this money is being spent to erect large, luxurious office buildings near the Capitol grounds. HJR No. 65 was referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments and after a public hearing was referred to an unfavorable Sub-Committee, which has yet to take any action at all.

8. House Bill 513. This bill was one of the Uniform Law Enforcement Acts, which was designed to curb the lost and found reward racket carried on in connection with the theft of dogs. After introducing this bill, it was learned that the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee in the Senate had favorably reported a similar bill and thereby making it unnecessary to proceed further with House Bill 513.

As you probably know, most of the real work of the Legislative process is done in Committees and in Sub-Committees. In serving on five House Committees, which met regularly, I was able to gain valuable knowledge and experience in a broad area of State Government.

The office of State Representative has been challenging and highly rewarding in its experience. I would like to extend my personal thanks to all the people who have been kind enough to contact and advise me during some of these very trying hours in the Legislature. My heartfelt commendations are extended to the newspapers and radio stations, for their cooperation in helping me to better serve the good people of West Central Texas.

The 18-year-old soldier is a 1960 graduate of Olden High School.

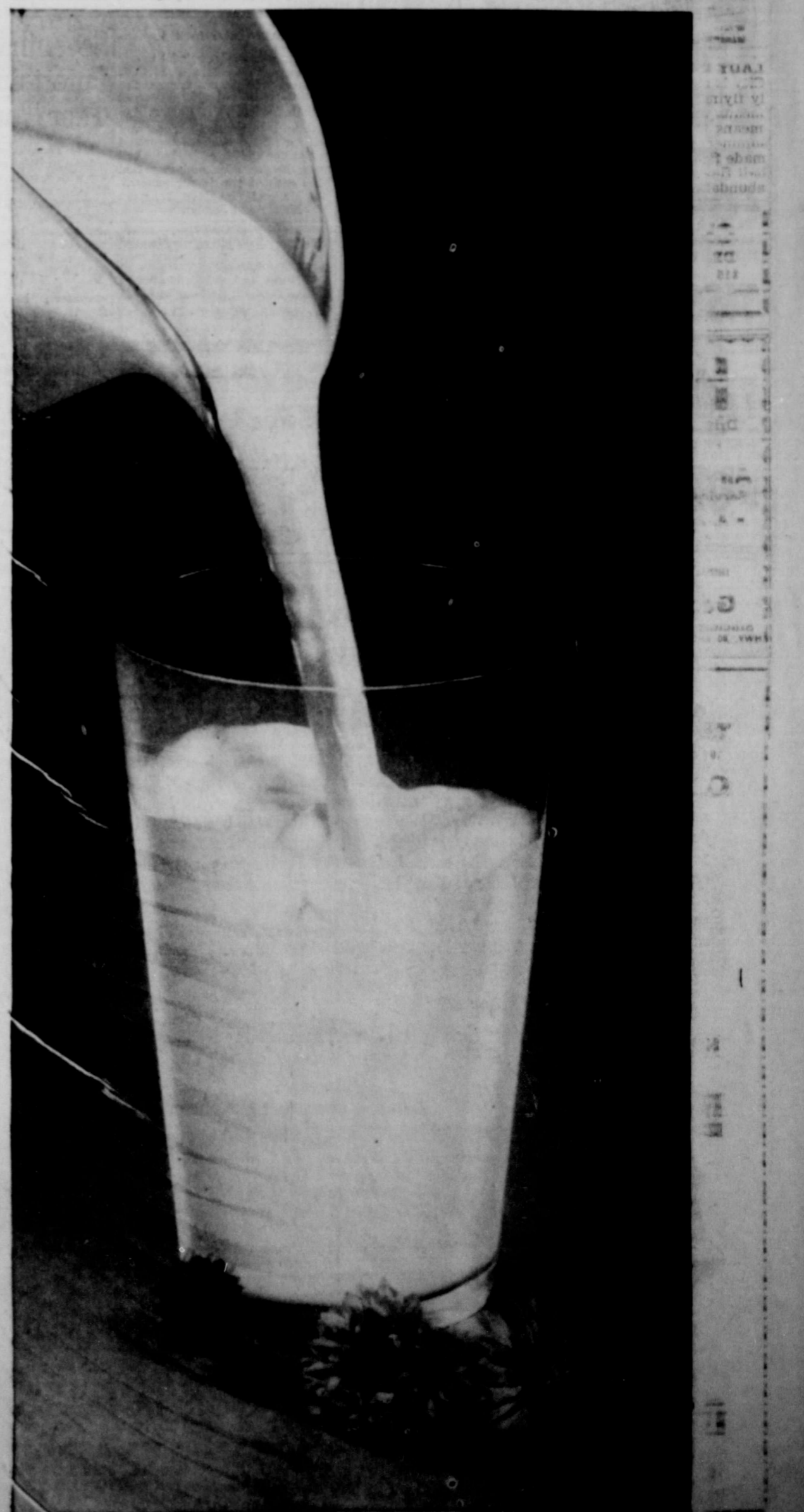

Headquarters Division. The Rangers were transferred from the Adjutant General's office, and the Patrol was transferred from the Highway Department, to the new Department of Public Safety.

The control of the department is vested in a Public Safety Commission of three members, each of whom serves a six-year term with one member's term expiring each two years. Commission members are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The commission names the director and the assistant director.

On Sept. 1, 1957, the legislature authorized a major reorganization plan proposed by the Texas Research League after an exhaustive study. Under this plan the Department of Public Safety decentralized its work loads and brought its personnel closer to the people.

This was done by creating six regional commands, each headed by a senior officer with the rank of major, who was placed in charge of the Highway Patrol, the License and Weight program, the Motor Vehicle Inspection program, Driver License examinations, Communications and the Safety Education Service in his region. Each regional headquarters maintains a limited crime laboratory.

The Texas Rangers are assigned to six companies with the same boundaries as the regional commands.

mands, each headed by a Captain directly responsible to the director of the department. The Narcotic Section and the Intelligence Section, each headed by an agent-in-charge, are part of the Director's Staff, operating statewide out of the Austin headquarters.

The supporting headquarters divisions, sections and bureaus all were consolidated into four major divisions—the Identification and Criminal Records Division, the Personnel and Staff Services Division, the Driver and Vehicle Records Division, and the Inspection and Planning Division.

The responsibilities of the department fall into three general categories:
1. General crime suppression and control.
2. Motor vehicle highway transportation management.

3. Disaster and emergency activities.
To meet these responsibilities and the problems they present, the department has the following specific programs: (1) crime control, (2) police traffic supervision, (3) driver licensing, (4) vehicle inspection, (5) safety responsibility, (6) accident records, (7) safety education, (8) disaster and emergency service, and (9) police training.

Donald Watts Takes Part In Germany Exercise

Specialists Six Donald D. Watts, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Watts, Route 2, Cisco, participated in Exercise Mayflower, a Seventh U. S. Army medical field training exercise in the Stuttgart-Munich area of Germany May 6-13.

Mayflower was designed to test the combat readiness of surgical and evacuation hospitals, medical clearing companies, wheeled and aerial ambulance units and Seventh Army medical support units. In order to add realism to the training, make-up men prepared "patients" to simulate burns, traumatic amputations and other battle-field injuries. During the exercise, 1,000 "patients" were evacuated more than 150 miles from the point where they received their "injuries."

Specialists Watts is assigned as a surgical technician at the 128th Evacuation Hospital, which is regularly located in Stuttgart. He entered the Army in 1953 and arrived overseas on this tour of duty in October 1958.

Many Enter Fed. Employees Benefit Program

W. V. Gill, Director of the Dallas Regional Office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, announced that the Commission has tabulated the preliminary results, nationwide, of the enrollment under the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program. Under this program, the Government contributes toward the cost of Federal annuitants' health benefits coverage \$6 a month for family enrollment, \$3 for self-only enrollment.

At the time of tabulation, 249,000 of approximately 400,000 eligible annuitants had made their election. The results show that 217,000 annuitants elected to enroll, 126,000 in the Government-wide Uniform Plan and 91,000 in a qualified private plan. Of these, 104,000 enrolled for self only and

111,000 took family enrollment. Over 36,000 annuitants elected not to participate in the program at this time.

Gill said coverage for those annuitants who elected to participate in the program will begin on July 1. A late election will not become effective until the first day of the fourth month following the one in which it is received.

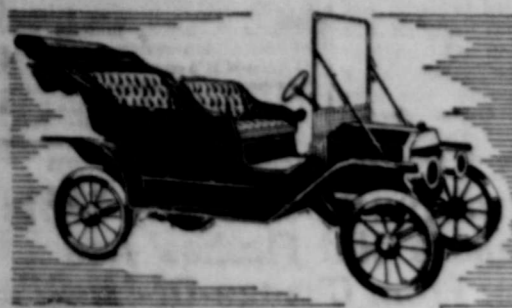
