Dairying, he added, is the greatest single source of farm income in America. One out of every five dollars in cash receipts from farm products comes from dairy ng. The dairy industry, Meekma noted, utilizes milk production from 17 million cows on more than a million of the nation's farms. The milk is processed in approximately 35,000 dairy plants and the equivalent of 60 billion quarts, in the form of fluid milk and its products is distributed annually to the nation's customers. Sales of milk and dairycattle for beef purposes in 1959, Meek-ma said, amounted to more than \$6 ½ billions and represented 19.9 percent of all cash farm receipts

for that year. The dairy industry is essential, he emphasized, because milk is nature's most nearly perfect food and the nation's favorite. Nutritionally, milk and milk product provide from 20 to 25 percent of the essential food nutrients for only 15-18 percent of the food

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
