David Allsup Begins Summer Study at O. U.

David Allsup, science teacher at Ranger Junior College will be among the thirty-seven participants in the summer institute of ecology beginning at the University of Oklahoma on Monday, June 12. He will have ample opportunity to see the state during the eight-week course.

Field trips totaling nearly 4,000 miles will take the high school and junior college teachers of biology to the far corners of the state including the Black Mesa in the Panhandle and the Ouachita Mountains in Southeastern Oklahoma.

Emphasis in the institute will be placed on the interrelationships of plants, animals and the physical environment, said Dr. Harry Hoy, associate director of the institute and professor of geography at O. U.

The institute is supported by a \$45,000 grant from the National Science Foundation and is administered by the Oklahoma Science Service directed by Dr. Horace E. Hoffman.

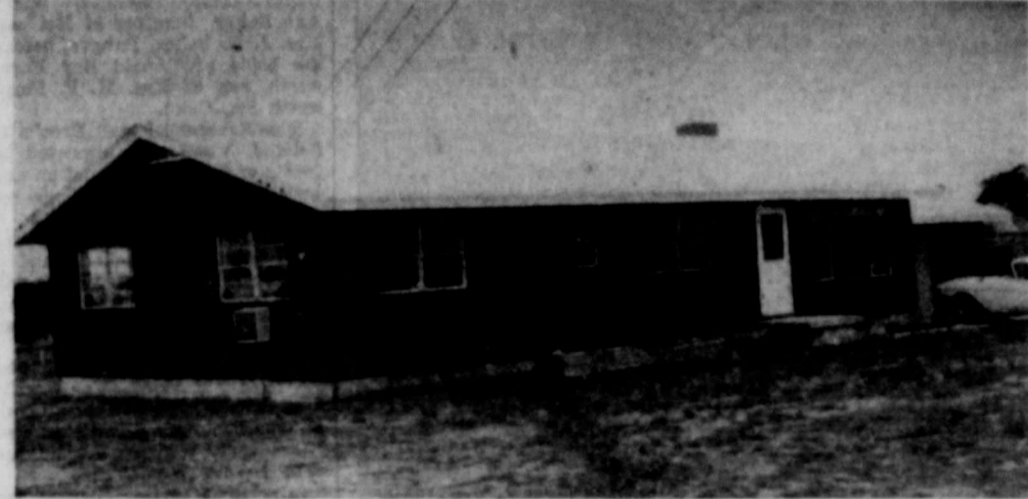
Greer offered these vacation hints:

Under Incentive School Bill

Backers Say Three Million Dollar Bonus Is Available

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles which will give both the pros and cons of the incentive school consolidation plan.)

How much money could be saved under the incentive school consolidation plan?

That's a question which may play a key part in the Eastland County election—if one is ever held—concerning the consolidation plan.

Proponents of consolidation under the incentive plan say that it would release from two and one half to three million dollars for use in Eastland County if all nine districts would consolidate and operate just one high school. They maintain the plan "can give better education at less cost, no increase in taxes and after 10 years the new district could be debt free."

Total debt of the nine school districts now stands at about \$1,335,216. When interest is added to this figure the actual total debt is nearer \$1,630,552. Some of that indebtedness is not due to be paid off until 1993.

Opponents of the consolidation plan are quick to point out the difference in debt of the different districts. Eastland, for instance, owes just about \$125,000 while Ranger owes \$464,495 and Cisco owes \$439,000. Those opposed to the consolidation plan argue that it would not be fair for other districts to have to help pay off the heavy indebtedness of Cisco and Ranger districts.

Dr. James J. Whittington, the leader in the consolidation plan, is just as quick to reply that all districts would be out of debt in 10 years without increasing taxes under the incentive plan and at the same time would have a new high school building. And he says that if the incentive plan is not approved by voters it will be 32 years until Ranger is debt free, 27 until Cisco's bonds are paid off, 23 until Desdemona and Scranton owe nothing, 21 years until the Gorman bonded indebtedness is paid off, 20 years until Rising Star is out of debt and 10 years until Eastland owes nothing. Only Carbon and Olden will be debt free sooner than 10 years from now. Olden owes nothing now and it will be nine years until Carbon is debt free.

What about the difference in how property is rendered in the different districts? Whittington says all of the districts except Cisco have the same tax rate. He maintains the rendition would

work itself out without anyone being hurt.

While Ranger owes the most debt, that district's interest rates are lower than Cisco's and Ranger's annual debt requirements total \$545,727 compared to Cisco's \$547,952.

Dr. Whittington says the county schools can vote themselves a three million dollar bonus and with it build a new high school building outside of any of the towns in a central location. Such a high school would have about 780 students.

Advances and accomplishments by the Texas dairy industry were cited by the Stephenville Production Credit Association, pointed out that cash income from dairy products in Texas totalled nearly \$130,000,000, a substantial increase of the 1959 total.

Local Station Attendant Foils Robbery Attempt

Taylor also refused and called to a passing truck driver that he was being robbed.

The man then swung at Taylor and jumped into the car and sped away. As the group was making their get away, Taylor knocked out the back glass of their car and squirted gasoline into the back seat. He intended to ignite the gasoline, but couldn't find a match.

Taylor then called J. W. Vinson, night patrolman on duty at the Ranger Police Department, and an alert was given over the police radio. After getting a description of the car and subjects, Vinson went in pursuit of the car. Near Cisco, Vinson arrived on the scene shortly after the car had been stopped by Cisco Policeman Clyde Brymer.

Ranger Police Chief Bob Patterson and Patrolman Bill Ogden went to the scene at Cisco and helped Vinson return the subjects to Ranger where they were held until Friday at 8 a.m. when they were arraigned in Justice Ruby Springer's Court.

The five were charged with attempted armed robbery and were carried to the Eastland County jail where they will be held awaiting action of the grand jury.

A call to the Fort Worth Sheriff's department disclosed the fact that the car driven by the subjects had been stolen in Fort Worth and that all of the subjects have criminal records.

A .22 calibre pistol was recovered from the car.

Thirteen Persons Injured In May On Highways

Highway Patrolmen stationed in Eastland County had a busy month during May, but the county's perfect record of no fatalities for the year remains unbroken.

Sgt. J. O. Tamm, in charge of the Eastland office, reported patrolmen investigated 17 accidents in the county during May. Thirteen persons were injured and property damage totaled \$8,006.

That compares to just two accidents in the county during April, with three injuries and property damage of just \$1,300.

For the year 47 accidents have been investigated. While there have been no fatalities a total of 25 persons have been injured in the accidents and property damage has amounted to \$20,454.

May was by far the worst of the year so far as traffic safety in the county is involved.

The schools are held at established summer camps made available to the Red Cross for this training. Their purpose is to increase the number of qualified instructors in swimming, lifesaving, boat safety, and first aid to participants in Red Cross chapter safety programs and to serve as swimming and waterfront directors at summer camps, beaches, and schools.

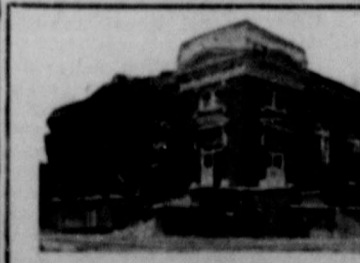

Avoid Mishaps By Repairing Old Stepladder

Why take the risk of falling because of a rickety stepladder, when it's so easy to make it safe? Vulnerable points on a wooden stepladder are the individual steps, loosened nails and a frail framework on the pull-out side.

Here's what to do: Inspect each step, tightening the fasteners and replacing loose nails with screws. Replace loose or missing nails with screws wherever necessary. Strengthen the pull-out side by screwing to the framing a piece of Masonite Tempered Preswood, available at the lumber yard. This will give the stepladder rigidity far greater than it had when new.

If the steps have become badly worn, cover them with Masonite Tempered Preswood, applied with the screen side exposed. The slight grid will provide a better grip for the feet.

A kitchen step stool can be similarly salvaged. If the top has split, cut a piece of Masonite Tempered Preswood to fit. Nail it down with brass-headed tacks. You will have a new surface holding together the split top. Paint it to match the rest of the stool.
