Two Ranger Boys Will Attend Camp Hoblitzelle

From cities, towns and rural communities all over Texas, 150 boys will take leave of Mom and Dad and their youthful playmates, some for the first time in their young lives, as they leave their homes by bus, private car or train at the weekend to spend one full week at The Salvation Army Camp Hoblitzelle near Dallas.

In the group will be Johnny Dale Hill, 12, and William Alton Dunson, 14, both of Ranger. The boys will be met at bus stations in Midlothian or Waxahatchie, towns near Camp Hoblitzelle, and transported to the camp, where they will be housed in attractive brick and redwood cabins and will be furnished meals in the large airy dining room prepared by expert chefs to meet the physical needs of healthy growing youngsters.

Mrs. F. M. Kaykendall, camp chairman for Ranger, has been busy for several weeks selecting worthy boys, those who otherwise would not have an opportunity to spend a full week in camp where there is fun, recreation, companionship, relaxation, crafts, organized sports—all under the guiding hands of men whose lives have been dedicated to the task of helping others.

Boys who spend a week at Camp Hoblitzelle this season will find a new attraction—the huge but gentle St. Bernard dog that was imported from Switzerland and presented to Camp Hoblitzelle as companion and playmate for the children who spend their vacations there.

Camp Hoblitzelle, located in a beautiful wooded tract of 340 acres, seven miles south of Midlothian and eight miles west of Waxahatchie, within less than one hour's automobile ride from Dallas, has well arranged playgrounds for all boys' sports, with modern playground equipment: swimming pool, lake for boating and fishing; organized sports under direction of experienced coaches—everything that can bring happiness and a realization of the dreams and hopes of growing boys.

Camp Hoblitzelle has been provided by The Salvation Army for boys of Texas, through the generous gifts of more than 100 liberal men and women of the state, who provided money for purchase of the land and for the buildings and other improvements that have been made there. The camp is operated by The Salvation Army for the benefit of the boys who find good food, pleasant experiences, and happiness there.

In Ranger, The Salvation Army is supported by the Ranger United Fund, which raises money in this community for support of The Salvation Army and other youth, health, and welfare agencies.

Bobby Brummett On Leave After Duty In Germany

Army Sp. 4 Bobby J. Brummett, son of Mrs. E. L. Brummett, 323 Allee Street, Ranger, is visiting in Ranger, following his recent return from Germany where he has been stationed for the past two years.

Brummett was stationed with the 14th Art. 4th Armored Division in Schwabach, Germany. He enlisted in the Army in Abilene in Feb. 1959. He recently re-enlisted for an additional six years of service. He will go to the Aberdeen Proving Grounds in Maryland and attend 11 weeks of welding school following the expiration of his current leave.

Brummett attended Ranger High school, and prior to entering the service worked with a Seismograph crew out of Breckenridge. He also did part time evangelistic work for seven years before entering the service, and has continued his evangelistic work since being in the service.

He preached at the Olden Church of Christ Sunday, June 11.

Brummett said that while he was stationed at Schwabach, Germany he established a Church of Christ in that city. It is a city of some 68,000 population. Brummett said that there were very few Protestant churches in that city. These included the Church of God, Baptist, Jehovah Witness and a group that were called the Protestants. He said that when he left Germany that the Church of Christ had about 15 members, some were service men, but the majority were natives. Brummett said that he planned to continue his evangelistic work, making his chances when he could.

His wife, the former Ruby Smart of Leeville, La., was in Germany part of the two years he was stationed there.

In School Consolidation Both Sides Feel They're In Fight to Help Their Towns

(Editor's Note: This is the last in a series of articles giving both the pros and cons of the incentive school consolidation plan.)

Lack of trust, cut throat competition and a natural desire to "keep our schools" are the three things which are the biggest factors against consolidation of Eastland County schools under the new incentive payment plan.

Eastland County is unusual in that it has three towns of about the same size—Eastland, Ranger and Cisco—and several other good size communities, including Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Olden and Deadmans.

A fact that everyone recognizes is that Cisco doesn't trust Eastland or Ranger, Eastland doesn't trust Cisco or Ranger and Ranger doesn't trust Cisco or Eastland. And the smaller towns don't trust any of the bigger ones.

Dr. James Whittington has headed the drive to consolidate the nine county high schools. He happens to be from Eastland and for that reason he is looked on with mistrust by Cisco and Ranger citizens, at least many of them.

Talk about the consolidation with the man on the street in Cisco or Ranger and he immediately charges that Eastland "is after our school." He is firm in his belief that Dr. Whittington plans to locate the one high school in Eastland.

Backers of the plan, including Dr. Whittington, deny this. They say positively that the school would be located on neutral ground. Those who oppose the plan nod their heads, flash a "knowing smile" and reply, "Yes, we know. We know."

Competition between Eastland County towns has been cut throat for many years. There has been talk of cooperation, but not much of it. Lake Leon is proof that the towns can work together, but building a lake and consolidating schools are two different things.

"Take away our schools and you will ruin our community," those opposed to the plan declare.

Backers of the plan argue that a first class high school would improve all of the communities. They state that opponents of the plan are hurting their children's chance of getting a real education.

The fight has just started. Only one thing is clear cut. People, on both sides of the fence, are working for what they believe is best for their community and their children.

Many Eligible For Social Security Checks

Several Ranger residents who are past the social security retirement age (62 for women, 65 for men) are failing to claim their money because of a misunderstanding, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

He added that the 1960 Amendments made a significant change in the retirement test. As before, benefits are payable for any month the insured person earns no more than \$100.00 in wages and is not very active in self-employment, no matter how high the annual earnings, and are due for all months in the calendar year if earnings are not over \$1200.00. He gave these examples:

Mr. A is 67 and his wife is 62. He is due \$100.00 retirement benefit and she is due \$37.50. He is still regularly employed at \$200.00 per month. Under the 1960 Amendments they can be paid \$600.00 in social security benefits.

Mr. B is 65 and still earning \$150.00 per month. His social security benefit is \$75.00 per month. Even though he works all of 1961 at \$150.00 per month, he can still be paid \$450.00 in social security checks. If he had a wife and child also due payments, the three of them could collect \$1080.00 in social security.

Miss C is 62 years old and now earning \$1750.00 net profit per year from her music studio. Her social security benefit, based on earlier and higher earnings, is \$40.00 per month. She can collect \$650 in social security benefits in 1961.

But none of the three persons described above can be paid any social security checks until a claim is filed. A representative of the Abilene office will be in Ranger at City Hall on Wednesday, June 21, at 10:00 A. M. Tuley suggests all interested persons past retirement age check into this matter now, so that no checks will be missed that could be paid if a claim were filed.

Homer Packwood, Lone Star Electrician Retires

Homer Packwood recently packed his lunch pail for the last time as he completed his last day with Lone Star Gas Company before retiring after 32 years of service.

Packwood said shortly before retiring, "The first thing I'm going to do when I retire is put a big rock in my lunch pail and throw it into the river. Then I'm going to do some running around on the coast, do some more work on my cabin at Lake Leon and then settle down to gardening and fishing," he went on to say.

Packwood joined Lone Star on Dec. 1, 1929 and began a series of truck driving and running tour jobs that took him to almost every compressor plant on the system. He was made electrician on Jan. 1, 1945 and moved to Plant No. 8 in the Ranger area, where he spent the rest of his career.

A native of Ranger, he was born May 15, 1896 in Ranger. The retiree was the son of ranching parents. They moved to Seymour for a short period, then back to Ranger in 1917. He went to work for Chestnut and Smith in 1920 doing pipeline work.

Packwood claims to have done electrical work at quite a few Lone Star plants and also helped build quite a few.

Until retirement, he worked out of a large building converted into an electrical shop. Magnetos have been his specialty.

About five years ago, a fire in Packwood's house burned in Ranger and he asked his wife then if she wanted to rebuild in town or on the lake. They have been living in their lake cottage ever since.

"It's just the same in town," he says. "We have a big fireplace, lights, water, telephone and even newspaper delivery."

They also have a garden and lots of flowers. "I also want to do some part-time electrical work. I don't have to do much. The Company has a good program for retirees and that will take care of me nicely," he added.

Mrs. Packwood is the former Helen Elizabeth Flinto of Ranger. They were married July 29, 1919 and have a daughter, Eloise Summers, who lives with her family in Ranger.

He advised that the 1960 Amendments made a significant change in the retirement test. As before, benefits are payable for any month the insured person earns no more than \$100.00 in wages and is not very active in self-employment, no matter how high the annual earnings, and are due for all months in the calendar year if earnings are not over \$1200.
He gave these examples:
Mr. A is 67 and his wife is 62. He is due \$100 retirement benefit and she is due \$37.50. He is still regularly employed at \$200 per month under the 1960 Amendments they can be paid \$400 in social security benefits.
Mr. B is 65 and still earning \$150 per month. His social security benefit is \$75 per month. Even though he works all of 1961 at \$150 per month, he can still be paid \$450 in social security checks. If he had a wife and child also due payments, the three of them could collect \$1058 in social security checks.
Miss C is 62 years old and now earning \$1750 net profit per year from her music studio. Her social security benefit, based on earlier and higher earnings, is \$50 per month. She can collect \$560 in social security benefits in 1961.

But none of the three persons described above can be paid any social security checks until a claim is filed. Town and Country Church Conf. Set

"The Enduring Values of Town and Country Life" is the theme for the 16th annual Town and Country Church Conference scheduled for June 19-21. All sessions will be held in the Memorial Student Center at Texas A&M College.
According to Reagan Brown, rural sociologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and a member of the Conference Committee, attendance is expected to be near 200.
Two out-of-state speakers will be featured and each will make three program appearances. They are Dr. A. C. Bartholomew, Professor of Church and Community, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and Dr. C. H. Hamilton, North Carolina State College rural sociologist. Other speakers will include prominent church and lay leaders from over Texas and also Texas A&M College personnel.

Shifts in population, farm and small town community trends, the church's role in community life and the enduring values of rural living are among the major subjects to be discussed.
Always a highlight of the annual conference is the naming of the Rural Minister of the Year. This will come at a luncheon on June 20, according to Brown.

1 1/2 cups rolled oats, quick or regular, uncooked 1/4 cup melted fat

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, and salt. Stir in oats and nuts. Combine orange rind and juice, honey, and fat. Add to dry ingredients, mix only enough to moisten ingredients. Pour into greased 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350°F) until done, about 1 hour. Yield: 1 loaf.

Chicken Sesame—Summer Dish



Summer meals take on extra interest, almost as if by magic, when the main dish is chicken with sesame seasoning. Actually, chicken stands high on any list because of its delicate flavor, the ease and variety of ways of cooking and the way it combines with so many other foods.

Chicken seasoned with sesame and ginger has an Oriental flavor. The recipe is simple to follow because the chicken, brushed with corn oil and seasoned, cooks in a golden rich brown in the oven. Turn it only once for golden browning on all sides. Served with a green salad, dressed with a corn oil and cider vinegar dressing, chicken sesame makes an ideal meal for guests or family.

Oven Fried Sesame Chicken 2 broiler-fryer chickens 1/2 teaspoon ginger Salt

Cut chicken into serving pieces. Wash and dry chicken. Rub chicken pieces with ginger, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Brush chicken pieces with corn oil. Pour corn oil to depth of 1/4 inch in a 9 x 13-inch baking dish. Place chicken pieces, skin side down, in corn oil. Sprinkle with sesame seed. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400° F.) 30 minutes. Turn chicken pieces and sprinkle with sesame seed. Bake 15 minutes longer. Makes 8 servings.

French Dressing 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate 1/2 teaspoon sugar 1/2 cup corn oil 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 1/2 cup cider vinegar 1/2 cup paprika 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

Mix together salt, sugar, dry mustard, paprika and monosodium glutamate. Add oil and cayenne and stir until well blended. Add vinegar and beat or shake well. Beat or shake well just before serving. Use with favorite tossed green salad. Makes 1 cup.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Beginning Sept. 1, 1961, Texans will begin paying a higher fee for certified birth and death certificates according to Senate Bill 68 passed by the 57th Legislature.

The law raises the fee for a certified copy from \$1.00 to \$1.50 to cover the increased cost of issuing such certificates.

The new law does not affect birth certificate copies requested before Sept. 1.

The Records and Statistics Section of the State Health Department — the State agency responsible for Texas' birth and death record keeping — also made its annual summer plea for parents of children entering school for the first time to make application for certified birth copies as soon as possible to avoid the last minute rush.

There is an added incentive this year, explained State Health authorities, because of the expected extra rush of requests seeking to beat the September fee increase.

Texas schools usually require proof-of-age for children entering school for the first time. A certified copy of a birth certificate is the best and most accurate proof accepted by all Texas schools.

Certified copies may be obtained from county clerks and local registrars.

If not procured locally, a copy may be obtained for \$1.00 from the Records and Statistics Section of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin until Sept. 1, 1961 — \$1.50 after that date. The fee must accompany the certificate request.

Needed for a quick and positive search of records are the name of the child, both parents' names, place of birth and date of birth. This information should be included with the request.

Past experience proves the earlier requests get quicker response. Another hint for parents with children beginning school, is to provide each child with a thorough physical check-up from a physician.

Also, it is wise to check school regulations concerning vaccinations.

Between now and fall, insecticides in back yard gardens will fog the air like smoke as the annual battle between gardener and garden pest is joined in earnest. And woe unto the insect: a single breath of the lethal spray, a single drop on his tiny body, a single bite of spray-covered green and his doom is sealed.

Good riddance. His only consolation is a grim but satisfying one: his executioner, being human, is liable to the human disease of carelessness, prone to the very weapon he uses against the insect. So it is that the executioner may become the executed.

It is entirely possible to avoid this not-too-unlikely contingency, however. All that is required is the ability to read the following recommendations and the wit to accept them at face value. They were compiled by the chemists who compound our most potent insecticides. Who should know better how they should be safely used?

1. Read the label carefully and make sure you understand it. The warnings are never exaggerated.
