Year's Rainfall Is Three Inches Above Normal

Official rainfall during the four day period which ended Sunday was 5.07 inches here. Much heavier measurements were reported from many areas in the county and unofficial readings here ran as high as seven inches.

The 5.07 measurement pushed the total for June to 7.44 inches, which makes this June the third wettest since rainfall records have been kept here, dating back to 1911. Only July of 1959 and June of 1940 were wetter.

Leon horn rapidly following the rains. Eastland Lake also filled up and water began going over the spillway Sunday night. Cisco Lake gained more than two feet and stock ponds and other small lakes in the county were full or filling fast following the near-record rainfall.

Total rainfall for the year now stands at 17.15, or 3.80 inches above normal.

Hurricane Season Warnings Given by Weather Bureau

The United States Weather Bureau makes the official opening of the hurricane season June 15 when it begins investigating all tropical weather disturbances.

After June 15 the Weather Bureau maintains a hurricane warning service to alert persons living in the path of a tropical storm of impending danger. Adequate warning of a storm's approach is given so that precautions can be taken to prevent injuries and damage, the National Board of Fire Underwriters said today.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters, a service organization sponsored by capital stock fire insurance companies, has drawn up a list of safeguards to be taken in areas where storms threaten.

Hurricanes and tropical windstorms have caused billions of dollars in property damage and taken countless lives over the years. Hurricane "Donna", which struck the east coast last fall, alone destroyed more than a billion dollars in property.

The following suggested precautions are designed to hold life and property losses to a minimum. The Board advises:

Occupants of water front buildings to seek shelter away from the sea upon being warned of an approaching storm.

Immediate evacuation if there is a threat of roadway being washed away or flooded. High winds and rising waters may maroon water front residents. Travel at the height of a storm is exceedingly dangerous.

A well-built house, located a safe distance from the ocean, is possibly the safest place during a hurricane.

Move all loose material and unsecured objects such as garbage cans and porch furniture to a safe place before the storm hits. Raise windows and tightly fasten or take them down.

Close down shutters and board windows carefully with good wood. An improper or makeshift job could do more harm than good.

Brace display windows, doors and other large exposed areas against the wind with struts or trusses to prevent bending and to cushion wind vibrations.

In all buildings open one or more windows on the side opposite the wind direction to offer some ventilation. This also may help to prevent wind damage. If the windward side is undamaged, the windows should only be opened slightly. However, as soon as any windows are broken by the storm, additional openings should be provided at the opposite side of the

house to help equalize the pressure.

Since the water supply might fail, sterilize jugs, bottles and pots and fill with fresh water. Fill the bathtub for an additional supply.

An operating flashlight and a battery emergency lighting is essential.

Keep on hand a food supply that can be eaten with little or no cooking. Since the storm may disrupt electrical power, keep emergency cooking facilities in safe working conditions.

After the Storm

When the storm has passed stay at home unless qualified to give emergency assistance. Do not hinder first aid and rescue work.

Driving is particularly hazardous after a storm. If one must drive be on the alert for fallen wires and branches, washed out and flooded roads.

Do not touch wires knocked down during the storm. Contact could be fatal.

Even after services have been restored boil or sterilize drinking water until the Board of Health advises otherwise.

During and after a storm the threat of fire is ever present. Because of disrupted communications and hazardous driving conditions fire fighting is particularly difficult. Reduced water pressure represents another threat to effective fire fighting. Employ the utmost caution against fire.

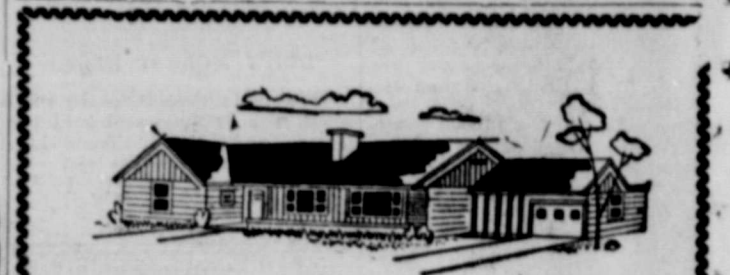

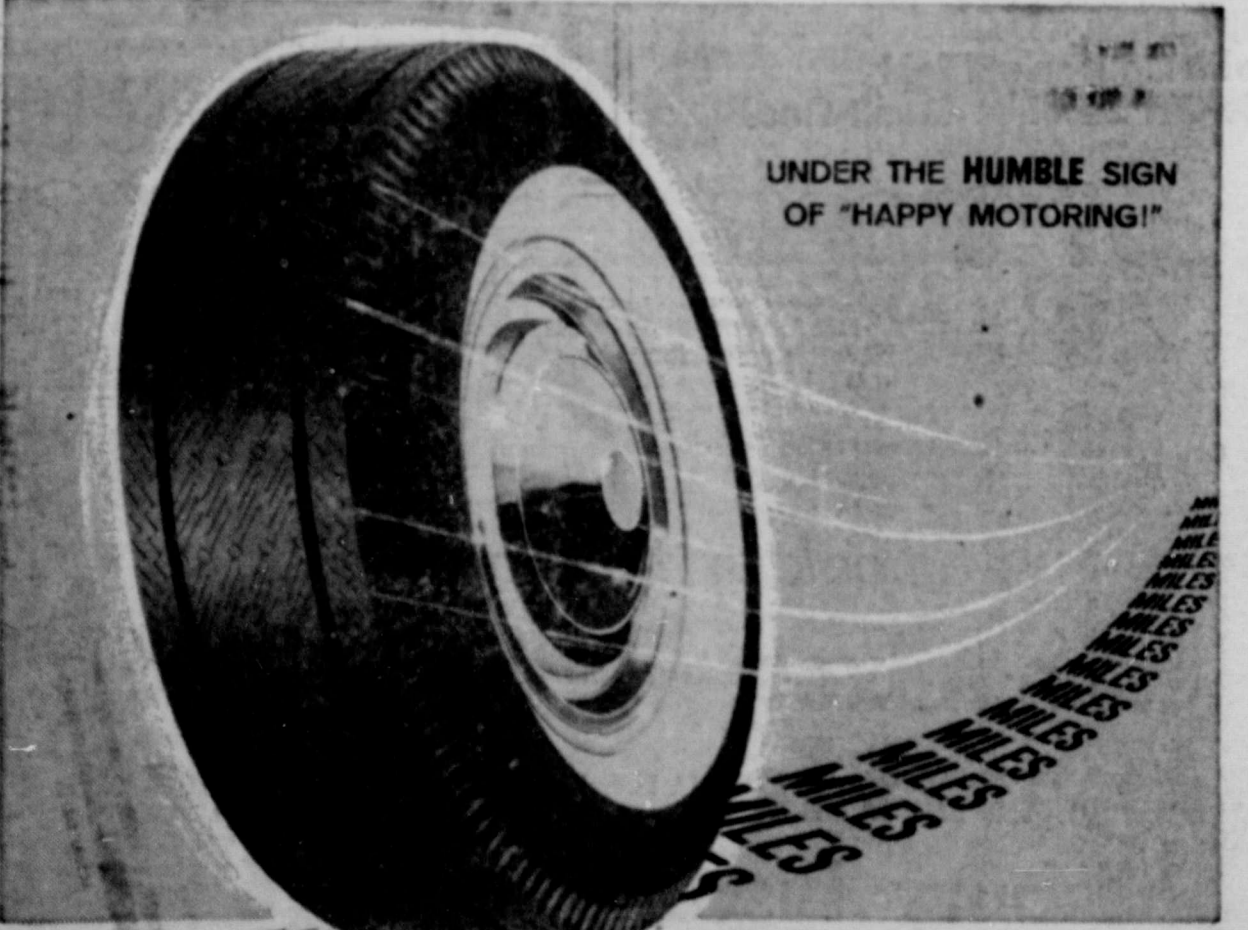

I had known Roy Bacus when he was editor of the Cleburne Times-Review and I was editor of the Ranger Times and we used to cover some of the same football games. So when I read in the paper that Roy had accepted a sales position with WBAP in Fort Worth...

him and told him I had a good suggestion for a radio program featuring a fresh and original personality—me.

Roy said I might not be original but I was certainly fresh.

At his suggestion, I wrote a simple script and he arranged for a recording. Not long afterward, I was attending the races at Hot Springs and, out at the track, was handed a telegram. The message said I had a sponsor for a weekly program.

It so happened that, some time before, I had helped write the movie, "Boom Town," and had penned a line for Clark Gable to the effect that he was wearing a brand new pair of Justin boots.

This was very gratifying to the Justin boys, especially as 36,000,000 persons viewed the film its first year.

So when they hear the recording, I had me a radio sponsor. The agreement - verbal - was for six months and from time to time it was renewed, never with a word of writing and the arrangement was entirely harmonious throughout.

For seven years, for 15 minutes during the noon hour Sunday, "I Give You Texas and the Great Southwest" was on the air.

Occasionally there was a guest - to name a few, J. Frank Dobbie, former Ranger Captain Tom Hickman and Governor Coke Stevenson - (It was the first radio "appearance" Stevenson made after he became governor and 15,000 copies of the interview were sent to listeners).

Mainly, the program was just me, telling stories about the history, lore and legend of the Southwest. The theme song was "La Golondrina." The last program was given in 1948 but every now and then, someone, met for the first time, says, "I used to listen every Sunday."

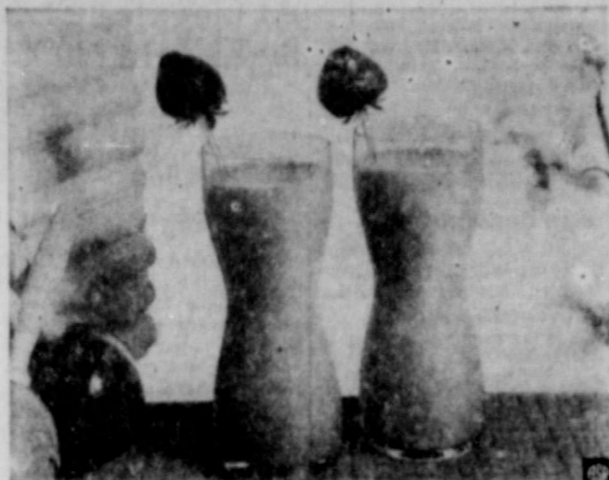

HIDDEN DANGERS

John Jones owned a service station. He sold gas in an open dirty paint bucket to an angry looking customer who said it was for his car.

But what he really used it for was to throw it into a bar room full of people who had heckled him. He lit the gasoline, burning some of the people badly.

The police caught the culprit and he went to prison.

The burned bar patrons sued the gas station owner, claiming that Jones should not have sold the gas. A city law said that gas should be pumped only into car tanks or into metal containers with cap or screw.

The court held: Gas stations sell dangerous goods. The city law aims to protect the public. Jones was negligent in selling the gas in an open bucket. A jury should decide if he should have known the gas might be wrongly used. If so, he would be liable for damages.

If a person negligently sets the stage for a later criminal act, he may have to pay for the damage if he could have reasonably foreseen the consequences.

You leave a loaded gun lying around. A delinquent neighborhood boy gets it and shoots someone. You may well be to blame; but not if the boy broke into your home and stole the gun, for you could not have foreseen this.

In a famous case, a young lady bought a train ticket to a nearby town. Mistakenly she rode beyond the town station on the ticket. A conductor found the error, stopped the train, and put the girl off in the middle of nowhere. She had to walk to the next town which meant walking by a known hobo camp. The hobos attacked her. She sued the railroad and the court held it was liable. The conductor should have foreseen what might happen.

Recently a construction firm

left a bulldozer unlocked. Vandals started the bulldozer, drove it for awhile. Later, unable to stop it, they headed it toward a hill. The bulldozer ran into several homes and a car before it came to a stop. The court said that the contractor should have foreseen the likelihood of vandals and locked the bulldozer. The contractor was held liable.

TOO LATE TO CHANGE YOUR MIND

What if some glib salesman signs you up for an encyclopedia, or a set of pots and pans. Next day you change your mind. Can you cancel the order?? Chances are, you can't.

The typical pattern runs thus: the salesman fast-talks poor Joyce Jones into signing an order for a set of cooking ware, silver, or what-have-you. She pays a nominal amount down, the balance to be over a long term. The price is high enough, plus a big carrying charge, but the installments run for a long time and at first reasonable. When the shipment arrives, Joyce decides she doesn't want it, and can't afford it anyhow, so she refuses to accept it and tells the company she is cancelling the order.

But poor Joyce is out of luck. The company promptly tells her that they "sold" her installment contract to a bank or financial institution, and she must now deal with them, not the company. The company thus got its sale price in full, the salesman his commission, and the new owner of the contract expects his money in full. Sorry, but it is too late to cancel the order. This is not at all like buying from a local store, where you can usually return the goods if they are unsatisfactory or if you change your mind. If Joyce ships the merchandise back, the company will most likely refuse to accept it.

Moreover, the companies buying such contracts are hard-boiled about collections. If Joyce doesn't pay, they will not hesitate to report her to a credit rat-
