set for the election. Lack of opposition to the proposal was given as the reason for the expected small vote.

Councilmen called the election for modernizing the sewer treatment facilities when it was de-termined by civic leaders that it was necessary if future growth of the community could be hoped for.

The bond issue will total ap proximately \$200,000, but the actual figure on the ballot will be \$123,000. The remaining \$77,-000 will be used to retire a pre-

sent bonded indebtedness. The \$77,000 has already been ap-proved by the voters and will not have to be included in the new issue. In addition, the city has received a grant in the a-mount of approximately \$36,375 from a federal agency to aid in pastor. modernizing water and sewer facilities.

City officials stressed that the revenue bond would not make a tax increase mandatory since it will be paid from revenue from the water and sanitation departments.

Plans call for construction of a new sewage treatment plant to take care of the present citizenship and the anticipated growth for a number of years. Plans also call for improvements in water distribution system and other needed chrages.

Mayor Ault urged all Baird property owners to go to the polls on September 22 and cast their vote on the proposal.
