Sentiment of Business Men Favors This Method, But Quantity May Decide the Question.

The city's paving bonds were yesterday approved by Judge J. T. Sluder of the attorney general's department at Austin, according to the advices received by City Secretary Edgar Rye this morning and all formalities attendant upon the issuance of the bonds have been complied with.

The paving matter is still hanging fire in the city council and the question' of material is yet to be decided before anything definite transpires.

Condemned to Die for Reelfoot Lake Murder.

By Associated Press. Nashville, Tenn., July 3.—The supreme court this morning reversed the convicted night riders and remanded them for new trials. Six of the defendants are under sentence of death.

The principal reason assigned for the court's action in reversing these cases was that the grand jury which indicted the night riders was not properly selected and that the State did not allow challenges.

The effect of this decision will be stand trial. The first trial was a long and tedious one. The court's action has excited a great deal of comment. not a little of which is adverse.

SCHOOL CONTRACT

GRAHAM OF GREENVILLE IS RE-LEASED FROM OBLIGATIONS. WORK TO LOCAL PEOPLE.

Build Structure for Slightly More Than Lowest Bidder.

The contract for the erection of the new high school building will go to Brown & Cranmer of this city, instead of J. E. Graham of Greenville, as at first awarded.

Mr. Graham yesterday requested the school board to release him from his contract and as he had executed the bond required, the school board complied with his request. He forfeits the \$500 deposit which accompanied his bid. The contract was then awarded to Brown & Cranmer, they being the next lowest bidders for the work. Their bid is \$1652 dollars more than the Graham bid. Work is to be started at once and the building completed by January 1st.

Mr. Graham is perfectly reliable and s able to carry out his contract, but he recently secured several good contracts at home, making it expedient for him to lose the \$500 deposit and be reeased from his contract. Another reaon was that he did not consider it possible to build the school for the price he made. Under the circumstances, there was nothing else to do but release him, which was done.

It is a matter of considerable satisfaction that the contract will go to local parties instead of an outsider, as in the latter case most of the money would go out of the city.
