#### SPOKANE IS BATTLEGROUND IN LOCAL OPTION FIGHT.

Spokane, Wash., July 3.—William A. Monten of Spokane has started a personal canvass to secure 5,000 signatures, representing 50 per cent of the number of qualified electors voting, to a petition calling a special election for October 5, to decide whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall continue in Spokane. The city will be voted on as a unit, and it is likely that a special vote will also be taken in the county.

"There will be a convention of representative men of ten counties in eastern Washington in Spokane about the middle of July," said Mr. Monten, "and at this time it is probable that plans will be outlined to make a fight throughout the State of Washington in the interest of local option. We look to the churches to join us in the movement and the Fourth of July should see the campaign well under way. We expect to win out hands down."

"I desire to say at the outset that my interest in this campaign is not in any way intended to discredit the administration of Mayor Nelson S. Pratt, for if ever Spokane had a fearless, capable and outspoken chief executive it has such an official in him. He has enforced the law so far as he was in position to do, but the persistent refusal of the saloon forces to join in an effort to uphold the law is mainly responsible for making the saloon the same old institution it has always been."

Officers and members of associations, composed of saloon and cafe owners, declared they have nothing to fear, for the reason they are obeying the laws and are routing the disreputable barrel houses and gineries, as well as keeping women out of their places. If the people decide that State wide prohibition is desirable they will abide by the result, they add, but local option is an entirely different proposition and they will make a fight on the issue.

### WASHINGTON WHEAT LAND TO BE COLONIZED SOON

Spokane, Wash., July 3.—Plans have been completed by J. G. Crawford of Heppner, Ore., to place 1,000 German families on 18,000 acres of wheat land in the northern part of Morrow county, southwest of Spokane. The land was formerly part of the Woolery estate and is now owned by Portland people. The colonization is to be completed the coming fall. Mr. Crawford says the heads of many of the families are men of means and the others are familiar with the various branches of agriculture, thus making a valuable addition to the southern part of the Inland Empire. Plans are also under way to send parties of colonists into Stevens county and other points along the Columbia river in the northern part of Washington, where are thousands of acres of lands adapted to growing cereals and all kinds of vine and tree fruits. There is also a movement on foot in Spokane to provide lands owned by the government and the State to those who are not successful in the big lottery organized by Uncle Sam to dispose of 750,000 acres of Indian lands in Washington, Idaho and Montana in August.

### LOCAL FIRM GETS SCHOOL CONTRACT

GRAHAM OF GREENVILLE IS RELEASED FROM OBLIGATIONS. WORK TO LOCAL PEOPLE.

### DEPOSIT IS FORFEITED

Brown & Cranmer of This City To Build Structure for Slightly More Than Lowest Bidder.

The contract for the erection of the new high school building will go to Brown & Cranmer of this city, instead of J. E. Graham of Greenville, as at first awarded.

Mr. Graham yesterday requested the school board to release him from his contract and as he had executed the bond required, the school board complied with his request. He forfeits the \$500 deposit which accompanied his bid. The contract was then awarded to Brown & Cranmer, they being the next lowest bidders for the work. Their bid is \$1652 dollars more than the Graham bid. Work is to be started at once and the building completed by January 1st.

Mr. Graham is perfectly reliable and is able to carry out his contract, but he recently secured several good contracts at home, making it expedient for him to lose the \$500 deposit and be released from his contract. Another reason was that he did not consider it possible to build the school for the price he made. Under the circumstances, there was nothing else to do but release him, which was done.

It is a matter of considerable satisfaction that the contract will go to local parties instead of an outsider, as in the latter case most of the money would go out of the city.

### RESTRICTIVE LEGISLATION KILLS NEW FOSTORIA ROAD.

Houston, Tex., July 3.—After an expenditure of \$80,000, the establishing of offices and headquarters, arranging for the purchase of equipment and announcing the date of beginning of traffic, the Houston, Fostoria and Northern Railway Company has been forced to suspend building operations, recall time schedules and traffic orders, cancel orders for equipment and break contracts, and the promoters of the road stand a fair chance of losing on the project. All of this is brought about by a recent enactment of the State legislature regarding equipment of common carriers which becomes effective on January 1, 1910, and will probably tie up more than one road under construction within the State.

Summarized, the recent enactment specifies that each and every car, coach and engine of all common carriers shall be equipped with automatic couplings that will lock the cars together when they are pushed together, and devices that can be coupled or uncoupled without the necessity of men going between the cars. The statute further specifies that the drawbars shall not be more than 4 3/4 inches from the ground nor less than 3 1/4 inches.

Other restrictions than these are included in the new law. The coupling clause is the one that is working to the detriment of the small branch roads that run through the timber districts, and is the one which has practically put the Houston, Fostoria and Northern out of business. The road has been built through a rough, uneven country, and is designed principally for handling logs, although a regular freight and passenger service was to be maintained. On account of the improvised manner in laying the rails and the uneven country traversed, it is impossible to equip trains with automatic couplers, as all forms in use slide up and down and would become uncoupled.

### SEVERAL CASES DISPOSED OF IN THE DISTRICT COURT.

Phil and Whit Claiborne were found guilty of burglary by the jury yesterday afternoon and each given three years in the penitentiary for car robbing. Phil was given two years additional for breaking into a hardware store.

Minas Jacobs, negro, plead guilty to a charge of burglary and was given two years in the penitentiary. He entered the premises of J. B. Duke, janitor at the court house.

The case of Ed Cooper, charged with assault to murder a Mexican senorita on May 10 is now on trial and will probably be completed today.

**The Pitt Diamond.**  
While Pitt, the grandfather of Lord Chatham, was governor of Fort St. George in 1698 he became acquainted with a jewel merchant named Jamchund, who brought a diamond of great size for sale. He asked £30,000 for it in the rough. It should, of course, have been bought on behalf of the company, but Pitt, seeing money in it, could not resist the temptation of making a private bargain. He became the possessor of the stone for the sum of £20,400, and he was quite satisfied that he had behaved honorably when he paid the man, who on his part was also content. But the diamond was known to be worth more than Jamchund had received, and the transaction gave rise to a good deal of gossip, which in no way decreased when later on Pitt had the stone cut in England and sold it to the regent of France for £125,000. Even that enormous sum did not represent its true value. The stone was set in the royal crown of France. It weighed 410 carats in the rough, but the cutting reduced it to 136 carats.—Mrs. Penney's "Fort St. George, Madras."

Salt as a gargle will cure soreness of  
the throat.  
Tomatoes are an excellent thing for  
rousing a torpid liver.  
Salt and soda in solution are excel-  
lent for bee stings and spider bites.  
If articles not too badly scorched in  
ironing are laid in the hot sun, the  
scorch will be removed.  
Cramp in the leg may be quickly  
relieved by stretching the heel as far  
out as possible and drawing up the  
toes.  
A tin wash basin will last a great  
deal longer, if the bottom of the bowl  
is painted with common oil paint and  
occasionally repainted.  
One of the simplest remedies for In-  
somnia, often caused by heat, is to  
place a cloth, dipped in cold water and  
wrung out, at the back of the head.

To make the leaves of a rubber plant  
glossy and bright and at the same time  
strengthen the whole plant, sponge the  
leaves occasionally with milk.  
Never buy potatoes that are not firm  
and hard, and if you have the choice,  
always select the varieties that have  
the smallest number of "eyes."  
Copper pans should be cleaned by  
scouring them with a cut lemon dipped  
in salt. Then rinse them thoroughly in  
pure water, dry them and finally polish  
with a soft cloth.  
An old refrigerator which has a  
lining of tin may be made to look cleaner  
by covering the lining with two coats  
of white paint and then two coats of  
white enamel varnish.

Cheese may be kept in good condition  
by wrapping it in a cloth wrung out in  
vinegar. The cloth should have an  
outer covering of several layers of paper  
and the whole thing should be kept in  
a cool place.

To remove a sty make a little poultice  
of the soft part of a baked apple tied  
up in muslin and apply it to the  
eyelid. Keep it on all night and in the  
morning the sty will be much better,  
if not cured.

Sprains and bruises should be rub-  
bed with liniment. The following is an  
excellent recipe: Take two parts each  
of camphorated oil and alcohol and one  
part of chloroform. Shake well before  
using and apply with the palm of the  
hand.

A teaspoonful of nitrate of soda added  
to three quarts of water and poured  
upon the roots of a Boston fern will  
stimulate it to renewed life. Apply  
several times at intervals of three  
weeks, but be careful never to touch  
the fronds.

Hay fever may be treated by "inhaling  
the vapors of a pint of hot water to  
which ten drops of creosote have  
been added. The nostrils may be spray-  
ed with a solution of two grains of  
quinine to the ounce of water, from  
time to time.

Lamp chimneys should never be  
washed, as this almost invariably  
makes the glass brittle. A good way  
to clean them is to hold them for a  
few moments over a steaming tea-kettle  
and then polish them briskly but  
carefully with a soft, dry cloth.

A very good substitute for down or  
feathers in cushions is found in the  
cork dust which is used for packing  
fruit, principally grapes, coming from  
abroad. This can be bought at little  
cost from grocers or fruit dealers and  
has the advantage of being sanitary.
