## LABORER KILLED BY WORK TRAIN

### CHARLES COLER RUN OVER BY FLAT CAR, FALLING UNDER NEATH THE WHEELS.

## HEAD ALMOST SEVERED

### Thrown Directly in Path of Wheels, Death Being Instantaneous. Was Stranger Here.

Charles Coler, aged about 35 years, was run over and instantly killed by a work train on the Fort Worth and Denver Saturday afternoon. The accident occurred near Iowa Park, Coler falling from a flat car directly underneath the wheels. His body was badly mangled, the head being almost severed from the body.

He was struck in much the same way that the Mexican was on last Wednesday evening, being thrown from the flat car while the train was rounding a curve. He fell directly in the path of the wheels. One of his arms was severed from the trunk and a wheel passed over his head, crushing it and practically decapitating the unfortunate man.

Justice of the Peace Brothers was summoned and held an inquest, finding that the man came to his death as outlined above. The remains will probably be interred here as the whereabouts of the man's relatives is not known. He had been here but a short time and little is known regarding him.

## SENATE WILL SUBMIT INCOME AMENDMENT

The senate refused to amend the article as drafted by Senator Brown. ## COTTON STATES ELKS' SPECIAL PASSES THROUGH THIS CITY.

The Cotton States Elks' Special, consisting of eight handsomely equipped Pullman cars, arrived here at 9:30 last night, leaving at 9:57, stopping here for water and ice. The run from Fort Worth was made in three hours. The train is scheduled to make a 9,500 mile trip, including the following stops: Denver, Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle and other points of interest.

The cost of the trip on this train will total \$43,750, of which the Pullman Company will receive \$7500. The train will not be uncoupled or switch on the entire trip.

While in this city the Elks were visited by a delegation from the Wichita Falls lodge, which entertained them during their brief stay in the city. There are 175 passengers on the train.

## NEGROES MAY BE TAKERS OF CENSUS

Washington, D. C., July 5.—Concerned about what they suppose may be a possibility that negroes may be sent into the homes of the white residents of the south as enumerators to gather information for the thirteenth decennial census, democratic members of congress will urge President Taft to give instructions that only white enumerators shall be employed in districts south of the Mason and Dixon line. Representatives of the Southern States in congress say they have little hope of preventing the employment of negroes unless the president interferes.

Representatives point to the experience of the Virginia delegation in seeking a portion of the census patronage and this has disturbed the Southerners. Senator Martin and Representative Hay of Virginia, it is said, were informed by Director Durand that the recommendations of the referees in the Southern States would govern wherever possible in the appointments. The supervisors will select enumerators and it is desired by Southern congressmen that they shall be instructed not to employ negroes except for sections where none but negroes reside.

Austin, Tex., July 5.—The funeral services of Ashby James, formerly of Wichita Falls, who died at Austin Saturday morning, were held yesterday afternoon from the late residence in Austin at 5 o'clock, interment being in the Oakwood cemetery. The honorary and active pall bearers were from those associated with him in the capital city.

The Fore Family Reunion. Mr. R. O. Hunt, who has been attending the reunion of the Fore family at Lake Wichita since last Friday, was in town today on his return to his home at Bowie. He reports that of 34 living descendants of the nine Fore brothers and sisters, 47 were present during the four days' camp and the occasion was a most pleasant one. While the reunion broke up this morning, several will remain in camp for a few days longer before returning to their homes. ### SO FAR, HOWEVER, CASUALTIES ARE SMALLER THAN USUAL. NINETEEN DEATHS.

## OBSERVANCE IS GENERAL

### Governor Gilchrist of Florida is Orator for Tammany—Quiet in Texas and Few Accidents.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Ill., July 5.—Smaller than usual, but nevertheless large enough to be alarming is the list of casualties attendant upon this year's Fourth of July observance. Statistics compiled up to this morning by the Chicago Tribune show that nineteen persons were killed yesterday and four hundred and twenty-seven more or less seriously injured. This number will doubtless be increased by accidents today, when the main celebration is being held over the country.

Last year's record is 163 killed and about fifty-five hundred injured, so that from present indications the advocates of a saner Fourth have been in some measure successful.

Dallas, Tex., July 5.—The list of July Fourth accidents in Texas is practically nil this year, due probably to the heavy tax on pyrotechnics imposed by the Thirty-first legislature.

By Associated Press. Wilkesbarre, Pa., July 5.—An overcharged cannon exploded last night and four boys are so badly injured that two will die. Firecrackers set fire to the dress of Rosa Lituske, fatally burning her.

New York, July 5.—Today is being celebrated over the country as Independence Day. Public exercises are being held at many places and the holiday spirit prevails generally. Numerous picnics around this city are entertaining most of the Gotham celebrants. Tammany celebrated with traditional enthusiasm, Governor Gilchrist of Florida being the orator of the day.

Texas News Service Special. Fort Worth, Tex., July 5.—Four accidents occurred today. George Hill, aged 13 years of Glenwood, hands and face torn by exploding cracker; C. W. ## UNIDENTIFIED BODY IS FOUND IN RIVER

### REMAINS OF APPARENTLY YOUNG MAN DISCOVERED THIS MORNING NEAR CEMETERY.

## HOME IN SMITH COUNTY

### Letters in Pockets of Clothes On Bank Bore No Names—Cause Is Not Known.

The body of a young man apparently about 20 years of age, was found floating in the Wichita river this morning near the cemetery, its appearance indicating that death occurred about a week ago. The remains have not been identified.

About 9 o'clock this morning some one found a man's clothes on the Wichita near the slaughter pens and notified Sheriff Walkup, who went up to investigate. It was but a short time before that the body was found floating near the shore a short distance from the bluff upon which the cemetery is situated.

Squire Brothers went out and held an inquest, but it is impossible to determine whether the drowning was accidental or with suicidal intent. Two letters were found in the pockets of the clothes. One was dated June 17th, signed by "Mamma," from Omen, Smith county, Texas. "Dear Boy," was the salutation, there being no envelope. The other was dated June 18, and addressed to "Dear Bob" and signed "Luella." These letters contained merely local gossip and there was nothing in either of them to indicate any trouble.

The deceased was about five feet five inches in height, smooth shaven, with straight black hair. The clothes were neat, but badly worn. The remains were somewhat decomposed when discovered.

In one of the letters was written, "If you go to Oklahoma, be sure to go and see Aunt Betty. She lives near Walters."

There was nothing in the letters or in the clothes to reveal the young man's identity, but it is not believed that there will be any difficulty in establishing it after the authorities at Omen have been communicated with.

Later—Advices from Smith county at 3:15 this afternoon indicate the young man's name to be Robert Collier. The authorities cannot get Omen by phone, but have telegraphed.

## REV. A. J. BUSH RESIGNS HIS PASTORATE IN THIS CITY.

The Times has been handed the following:

"With a feeling of sadness that the ties of pastor and people must be severed, I have resigned the pastorate of the First Christian Church of our city. There is perfect accord between me and church and hence I leave of my own volition.

Our congregation has more than doubled its membership and all departments are in fairly good shape for my successor, whoever he may be.

"My prayers shall ever be for the success and blessing of God upon this good people. A. J. BUSH."

## AUGUSTUS NEWBY IS DEAD AT HOT SPRINGS

News was received here yesterday morning of the death of Augustus Newby of this city at Hot Springs, Arkansas, where he had been in search of health, death being due to paresis. The remains were forwarded from Hot Springs this morning and will arrive here tomorrow, when announcement of the funeral will be made.

Mr. Newby was 53 years of age and had been a resident of this city for nearly thirty years, coming here from Illinois. He was born at Millshoals, Illinois. During his long residence in this city he was associated prominently with the city's interests, being a progressive and public spirited citizen. He was vice president of the City National Bank.

He is survived by a brother and four sisters. The funeral will probably take place tomorrow afternoon or Wednesday morning, definite announcement to be made later.

## NIGHT SERVICE ESTABLISHED BETWEEN HERE AND ABILENE.

As a result of concentrated effort on the part of the commercial organizations here and at Abilene and intermediate points, night mail service will be established on the Wichita Valley within the next two weeks. This will result in much better mail accommodations for all the cities reached by this road and the enterprise in securing it is considered commendable.

## DEAF MUTES OF TEXAS FORM ORGANIZATION

Houston, Tex., July 5.—In the council chamber of the city hall yesterday morning about 150 deaf mutes assembled for the purpose of perfecting a State organization.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 o'clock and before adjournment was taken a permanent State organization was perfected, having for its object the moral and educational advancement of the deaf mutes throughout Texas, and to assist those who perchance may be idle to the securing of positions, and to promote a feeling of good fellowship among them generally.

## MUCH DAMAGE BY RAIN IN MEXICO

### SERIOUS WASHOUTS ON ALL THE LINES AND MEXICO CITY SAID TO BE ENTIRELY CUT OFF.

## CROPS BADLY INJURED

### Cotton That Had Suffered for Lack of Rain is Now Being Washed Out By Floods.

Texas News Service Special. El Paso, Tex., July 5.—The flood situation in Mexico is now very serious, as the rains there continue without intermission. Every main line leading into the Mexican capital is washed out and the washing down of telegraph poles has rendered communication very difficult.

Efforts are being made to repair the damage, but this is being hindered by the continuous downpour.

There has been considerable loss of life; it is not known just how heavy. The town of Lapax in San Luis Potosi has already been completely destroyed. Many other towns have suffered considerably and the news comes from the mountain districts that the loss of life there will be heavy.

It is also reported that the damage in mining camps from the floods has resulted in heavy financial losses, although particulars as to the extent of the injury are not available.

The inundation of the Laguna cotton district south of the city on the Mexican Central has resulted in great loss to crops. Until the rains came the Nazas river was so low that crops suffered, but now conditions are reversed and the crops are being washed out by the floods.

Until the rains cease, little or nothing can be done to relieve the present distressing situation.

## SCHOOL FOR SECRETARIES TO BE HELD AT FORT WORTH.

Elmer E. Baterson of Chicago has been brought to Texas by a number of the commercial secretaries of this State and will conduct a sort of lyceum for them at Fort Worth on August 3, 4 and 5. He will give pointers to the old secretaries and will also give valuable hints and instructions to those intending to embark in this work. Secretary Gohlke will attend.

## INDEPENDENCE DAY BEING QUIETLY OBSERVED HERE.

Wichita Falls observance of Independence today is barely perceptible. The new State law has made fireworks a curiosity and not a one has made its appearance in this city. Very few of the business houses failed to open up this morning, though quite a number closed up at noon, giving their employees a half-holiday. The banks remained closed all day.

Numerous fishing trips and other excursions were taken today by Wichitans and the observance of the holiday is very quiet. A number of excursionists from Olney and other nearby towns are in the city to take in this afternoon's ball game.

## CONNECTICUT TOWN CELEBRATES—PRESIDENT IS GUEST

## STATE BOARD BEGINS FIGHT ON EPIDEMIC

Fort Worth, Tex., July 5.—Drastic measures to prevent the further spread of anthrax or charbon, which is killing men and cattle in Southeast Texas and Southwest Louisiana, are planned today by the State Sanitary Live Stock Commission, which is in session in Ft. Worth today. Chairman R. H. Harris of San Angelo recommends the establishment and enforcement of a rigid quarantine. The tick question was also taken up, but no new changes in quarantine lines are contemplated.

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### NEW LAND IN WASHINGTON THROWN OPEN TO SETTLERS.

Spokane, Wash., July 5.—Though the  
 Spokane reservation in Eastern Wash-  
 ington, to be open to registration of  
 applicants for homestead entry, July  
 15 to August 5, at the United States  
 land office in this city, contains 155,000  
 acres, of which 66,000 have been al-  
 lotted to the Indians, only 6,000 acres  
 classified as agricultural lands will be  
 thrown open to settlement during the  
 drawings at Couer d'Alene, Idaho, Au-  
 gust 9. The remaining 83,000 acres are  
 timber and mineral lands. The tim-  
 bered lands cannot be entered. The  
 reservation is 30 miles northwest of  
 Spokane. As proximity to markets  
 makes these lands desirable, it is ex-  
 pected that thousands of homeseekers  
 will file applications.

The land surrounding the reserva-  
 tion, which is served by the Columbia  
 and the Spokane rivers, has been oc-  
 cupied for years. There are several  
 towns at distances of from 14 to 20  
 miles on the south. These are Reardan,  
 Davenport and Creston. Miles is on  
 the reservation boundary, where the  
 waters of the Spokane and Columbia  
 rivers meet. The town was formerly  
 Fort Spokane. Captain John McA.  
 Webster is the Indian agent in charge.  
 Springdale is about three and one-half  
 miles from the northeast corner of the  
 reservation. At each of these towns  
 there are general stores and hotel and  
 livery accommodations, while Reardan,  
 Davenport and Springdale have banks.  
 These towns may be reached in a few  
 hours' ride from Spokane and from  
 each is a good wagon road to the reser-  
 vation.

The land is level and is covered with  
 a scattering growth of yellow pine  
 trees, which will yield from 500,000 to  
 750,000 feet, board measure, the quar-  
 ter section. There is little under-  
 growth. There are two sawmills, each  
 within a mile of the boundary of the  
 reservation. The soil is sandy with a  
 little white clay intermingled. It  
 should probably be rated as agricul-  
 tural land of the second class. The al-  
 titude is 1,800 feet above sea level, or  
 a little lower than the city of Spo-  
 kane. The climate is similar to that  
 of other portions of the Inland Empire.  
 There are no high winds, as the valley  
 at that point is protected by moun-  
 tain ranges on both sides.

The land is best adapted to fruit rais-  
 ing. Soil, climate and altitude render  
 it especially available for apple grow-  
 ing and small fruit culture. To insure  
 crops, irrigation should be provided.  
 There is no water available to be sup-  
 plied by gravity, but wells from 25 to  
 35 feet in depth should provide ample  
 supply.

Much of the land allotted to the In-  
 dians has been and can be leased  
 through the Indian agent. When an In-  
 dian dies, his allotment, on applica-  
 tion of the heirs, is sold by the Indian  
 agent to the highest bidder and the  
 proceeds distributed among the heirs.  
 Lands belonging to Indians, who are  
 unable to utilize them by reason of  
 age, illness or disability, may be sold in  
 like manner.

Many of these allotments are irri-  
 gable from springs and creeks cross-  
 ing their own boundaries and are suit-  
 able for the production of all fruits  
 grown in this climate. Peaches and  
 pears equal to the choicest fruits ex-  
 hibited in our exhibitions are grown  
 on these lands.

Chamokane creek, which bounds the  
 reservation on the east side, is one of  
 the best trout streams in the north-  
 west. The reserve is a natural haunt  
 for pheasants, grouse and quail, and  
 there is some big game. Heretofore  
 whites were not permitted to hunt on  
 these lands without permission from  
 the Indian agent, and as an Indian  
 never carries a shotgun game birds are  
 plentiful.

The mineral lands have never been  
 opened to prospecting. The mineral  
 belt, containing the great ledges of  
 the Deer Trail country, crosses the  
 reservation. The tungsten mines at  
 Germana are on its border. Samples  
 of copper, silver and tungsten ore of  
 remarkable richness have been brought  
 out by prospectors, who made secret  
 excursions into the forbidden territory.

The Washington Water Power Com-  
 pany of Spokane is developing an im-  
 mense power at the Little Falls on the  
 Spokane river, adjoining the lands to  
 be opened. This will provide electric  
 power for pumping and other purposes  
 at a small cost, as the distance of  
 transmission is short. Two lines of  
 electric railways are projected from  
 Spokane to Miles. One of these will  
 be built by the Spokane and Inland  
 Empire Electric Railway system, head-  
 ed by Jay P. Graves, who is backed  
 by New York, Chicago and Boston cap-  
 italists. This company already has

more than 229 miles of electric lines in  
 operation in Eastern Washington and  
 Northern Idaho. One of its lines is  
 within a few miles of the Couer  
 d'Alene reservation.

The Indians on the Spokane reserva-  
 tion are generally intelligent and  
 peaceable and all are self-supporting.  
 In character they are far above the  
 vagabond Siwashas, who frequent the  
 alleys and back doors of the city, as  
 the white farmers are above the com-  
 mon hoboes. Chief Joseph, head of the  
 once powerful Nez Perce tribe, who  
 gave General O. O. Howard his hardest  
 fight in the frontier days, lived there  
 several years after his banishment  
 from the Snake river country. He was  
 the most intelligent Indian of his time  
 and his death was deplored by the  
 whites and reds alike.

Antoine Shelea is the sole survivor  
 of the old chieftains. He lives in the  
 Antwoine valley, near the Okanogan  
 river. In the early days there was only  
 one great chief, but before his death  
 he appointed three, one of whom is old  
 Antoine, who is head of the tribe. Most  
 of the Indians live in houses and culti-  
 vate small farms, while the squaws  
 busy themselves with basket making  
 and bead work, at which they are very  
 adept. They like to visit and they are  
 never too busy to feast and talk of the  
 days that were and of those to come.

**Last English King in a Battle.**  
The battle of Dettingen, in Bavaria, on the 16th (27th O. S.) of June, 1743, between the British, Hanoverian and Hessian troops (32,000 men), under command of George II., and the French troops (30,000 men), under Marshal Noailles, which resulted in the victory of the allied troops, was the last occasion on which an English king fought on the battlefield. His majesty continued the whole time in the heat of all the action, which was said by those who witnessed it to have been as fierce a conflict as had ever been known.

On the morning of the battle the king appeared in the same red coat he had worn at Oudenarde, thirty-five years before, taking his place at the head of the seven battalions of guards. About noon he ordered a general advance, and during the movements it entailed he was very nearly taken by the enemy, but was rescued by the Twenty-second regiment, who, in remembrance, wore a sprig of oak in their caps upon the anniversary of the battle for many years afterward.—London Tit-Bits.

**The Children of the Great.**  
There is a tendency for children of exceptional parents to regress toward the average stock. Galton terms this tendency filial regression. This, the London hospital points out, applies equally to exceptional physical and mental characters. Thus, though tall stature may run in certain families, yet there is always a tendency to revert to the mean average size. Similarly the children of a genius tend to have somewhat less than their father's power, but more than the average of the race. According to Professor Pearson, distinguished parents are just ten times more likely to have distinguished offspring than undistinguished parents. Still, such cases as the Darwins, father and sons; the two Pitts, Philip and Alexander, the Great are exceptional. Similarly also the children of a criminal tend to be less vicious than the father, though morally inferior to the average man.

This codex covers nearly the whole of the Old and New Testaments and was discovered in the Convent of St. Catherine on Mount Sinai by the celebrated Tischendorf. It is generally ascribed to the fourth century.—New York American.

### BAS THOMAS WILL RUN FOR GOVERNOR

SAYS SUCCESS OF TRIP OVER THE STATE HAS LED HIM TO DECIDE DEFINITELY.

### TALKS REGARDING PLANS

Says Several Senators Who Voted Against Him Cannot Be Re-Elected—Well Pleased With Self.

State Senator Bascom Thomas, whose recent performances have attracted considerable attention and created considerable amusement, passed through Wichita Falls yesterday morning on his way to Hillsboro from Quan-

nah, where he delivered an address yesterday.

The Senator was seen by a Times man and did not object to talking about himself while the train waited; in fact talking has always been the Senator's long suit.

"Yes, I have about decided to run for governor next year," he said in reply to a question. "I have been thinking about it and my trips over the state have led me to make up my mind definitely. I do not believe that either Bailey or prohibition is the issue this year and in my speeches have confined myself to discussing the evils of the lobby. I am for submission, however, and contend that unless the lobby is controlled, submission will be defeated in the legislature in 1911 by a larger majority than it was in 1909. In his conversation the senator does not exude sanctimony as copiously as he does in his public speeches.

"Nearly all of my speeches have been in the districts of the senators

who voted against me. Jim Terrell won't run for reelection because he is afraid to. I have been at work among people over there. Sen. Senter had better not run again, either; I spoke at Garland, in his district, not long ago, and three thousand people cheered me wildly. We were to have met at Rockwall but somebody was afraid. The committee reinvited me and I will speak there some time this month.

"Did you see the Dallas News yesterday? They gave Poindester's speech two columns and mine two lines."

"If I don't run for lieutenant-governor, and I don't think I will, Holsey will be in the race. He isn't much of a speaker but he has thousands of friends."

"The Times man asked Thomas about his Buda speech in which he condemned legislative excursions:

"I plead guilty," said Thomas. "I went on that San Antonio excursion just like everybody else, but it had a string tied to it, just the same."

Senator said that he would be busy all summer making speeches at barbecues, picnics and the like, and that he would be at Childress later in this month. He seemed well pleased with himself and the success of his campaign.
