RESISTING ARREST FOR TAM-PERING WITH AIR BRAKES.

Trouble Occurred on West Bound Denver-Robbery May Have Been The Motive.

R. A. Scott, a white man, is in jall, and John Wesley Brown, a negro, is lying dangerously hurt at the depot, as a result of trouble on the westbound through Denver train early this morn-

The two men were brought here on No. 4 by Constable Yeary of Electra, near which town the affair took place. Between this city and Electra the train was forced to stop twice on account of some one tampering with the air brakes and these two men were suspected. On arriving at Electra, Constable Yeary placed the white man, Scott, under arrest. The negro resisted capture and ran from Yeary, who pursued him several miles out into the country, finally shooting him in the back. He was then caught and brought to this city.

Conductor Stayton was in charge of the train and after satisfying himself that Scott and the negro were the ones who had been tampering with the air brake, he complained to Constable Yeary. The latter gave orders for no one to leave the train and then attempted to arrest the two men. Scott was arrested without resitsance, but and ran, with results as above.

Brown is very badly hurt and there is some doubt as to his recovery.
