### FINANCIAL LOSS HEAVY PLAN LARGE BUILDING

Three Quarters of a Million Dollars Damage at Springfield-Conditions Better This Afternoon.

By Associated Press. Kansasc City, Mo., July 8.—Daybreak revealed much distress throughout the flood district in Missouri and Kansas. Thousands of people passed the night council this morning the question of in the upper stories and upon the roofs

Besides causing suffering among the farmers, the flood has done great damage to unharvested crops and property. Relief trains and boats loaded with supplies have been unable to reach their destinations. to make some changes in the ordinance

At Pattensburg, Missouri, nineteen hundred people are crowded into the upper stories of store buildings, lodge halls and school houses. At Pomona Kansas, where Atchison train toppled over, the situation is serious. The passengers were rescued and spent the night in the homes of farmers.

Pattensburg reports that the water is eight feet deep on the main street and that three-fourths of the people in the town have lost eyerything.

At Springfield, Missouri, the Jordan river is half a mile wide. Three are reported drowned and the damage is about three quarters of a million dollars. The St. Louis and San Francisco bridge has been washed out at Rod gersville. Scores of residence factorles and wholesale houses are flooded.

Later-Later in the day the flood situation is improved. At Pattensburg the water has fallen fourteen inches and all the refugees have been removed from the house and tree tops.

Gathering Cloves. Cloves are now cultivated in many of the tropical regions of the earth. A clove tree begins to beer at the age of ten years and continues until it reaches the age of seventy-five years. There are two crops a year, one in June and one in December. The tree is an evergreen and grows from forty to fifty feet high, with large oblong leaves and crimson flowers at the end of small branches in clusters of from ten to twenty. The tree belongs to the same botanical order as the guava. The cloves, which are the undeveloped buds, are at first white, then light green and at the time of gathering

bright red. Pieces of white cloth are spread under the trees at harvesting time, and the branches are beaten gently with bamboo sticks until the cloves drop. They are dried in the sun, being tossed about daily until they attain the rich dark color which proclaims

Cards are square shaped pieces of pasteboard printed with various devices and employed as a business medium by money changers. They are usually made up in packs of fifty-two, one for each week of the year. A good many people play cards for pleasure, in which case their opponents are said to be buying experience. In most card games the rule is that the cards may be cut, but not otherwise marked. This rule is not strictly observed in games in which only three cards are used. Indeed, the marking of cards has attained a high degree of perfection since the introduction of numerous card index systems. Fashions change in card games as in everything else. Playing cards should not be confused with score cards, which are rather larger. or with visiting cards, which are smaller.-Fry's Magazine.

But the murdered man was a closer calculator even than his assassins, for he had previously poisoned a part of the provisions, that he might appropriate to himself the whole of the spoil. This precious triumvirate were found dead together.

Salt Codfish Omelet.

Soak a piece of salt codfish about six inches, squere overnight. Split six crackers and lay them in cold water, just enough to cover them. In the morning pick the fish fine and mix well with the soaked crackers, three well beaten eggs and a piece of butter the size of an egg, also salt and pepper. Take one quart of milk and add to it one dessertspoonful of flour. Both five minuter and pour over in the dish in which it is to be baked. Bake twenty minutes.-Boston Post.

TRAINING NOW GENERAL

By Associated Press.
Denver, Colo., July 8.— 'Education unity and its preservation while meeting the demands for industrial train. i.g." was the subject of the address of Eugene Davenport, Dean of the University of Illinois, at the session today of the Department of Secondary Education, of the National Educational Association.

"The demand for industrial training is a demand coming from 90 per cent of the people," said Dean Davenport They are disposed to insist that the schools shall fit them for their calling as they fit people of other professions for theirs. This demand being natural and fundamental will be abiding. It has been met already by the colleges; it has not been met by the secondary schools. Two solutions are open: To add industrial courses to existing schools, or to establish separate in-

"The objections to the separate school are, briefly, that it can neve: be so good a school; it is not well to educate people of different professions separately; to establish separate schools will injure if not destroy existing high schools

. The fatal defect of the separate school is that it sacrifices education to training and narrows the man instead of broadening him. The general purposes of education should be two-fold Efficiency in some profession and breadth of view regarding all other 48-1tp professions."
