### "LEST WE FORGET."

Considerable complaint is being made at the action of the City Board of Equalization in raising valuations of property far above 1908. It must be remembered that the Independent School District follows strictly City assessments and that any raise made by the city is practically sure to be adopted by the school board.

The Times had a faint recollection that some promises were made the tax payers just before the May election, when the school and paving bonds were voted, and therefore reprints the following extract from an article in the Daily Times of May 15th:

"The tax levy, both in the school district and city proper, is now at the maximum allowed by law, and the issuance of these bonds will not raise any citizen's taxes one cent."

And Again:  
"Moreover, these bonds can be issued on the basis of last year's valuations, and there need not and will not be any inflated assessment on this account."

We trust, therefore, that where there has been no change in the character of the property (no new improvements having been made), that last year's assessments be followed strictly. If this is not done, appeals from our leading citizens may have less weight hereafter.

### BEEN DIVORCED FORTY YEARS TRIED TO PROVE SHE WASN'T.

Spokane, Wash., July 8.—Urged by her relatives to attack a divorce granted in Illinois forty-two years ago, Mrs. Hanna Douglas, an aged and infirm resident of Los Angeles, will be appraised in a few days that the supreme court of the State of Washington has decided that she is neither the wife nor widow of the late Hiram L. Douglas, who died in Spokane in 1900, leaving a valuable estate. They were married in Michigan in 1853 and separated five years afterward, when Douglas went to Illinois, where he instituted an action for divorce, alleging desertion. The records show the decree was granted. Douglas came to the Northwest in 1888 and located on a homestead in Spokane county. He was killed in a runaway accident two years later, when his daughter and her husband, George W. Teller, began to develop the farm, making it a valuable property. To establish heirship Mrs. Douglas alleges that she never heard of the divorce until after her husband's death, asserting that it was void because it had not been signed and that it was procured by fraud. The supreme court ruled that it is now too late to attack the divorce, thus awarding the estate to Mrs. Teller.

### BRIDES AND BRIDEGROOMS MAY BE EXAMINED FREE.

Spokane, Wash., July 8.—Merry Dan Cupid emerged from the fray with flying colors when the Spokane county medical society decided at a meeting in Spokane that its members will make examinations of prospective brides and bridegrooms free of charge the remainder of 1909. The criminal code, effective June 12, provides that all persons must qualify as to physical and moral fitness before a license to marry may be issued. When Dr. J. G. Cunningham presented a motion for free examination a lively debate was precipitated, several of the members insisting upon a fee of from \$3 to \$10, but after considerable talk the cohorts of Daniel broke down all opposition and carried the day. R. W. Butler, auditor of Spokane county, who issues the marriage licenses, said the consensus of opinion is that the new law is a good one and not framed for the benefit of the physicians, but for the good of the general public.

#### DEMAND FOR INDUSTRIAL TRAINING NOW GENERAL.

Denver, Colo., July 8.—"Education and its preservation while meeting the demands for industrial training," was the subject of the address of Eugene Davenport, Dean of the University of Illinois, at the session today of the Department of Secondary Education, of the National Educational Association.

"The demand for industrial training is a demand coming from 90 per cent of the people," said Dean Davenport. "They are disposed to insist that the schools shall fit them for their calling as they fit people of other professions for theirs. This demand being natural and fundamental will be abiding. It has been met already by the colleges; it has not been met by the secondary schools. Two solutions are open: To add industrial courses to existing schools, or to establish separate industrial schools."

"The objections to the separate school are, briefly, that it can never be so good a school; it is not well to educate people of different professions separately; to establish separate schools will injure if not destroy existing high schools."

"The fatal defect of the separate school is that it sacrifices education to training and narrows the man instead of broadening him. The general purposes of education should be twofold. Efficiency in some profession and breadth of view regarding all other professions."

#### NEW YORK CAN SOON SAY "HELLO" TO PARIS.

New York, July 8.—Some four thou-  
sand feet of copper wire forming the  
antenna for the Radio Telephone Com-  
pany was strung from the fiftieth  
story of the Metropolitan Life Building  
this morning and within a short time,  
the newest De Forrest system of wire-  
less telephony and telegraphy will be  
opened commercially as a long dis-  
tance factor in wireless communication  
between the principal cities on the At-  
lantic coast. The first message will be  
sent between the Metropolitan tower  
station and the highest point in Phil-  
adelphia, which has been secured for  
the central station in the Quaker City.  
The installation of the station in the  
Metropolitan Life tower is the first  
definite step in the widely heralded  
talk—via wireless, New York to Paris.  
The station on the Metropolitan tower  
is on the fiftieth floor, 700 feet  
above the sidewalk and the antenna  
extends, umbrella shaped, to the  
Fourth avenue roof of the building,  
from which the leading wires pass into  
the office of the company on the ninth  
floor. The work of erecting the an-  
tenna, which is the largest in the world,  
except the one controlled by the same  
company on the Eiffel tower in Paris,  
was begun in the storm Friday night,  
when two wires were sent aloft during  
the progress of the disturbed elements.  
While the workmen were busy mak-  
ing fast these two wires, and the wind  
was whistling its most strident tune,  
an interesting experiment was made  
from the top of the swaying campanile  
that showed the marvelous cutting up  
of the air currents in the vicinity of  
the apex of the tall tower. A score of  
toy balloons were liberated and at once  
were borne away to leeward with the  
speed of so many frightened gulls.  
For probably a hundred yards they re-  
mained together, after which one af-  
ter another became separated, halted  
in flight, circled for a moment around  
the antenna wires and then, apparently  
in the teeth of the fifty mile gale,  
drifted back to the tower around which  
they were driven like so many swal-  
lows, for nearly half an hour. At  
length, one by one, they were caught  
in eddy which bore them far away  
from the disturbed air currents and  
drifted down the wind to become lost  
in the smother to leeward.

Meanwhile, the lightning played  
around the tower and the rain fell in  
torrents, but the linemen continued  
their labors despite the frequent flash-  
es of light, until the wires were secured  
and the swaying antenna was in  
place. Tonight the batteries and the  
paraphernalia will be connected and  
communication will be begun between  
New York, Philadelphia and the al-  
ready perfected system on the Great  
Lakes.

The story of wireless is like a page  
from a fairy tale. Scarcely more than  
a decade has drifted into history since  
wireless telegraphy was given to a  
wating world. During that period  
many scientists have devoted their  
lives to the work of developing the art  
of wireless. That little has been ac-  
complished by the majority of these  
workers is a patent fact. Indeed, with  
the exception of Dr. Lee de Forrest  
and a few co-workers in his laboratory  
absolutely nothing of real value has  
been evolved. Dr. de Forrest has in-  
vented a wireless telephone, "Radio"  
the scientist calls it, and within the  
short space of two years, it has become  
a commercial system on the Great  
Lakes, as well as a factor in the navies  
of three great nations.

Lieutenants Colin and Jeanette of the  
French navy, working in conjunction  
with Dr. de Forrest in the develop-  
ment of Radio telephony have reported  
most satisfactory results, and have  
talked a distance of one hundred miles,  
between the cruiser Conde and the ar-  
senal at Toulon.

Ultimate success in wireless tele-  
phony by the radio system is assured  
by the results already obtained. These  
results are not mere chance, but the  
effects from causes that are known to  
the veriest tyro in the field of wire-  
less science. The discovery was made  
some two years ago that a wireless  
telegraph message was accompanied  
under certain conditions by a peculiar  
yet distinctive buzzing sound. There  
had been theories a plenty before this  
time, many of which had been worked  
out mathematically by Dr. de Forrest,  
John Stone and others. Many ex-  
periments had been made with in-  
duction telephones without success at  
any distance beyond possibly one mile,  
and to attain even this result with an  
induction phone was difficult, unreli-  
able and entailed the use of cumber-  
some apparatus. Dr. de Forrest, catch-  
ing the distinctive hum of the anten-

na wires, found the solution and he at  
once began experimenting on the de-  
velopment of intelligible sound through  
the waves of ether. The principle he  
already knew, but to evolve a practical  
apparatus from the wealth of theo-  
retical knowledge has been the work  
of many months in his laboratory, as-  
sisted by experts of known standing on  
both sides of the Western Ocean.
