

CONSOLIDATED net income of Pioneer and its subsidiaries for the quarter ended Sept. 30 amcunted to \$1,591,903. This compares with \$1,665.135 for the third quarter of 1971. Consolidated net income for the first nine months of this year amounted to \$7,409,550, compared with \$6,886,757 for the same period in 1971.

Earnings per share for the third quarter amounted to 21 cents on 7,468,132 shares outstanding during this period. This compares with 22 cents per share on the 7,468,132 average number of common shares outstanding at the end of the same period last year.




