PITCHED FIGHT IN MONTAGUE COUNTY

TWO NEGROES ESCAPE AFTER BATTLE WITH POSSE OF CITIZENS.

FUGITIVES MAKE ESCAPE

Had Held Up and Robbed Farmer and Made Escape After Exciting Chase.

Bowie, Tex., Sept. 15.—A posse of officers and farmers south of town engaged in a pitched battle with two negroes early this morning when an attempt was made to arrest the blacks for attacking and robbing a white farmer near Alvord late last night.

The negroes escaped to the woods after many shots were exchanged, the blacks being armed with Winchester in a covered wagon in which were also two negro women.

A farmer whose name is unknown, fired a shot gun at the blacks when assailed and slightly wounded the women, the men seeking safety in flight.

The farmer had met the negroes two miles from Alvord and they robbed him of twenty dollars. He came to Bowie and this morning Marshal John Wales and Constable Marvin Edwards, with a posse, began the search, overtaking the blacks on a side road and a battle ensued. No whites were injured. The officers are still hunting the negroes.

LATER—The farmer's name was J. Evans. He lived near the negroes, whose names are Charles and Ada Matties; Ben and Liza Hanson. The negroes left Fort Worth last Monday for Lawton, Okla., to pick cotton.

NEGRO MURDERER HAS BEEN CAUGHT—INDICTED

Texas News Service Special. Newton, Sept. 15.—The grand jury was today convened and returned an indictment charging Tom Wilson, a negro, with the murder of County Attorney A. F. Nicks. It was learned today that Wilson was captured Sunday night, but was spirited to Jasper, where he was kept secretly in jail.

Wilson was brought here late Tuesday. He shot Nicks Saturday night.

NEW ROLLING STOCK FOR W. F. ROUTE

ORDERS PLACED FOR A LARGE AMOUNT OF NEW EQUIPMENT FOR LOCAL ROADS.

MORE CARS AND ENGINES

Three New 'Mogul' Engines, Five Passenger Coaches and Twenty Freight Cars.

It was announced today by the Wichita Falls and Northwest that a large order for new rolling stock and equipment had been placed, including the following:

Five new passenger coaches.
Twenty new freight cars.
Three new engines.
Three refrigerator cars.

Four of the new passenger coaches are to be delivered in December and one immediately, as soon as the order can be filled. The freight cars are to be delivered in December.

One of the engines is to be delivered at once, the other two at a later date. The engines are of the Baldwin 'Mogul' type and are to be among the best in use.

The arrival of this new equipment will make the Wichita Falls Route one of the best equipped in the state and will take it far out of the class of any other roads built by home capital. All of it will have been received here by the first of the year.

No particulars as to how he met his death have as yet been received.

KATSURA TALKS.

Says That Burden of Taxation in Japan is Too Oppressive.

Tokyo, Japan, Sept. 15.—The speech of Premier Katsura before the bankers club of this city was a review of the financial condition of the country. He expressed the hope that by lowering the rate of taxation the burden patriotically borne by a considerable section of the population would be relieved.

OPERATION OF CAR LINE STARTED AT NOON TODAY

First Car Has Moved Over Tracks. Party of Business Men Make Inspection Trip.

History of Street Car Line.

Jan. 8—Henry Bayles, N. Henderson and Charles Malone apply for street car franchise.
Jan. 12—City Council submits blanket franchise proposition.
Jan. 14—J. A. Kemp and Frank Kell accept and are awarded the franchise.
Feb. 25—Material contracts closed.
March 6—Electrical equipment purchased.
March 9—Laying of rails commenced.
March 28—Rolling stock ordered.
June 19—Rolling stock arrives.
Sept. 11—Laying of rails completed.
Sept. 15—Plant completed and cars start at 12.10.

Wichita Falls street car system—built, equipped and in operation—is now an accomplished fact.

At 12.10 this afternoon the first street car sailed out of the car barns on 9th street, coughed and stuttered a minute over the switch at Junction with the main track, and rolled off down the rails toward town. It was quickly done. Almost in the twinkling of an eye took place the metamorphosis of Wichita Falls from a town into a city.

The first street car was manned by General Manager Van Brunt on the front end, accompanied by the entire staff of motormen and conductors. The passengers included Frank Kell and Farmer Clark of Chicago. Numerous others, mostly small boys, were among the first to ride.

The street car came on down and circled the loop, returning to the barns for a few moments, then back down town again where a party of city officials and prominent citizens were taken out on an inspection trip over the lines.

The expression on Mr. Van Brunt's face as he skillfully coaxed the handsome green coach over the line, was one of ennui. He looked bored and said to have actually yawned several times during the trip, as if getting a street car line started was a matter of no moment.

The same cannot be said of Mr. Kell. He looked as proud as a mother with a new babe and the smile that enfolded his features did not belie the emotions he felt. Mr. Clark's rotund face was furrowed with an excellent imitation of the Taft smile.

The dynamo was started this morning soon after the arrival of Frank Askew of Dallas, representing the Westinghouse people. He very quickly found the trouble and had the machine running in a little time. In return he was extended the privilege of being the very first to pay carfare over the line.

Tom Sims was the first local man to dig up his nickel.

The route of the car to town was an ovation in miniature. Some who saw them rolling grandly along broke out in cheers and others waved hats or handkerchiefs to show how proud they were. Here and there a horse got excited and tried to climb an imaginary tree. A hen rustled her brood off the right of way just in time.

After the first trip the car was topped in front of the city hall, where the party of citizens was awaiting for it. Those in the party included, General Manager Van Brunt, motorman; W. H. Whisenant, conductor; R. E. Huff, F. H. Gohlke, N. Henderson, J. M. Bland, T. B. Greenwood, G. D. Anderson, W. E. Montgomery, W. E. Brothers, T. J. Taylor, W. Lee Moore, W. E. Skeen, J. A. Richolt, E. P. Walsh, H. B. Patterson, C. W. Dean, J. T. Young, R. V. Gwinn, Edgar Rye. Others joined the party later on.

A picture of the car was taken at the corner of 7th and Ohio, with Messrs. Van Brunt and Kell in charge. The car line will be in regular operation before the day is over and regular traffic will probably be put under way tomorrow. The force of conductors and motormen are ready for work.

The party of citizens was taken to the lake this afternoon, all enjoying the ride immensely. The street car was the center of interest all along the route and was viewed by every car who could get near enough to see it. Now that the line is actually in operation, the management feels that it is amply repaid for the trouble it has had in the running of the cars is believed to be a good cause for jubilation.

BAILEY TO REPLY TO BRYAN SPEECH

IS THOUGHT TO BE FRAMING WARM RESPONSE TO THE INNUENDOES.

NO PEACE DOVES AROUND

Every Indication is That There Will Be Warm Fight Before Matter is Settled.

Texas News Service Special. Galveston, Tex., Sept. 15.—An effort was made by the Texas News Service correspondent to draw Senator Bailey out on W. J. Bryan's Dallas and Fort Worth speeches yesterday, but the Senator prefers to withhold definite comment until he replies to Bryan's veiled attack at Dallas Saturday night. Senator Bailey is not trying to hide the fact that his reply will be warm, but at the same time he will refrain from personalities.

His ready acceptance of the Nebraska's challenge was taken to indicate here that Bailey intends to fight to the finish, and it is expected that his Dallas address will again draw fire from Bryan's guns.

Bailey this morning said he had not read Bryan's speech fully, but understood he disagrees with some Texas democrats and congressmen in their stand on the tariff.

Bailey appears confident. The opening fight between Bailey and Bryan is significant, because of Bryan's and Campbell's reported desire to run against Bailey for Senator.

THOMPSON RETURNS TO WICHITA FALLS

WILL RESUME FORMER DUTIES WITH WICHITA FALLS ROUTE AT ONCE.

NOW WITH GOVERNMENT

Has Been With Interstate Commerce Commission—Formerly With State Commission.

R. A. Thompson, now engineer for the Interstate Commerce Commission, and one of the leading authorities on railroad engineering in the South, will shortly return to Wichita Falls to accept a position with the Wichita Falls Route.

This announcement was authorized this morning by Vice President and General Manager Kell of the Wichita Falls Route.

Mr. Thompson was formerly chief engineer for the Texas railroad Commission, which position he held almost from the very creation of the office. He resigned last year to accept a position with the Wichita Falls Route, giving that up later on to accept the Interstate Commerce Commission work at which he has been engaged for the

The exact date for Mr. Thompson's return here has not been set, but it will be some time in the near future. News was received here today that George F. Cotter, for many years general superintendent of the Fort Worth and Denver, has resigned his position with that road, effective on October 1. H. A. Airships of War.
 From the Houston Chronicle.
 The visit of thirty active officers to Germany suggests the need of renewed activity on the part of the peace societies and the lack of world-wide jurisdiction of The Hague court which might be secured by international treaties between the great powers. So far as is known, the Japanese are not contemplating going to war with any nation in particular, as long as Europe and the United States permit them to absorb Korea, Manchuria and perhaps other Chinese provinces. But these military gentlemen from Japan have selected Germany as a good country to visit because of Zeppelin's success with his dirigible balloon, which to the oriental eye is potentially a war balloon. Count Yamada invented an airship during the progress of the Russo-Japanese war which at the time occasioned much discussion in aeronautical and military circles. It is reported that he has completed it since and equipped it with aerial torpedoes. Zeppelin's balloon, in which the other day he made a flight with passengers practically across Germany, from Friedrichshafen, near Switzerland, to Berlin, a distance of 400 miles, makes it a very formidable machine for use in war. 'Inventors of Europe,' said the Kaiser not so very long ago, 'preserve your best ideas for your own country.' How far he will cause this maxim to be applied in the case of his Japanese visitors remains to be seen.

Many social philosophers hold the theory that the perfection of the death dealing machines by increasing the danger of war serves the cause of universal peace. Krupp, the German maker of big cannon, believed this, and Noble, whose peace prize of a considerable sum is awarded annually, made his fortune out of dynamite. But just as every kind hearted person is disposed to congratulate civilization on having outgrown the custom of barbarous war from this cause, or from the work of the peace societies, or the spread of Christianity and common sense, rumors of war are heard, or it actually breaks out, as threw between Russia and Japan and the present war between Spain and Morocco.

Certainly the air ships in warfare will be one of the features of the next considerable conflict, and it will be such a terrible engine of destruction that it would seem it can only be adequately met by another airship of war for a battle royal in the air.

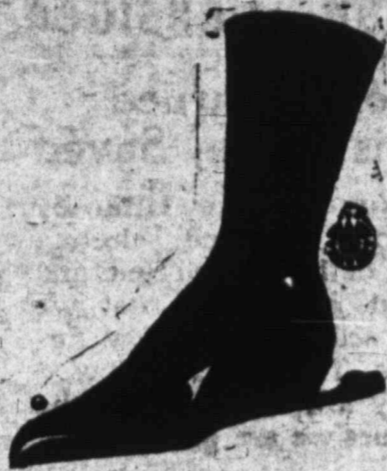

Abn Erlanger Snowballed.

A small bald headed man, about 50 years old sat in the rear seat of the lower right hand box of the Grand Theatre last night, says the Kansas City Journal. This man was Abraham L. Erlanger, president of Klaw and Erlanger, the head of the most powerful theatrical syndicate in the world.

He made his entrance unnoticed, did this man who has produced so many plays and seen so many more. With his hands folded in his lap he watched the progress of the play, nodding his head at some of the best lines, but smiling.
