BRYAN WILL REPLY AT EL PASO TODAY

HE TO ANSWER BAILEY'S ARGU-
MENTS AT FOUR O'CLOCK
THIS AFTERNOON.

IS CORDIALLY GREETED

Reception at El Paso Was Sincere.
The Nature of His Reply Is Not
Known.

Texas News Service Special.
El Paso, Sept. 27.—William J. Bryan
arrived at El Paso at 1 o'clock today
from New Mexico and was met at the
station by an enthusiastic reception
committee.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon he will
deliver his address defending his position
on free raw materials and replying
to Senator Bailey's recent speech
at Dallas.

Since the senator's speech, considerable
pressure has been brought to
bear on Bryan by his followers in the
state, and in this city especially, to
answer the arguments and criticisms
made by the Texas in his Dallas ad-
dress, and the Nebraska was finally
prevailed upon to respond.

His address here this afternoon is
expected to be closely along tariff lines,
and Bryan's friends do not expect him
to indulge in personalities. He has not
outlined what the nature of his answer
will be, but it is presumed it will be
along the same lines as the newspaper
interview given out a few days ago.

FREDERICK GOES AHEAD; MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Frederick, Okla., Sept. 27.—At a
meeting of the city council last week,
arrangements were made with the Fos-
ter-Harris Gin Company for twelve
are street lights, to be installed as
soon as they arrive. The lights are
to cost \$8.00 per month each. Nine are
to be paid for by the city, one by the
Foster-Harris Gin Company and one
each by the Frisco and Northwestern
railway companies.

The paving proposition is assuming
large proportions in Frederick. The
petitions for the paving of Grand Ave-
nue and Eleventh streets has been ac-
cepted by the city council, the work
ordered done and bids are now being
received for the construction.

The paving will include 20 blocks
and when completed will greatly add
to the neat appearance of the little
city.

Bids for the erection of the new city
hall will be awarded on October 6th.
The plans of Architect Prim
have been adopted by the city council.
The building will be two stories high
and the basement, size 42x50 feet. It
will face the west. The basement will
contain the cells and police court; the
first floor, the fire department quar-
ters and offices of the mayor, clerk,
assessor, police judge, etc., and the
second floor will be a large auditorium,
with stage for public use.

AERIAL EXHIBITIONS CELEBRATION FEATURE

New York, Sept. 27.—Water yielded
to the air today as the most prominent
element in the Hudson-Fulton celebra-
tion. The stiff breeze that blew from
the northwest out to sea made the
prospects for an aerial exhibition to-
day far from encouraging. On the
streets thousands watched the towers
of the Metropolitan, Times and
Brooklyn Eagle buildings for the code
flags that would tell what aeroplanes
were likely to fly. Palisades Park and
the shaft erected as a memorial to
Henry Houson on Spuyten Duyvil
Hill were dedicated today. Governor

speakers.

STATE'S HANDS TIED.

Can Do Nothing to Prevent Piping Out
of Gas.

McAlester, Okla., Sept. 27.—Judge
Campbell in the federal court today
entered a sweeping temporary injunc-
tion, restraining Governor Haskell and
all state officials, attorneys, or em-
ployees of the state, from preventing
the piping of gas out of Oklahoma.
They are also enjoined from institut-
ing or conducting any suit in Okla-
homa state courts, seeking to inter-
fere with the piping out of gas until
a final decision is made by the court.
The plaintiffs are the Kansas Natural
Gas Company, Garnett Gas Company
and O. D. Bleakley.

FACTORIES PLAN NEW EXTENSIONS

FOUR LOCAL MANUFACTURING
CONCERNS WILL SOON MAKE
ADDITIONS.

NO DETAILS ANNOUNCED

All Are Considered Certain, But the
Plans Have Not Yet Been Com-
pleted.

No less than four of the manufac-
turing concerns of Wichita Falls are,
it is learned planning additions and ex-
tensions, this fall. They include the
brick factory, the foundry, the cotton
oil mill plant and the candy factory.
The details of the improvements con-
templated by these concerns have not
been announced, but it is known that
the extensions will be very material.

All of these concerns are compar-
atively new and the fact that they are
already enlarging their plants speak
well for the success which has attend-
ed their efforts. Definite announce-
ment as to the size and nature of the
several improvements planned will
probably be made early next month.
The total cost of all four will, it is
believed, pass the fifty thousand mark.

These new structures this fall will
keep up the building activity which has
been so brisk so far this year and will
draw the total for 1909 much nearer
to the desired million mark.

VIOLATION OF CONTRACT

Court Holds That Agreement Between
City and Road Is Not In-
valid.

HANDSOME DOME ON NEW M. E. CHURCH

PRESENTED BY RAILROAD MEN OF
THIS CITY AT A COST OF
\$600.

"DUSTY" RHODES' IDEA

It Has Created Much Favorable Com-
ment—Other Handsome New
Windows.

The railroad men of this city have
presented the new Methodist Episco-
pal Church, now nearing completion
with a beautiful glass dome, the in-
stallation of which has been completed.
This dome is the gift of all the local
railroad men and was installed at a
cost of \$600.

The dome is simple in design, but is
attractive. It is vari-colored glass, and
in the apex appear the words, 'Gift
of the Railroad Men.' The position
is the most prominent in the church.

The idea was that of 'Dusty'
Rhodes, one of the best known Denver
conductors on the road, who broached
the matter to Rev. Farley. A window
was at first suggested, but when the
railroad men came forward with a sum
like \$600 they were given the place of
honor, above all the others. The ac-
tion of the railroaders has excited a
great deal of favorable comment and
it is considered an act of generosity

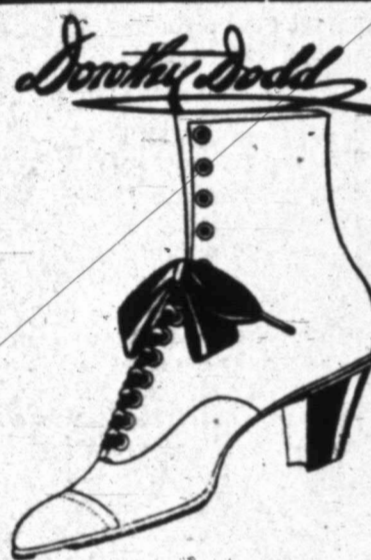

MONEY-COMMISSION MAY BE APPOINTED

THERE IS NEED OF SOME CON-
CERTED PLAN FOR NEW
MONETARY BILL.

EXPIRES BY LIMITATION

The Aldrich-Vreeland Act Will Be
No Longer Effective After
July, 1914.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 27.—In something less than five years, to be exact, on June 30, 1914, the Aldrich-Vreeland financial act will expire by limitation, and unless before that time it is replaced by a wisely-framed measure of broad scope, the country will again be in the perilous situation that is commonly believed to have resulted in the panic of 1907-08. There is a general realization of the necessity of legislation on this subject, but a wide difference as to far. Speaker Cannon believes that a mere extension of the present law, with perhaps a few amendments in details, will suffice. President Taft looks with favor upon the proposition to create a great central bank, and there are all sorts of intermediate schemes. Probably that which commands the greatest support will be based upon the recommendations of the Monetary Commission, which has been quietly but effectively at work for more than a year gathering material for the construction of the actual legislation.

A campaign of education is about to begin, for it is understood by Senator Aldrich, who heads the Commission and by the students of finance, that it will be difficult to arouse the interest of the mass of the people in the details of this rather abstruse subject, and that only by general agitation can the National Legislature be brought to the point of action. If it required ten years to bring about a revision of the tariff, certainly a period of less than five years is none too long to perfect and enact legislation on a subject so complex and important as is involved in a general revision of the entire financial system of the republic. Therefore, soon after the return to America from Europe of Senator Aldrich and Professor Andrews and other members of the

commission, which is expected to be about the middle of next month, preparations will be made for the publication of the preliminary report of the commission, and it is hoped that this can be ready for submission to Congress when it re-assembles in December. This will be only the beginning, for the full report is to be comprehensive in scope and it cannot possibly be completed within another year, but this will serve the purpose of directing public attention to this important subject and will afford the Senators and representatives material for study to fit themselves to grapple knowingly with such legislation as may ultimately be proposed by the Monetary Commission.

This commission has been up to this point engaged in a careful study in the European capitals of the financial systems of Great Britain and the principal continental powers and a mass of data of the greatest importance to the students of finance has been collected. It is realized that none of the systems as a whole, is adapted to the needs of the United States, because of the peculiar conditions which exist in this country, but in most of them are found some features that may be of value as a foundation for the projected new American plan. Attention will be directed to defects of the existing system which has grown up by accretion, causing it to be described as patch work and as one no longer capable by reason of lack of elasticity and unnecessary restrictions of meeting the business needs of the country.

Though nominally created with the purpose of dealing only with the subject of currency and the bond issues on which the latter is based in large part, the commission has enlarged its scope so as to include the national banking system, and it is believed that even the state banks will be dealt with in the forthcoming report. The projected great central bank will be fully exploited, for there is reason to believe that even in banking circles, considerable misapprehension exists as to the functions of this institution. Based on the history of the operations of the old United States Bank, destroyed by Andrew Jackson, apprehension exists among the officials of national and state banks that this central bank may trench upon their business and be a formidable competitor, so this phase of the matter will be fully dealt with by the commission. The most substantial objection that has been advanced against that project is based upon a doubt whether one central institution would be sufficiently

responsive to emergency demands from some distant section of the country, and the suggested corrected measure, looking to the creation of branches of the central bank has only strengthened the fear of the existing banks that the United States government is to re-enter the field of competition with them.

Recent action by Mr. Murray, the comptroller of the currency, involving the assumption of absolute responsibility by bank directors for every part of the banks' business, guarding against loans without proper security to directors and requiring the closest co-operation between the national and state bank examiners in the inspection of the operations of the banks have resulted, it is believed, in bringing these institutions into a much higher state of efficiency than on a sounder business basis than they have ever before enjoyed and the comptroller is fully convinced that with public confidence in the banks fully restored there is no reason to apprehend any struggle or competition for business between the National and state banks on the one hand and government-central bank on the other.

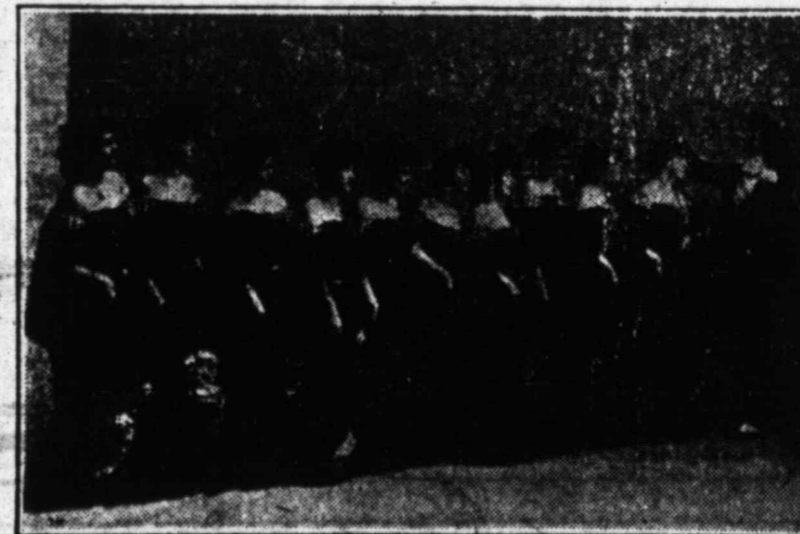
