MODERN HOSPITAL IS BEING PLANNED

MOVEMENT STRATED FOR IN-
FIRMARY TO BE MANAGED
BY DEACONESSES.

IS BADLY NEEDED HERE

Some Money Already Pledged and
Definite Campaign to Be Made
in 1910.

Plans, as yet indefinite but none the less certain, are being formulated for the establishment of another hospital in this city and it is promised by those back of the movement that definite steps will be taken early next year. It is proposed to build and equip a modern hospital and place it in the charge of deaconesses of the various denominations in this city.

Although no organized effort has yet been started, it is stated that the sum of five thousand dollars is already pledged and that an excellent site is available, which gives the proposed institution a good start.

There is material need for an institution of this kind in Wichita Falls, as at present many go to Fort Worth or Dallas for treatment from this section. With the railroads centering here and the advantageous location, it is believed that the hospital, once started, would be self-supporting.

A proposition for a hospital was made to the city last year, it being planned to place it in charge of the Catholic sisters, but the matter was never taken up heartily and nothing was ever done.

BOY GIVES TROUBLE.

Wrecks Jail Cell After Encounter With
Street Car.

Lester Myers, aged about fourteen years, is in the county jail today as a result of a recent encounter with a street car. He was first placed in the city jail, but wrought such havoc with the furniture and interior equipment of his cell that he was removed to the other lockup. He was ejected from the street car in the western part of the city by the conductor and retaliated by throwing a large rock at that official. His arrest followed and he had been in his cell but a short time before he flooded it with water and wrecked it generally.

YOUNG FORT WORTH MAN BLOWS OFF TOP OF HEAD

Fort Worth, Sept. 29.—Howe M. Spencer, aged twenty-seven, of this city, today killed himself by blowing off the top of his head with a lead from a shot gun. He recently came here from Texas, where he was for two years superintendent of the Pintosch Gas Company. He had suffered from ill health. When he grabbed the shot gun at his home this morning his mother wrestled with him but could not wrest the weapon from his grasp. She flew to the telephone for assistance, when Spencer placed his forehead against the barrel and pushed the trigger with his toe, killing himself instantly. He was a college graduate and traveled over the world.

MANY BANKS ADOPT ASSESSMENT PLANS

FOUR HUNDRED AND FORTY-
THREE PREFER IT TO BOND-
ING METHOD.

FORTY TRY OTHER PLAN

Individual Method is Elected By About
Forty Banks Out of Five Hun-
dred.

Austin, Sept. 29.—Since the bank guaranty law became effective about six weeks ago, the state banks have been notifying the department of banking of their choice of one or the other of these methods and to date four hundred and forty-one have adopted the assessment plan.

It appeared at first that the bonding plan was without friends, but one or two banks announced in favor of it and a number of others quickly got in line, there being a total of forty-four. Thirty banks have not yet indicated any selection, but will probably do so before the end of the year, when the law really becomes effective so far as depositors are concerned.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY.

Fever-Crazed Patient Used Shot Gun
in Deadly Manner.

Cameron, Sept. 29.—As a result of a tragedy enacted at Burlington, near here, this morning two persons are dead and one is seriously wounded. Wiley Murphy, driven insane by suffering from typhoid fever, shot and killed his brother's wife, wounded his brother, then turned the gun on himself, killing himself instantly. He used a Winchester shot gun. Murphy was unmarried.

TAFT TIRED OUT.

Spending Today at North Yakama,
Much Exhausted.

North Yakama, Wash., Sept. 29.—President Taft arrived here today. He is somewhat exhausted after a hard day at Spokane yesterday and made but a brief speech.

ARRIVE AT MANGUM ON OCTOBER 20TH

EXTENSION OF NORTHWESTERN
IS RAPIDLY NEARING COM-
PLETION.

IS SURVEYED TO SAYRE

Work on Line to Choctaw to be Start-
ed Soon—Thompson Due Oc-
tober 1st.

The Wichita Falls and Northwestern will be in operation as far north as Mangum by October 20, according to announcement at the offices of that road this morning. The construction gangs are hard at work beyond Altus and good progress is being made. Beyond Mangum, a survey has been made to Sayre on the Choctaw division of the Rock Island, where the next extension will be. It has not yet been decided whether the road will go to Sayre or Elk City but this will be settled as soon as the Mangum extension is completed.

R. A. Thompson, who will be again connected with the Northwestern, is due to assume his duties with that road on the first of October, next Friday. He has not yet arrived.

The management of the road has not yet given out anything regarding the proposed extension from Sayre or Elk City to Woodward, concerning which several items have appeared in Oklahoma papers recently. This extension is contemplated but is not thought to be among the nearly plans of the road.

TO BE NO CONTEST.

Peacable Settlement of Texas League
Presidency.

Houston, Sept. 29.—Moritz Kopperl of Galveston, today announced he will not let his name be used in the campaign for a successor to President W. P. Allen, of the Texas League. The league managers wish to avoid a fight over the presidency and if Allen appears to have a majority of the managers favoring his re-election, he will be selected unanimously. If Allen appears in the minority, Kopperl will be unanimously elected president.

COOK AT PHILADELPHIA.

Right Hand Worn Out With So Much
Shaking.

Philadelphia, Sept. 29.—Dr. Cook arrived here today for the purpose of delivering a lecture tonight. From the moment of his arrival he received an almost continuous ovation. Cook's right hand is literally flayed with so much hand-shaking, and he is now compelled to offer his left hand. At noon he was tendered a public reception, under the auspices of the city of Philadelphia.

WILL HARDLY ACCEPT.

Bryan Expected to Refuse to Debate at
Atlanta.

It is declared here that Bailey has not so far made a special request for a debate and consequently the Nebraska will in all likelihood notify the Atlanta citizens that he will not go there to debate.

The funeral takes place this afternoon at 4 o'clock from the family residence. Rev. J. L. McKee will conduct the exercises and interment will be in the Riverside Cemetery.

AIRSHIP FLIGHTS IN CELEBRATION

BOTH CURTISS AND WRIGHT PER-
FORM AT NEW YORK THIS
MORNING.

SCENES ARE CHANGING

Up-River Towns are Today Taking
Part in the Celebration Cere-
monies.

New York, Sept. 29.—The Half Moon and Clermont sailed up the Hudson River today to carry inspiration to the cities and towns which begin their part of the celebration. The Half Moon and Clermont were accompanied by an escort of tugs, motor boats and United States warships. Historical exercises appropriate of the day, are being held at the public schools and several tablets were dedicated at points of historical interest.

Curtiss, in his Hudson-Fulton aeroplane made a maiden flight early today successfully describing a semi-circle above the field at Governors Island. Both Wright and Curtiss will make official flights in connection with the celebration at the first favorable opportunity.

Wilbur Wright started his flight in his aeroplane at eight fifty-seven, remaining in the air ten minutes, passing over the top of Castle William, and making a complete circuit of the island, a distance of two miles.

Later Wright made another flight during which he crossed the lower bay and passed around the statue of Liberty. He made this flight in six minutes and thirty seconds. Wright said he believed he made fifty miles an hour on his return trip.

SUGGESTIONS GIVEN FOR SECURING CENSUS DATA

Washington, Sept. 27.—The general trend of their suggestions concerning the United States Census schedule to secure the data relative to manufactures is indicated in an interview obtained with Prof. Carroll W. Doten, one of the group of college professors of economics and manufacturing experts who have been advising Director Durand of the Bureau of the Census concerning the form and scope of the inquiries to be asked by the special agents making the canvass beginning January 1st next for the manufactures census period, which is the present calendar year 1909. Prof. Doten is secretary of the American Statistical Association and also is assistant professor of economics in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He is also a specialist in railroad economics and accounting, labor problems, factory systematizing and social investigation.

"From 1810 when the first attempt was made to secure data concerning industry," said Prof. Doten, "one of the most difficult problems involved in census taking has been the census of manufactures. At each recurring decennial period, except in 1820, when no provision was made for securing statistics of industry, more and more elaborate schedules were prepared, as the growing importance and diversity of the industries of the country seemed to require, until 1890, when the system almost broke down of its own weight.

"Since that time a reaction has set in and there has been a movement in the direction of the greater simplicity. This has taken two forms, as exemplified in the census of 1900 and 1905. In 1900, the schedule was simplified materially by the elimination of certain inquiries and the consolidation of others, notably the inquiries in regard to capital and employees. In 1905, few changes were made in the schedule, but the scope of the census was limited to those establishments conducted under what is known as the factory system, exclusive of the so-called neighborhood and mechanical industries.

"Both of these methods of simplification have been made necessary by the changing character and by the growing size and complexity of our manufacturing industries. The tardy system with the fact that the factory system long ago supplanted the household or neighborhood industries of an earlier stage of our national development has been taken note of in census work was in part the result of a desire to make each census comparable, so far as possible, with preceding censuses. There was also the desire that the census manufacturers should account for all production not included in the extractive industries or in trade and transportation. The attempt to system long ago supplanted the household was never successful, and as they became of less relative importance the reasons for abandoning the attempt made a stronger appeal to Congress and the census officials.

"The act providing for the taking of the 13th decennial census limits its scope practically to the same field as that covered by the quinquennial census of 1905. The inquiries within this field include the name, location, and ownership of each establishment; the character of the industry; the number of officers and employees, with the total amount of their salaries and wages; quantity and cost of materials; miscellaneous expenses; quantity and amount of power used. The only thing required now is to perfect the method of securing the data within these narrower limits.

"It is in this task that the committee of experts on manufactures, called together at the Census Bureau by Director Durand, have devoted their particular attention. Recognizing the desirability of preserving comparability, they have been loath to suggest radical changes in either the form or contents of the inquiries included in the general schedule of manufactures. They have, moreover, been influenced by the obvious necessity of limiting the expense and effort required to obtain the data in the field. As users of the census figures in research and classroom work, they have also realized the importance of the early publication of the result of the census, and they have been especially anxious to facilitate in every way possible, without sacrificing thoroughness or accuracy, the speedy completion of the

field work and the compilation of the information collected.

"It is perhaps too early to announce specific changes, as the tentative schedule will probably be tested in the field before its final adoption, but it may be safe to speak of the general trend of the committee's suggestions. They call for definite figures from the books and pay rolls of manufacturers where this does not involve too much trouble and when the inquiry cannot be regarded as unduly inquisitorial. In order that this should not involve added labor in the filling out of schedules it has been found necessary to reduce the number of inquiries or sub-inquiries. The theory upon which this has been done is that three or four accurately determined figures are better as a basis of deduction than a dozen estimates which in many cases must necessarily be merely guesses.

"In some cases it has seemed desirable to re-classify the items already included in an inquiry. This does not in the least interfere with the comparability of the totals, but it serves to bring out certain tendencies in the industrial world which the former methods of presentation were found to obscure.

"While it is the primary aim of a census now, as it has always been, to take an inventory of the nation's resources and productive capacity, still it seems desirable to secure other economic and social data, at least as a by-product of this great enterprise. The United States Census has come to be regarded as a model the world over and other countries are falling in line with its methods. Its reports are more and more being used as a storehouse of material by economic and social investigators, not only in this country but abroad. In view of these things the committee have felt that no backward step should be taken at the present time, and that every legitimate effort should be put forth to secure accurate and complete data in regard to wages, hours of labor, and regularity of employment, as evidences of the well-being of industrial laborers.

"Quite as important on the other hand, however, are the inquiries showing the improvements in machinery and in the methods of organization, which make it possible to utilize our natural resources to the best advantage and with the least waste."
