NEW STREET LAMPS HAVE BEEN PLACED

WILL BE INSTALLED AS SOON AS IRON POSTS HAVE BEEN FINISHED.

ARE TO COST \$16 EACH

Most of Them Will Be in the Residence District of the City.

The work of installing the new street lights recently received by the city will begin as soon as the iron poles have been made by the foundry and when this is done the city will be much better lighted. The lights are to be located at the following corners:

- Seventh and Lee.
- Fourth and Adams.
- Fifth and Scott.
- Third and Travis.
- Fifth and Burnett.
- Seventh and Lamar.
- Eleventh and Scott.
- Eleventh and Indiana.
- Twelfth and Ohio.
- Thirteenth and Scott.
- Mississippi and Elm.
- Fourteenth and Lamar.
- Fourteenth and Travis.
- Eighth and Travis.
- Ninth and Austin.
- Eleventh and Austin.
- Ninth and Bluff.
- Eleventh and Bluff.
- Eleventh and Holliday.
- Tenth and Grace.

It will cost about sixteen dollars each to install these lights and the expense of maintaining them will be about one dollar each per month. The new lights are to be kept burning all night every night, whether the moon shines or not.

James J. Hill Seeking Further Connections in This Direction.

Terre Haute, Ind., Oct. 7.—James J. Hill is said to intend to enter Indiana, following Harriman, whose lines and influence were thrown into Indianapolis by construction of the Indianapolis Southern and the control of the C. H. & D. through the Baltimore & Ohio. The traffic officials of the Southern Indiana have received instructions from Receiver Myron J. Carpenter to handle a private train over the Walsh system, starting from Chicago Monday morning.

The request came from Walsh himself, and the report is that the men who are to go over the system in the private car are representatives of J. J. Hill. It is said that Hill not only wants to reach down into Indiana for traffic, but also wants to get an outlet from Chicago to the south through Terra Haute.

It is now thought that Walsh, finding that he is about to lose control of his railroads, is trying to close a deal with Hill within the final 20 days of grace which the Chicago bankers holding his securities must give in the form of notice that they intend to sell these securities, which include stock and bonds of the Walsh railroads and Indiana stone undertakings.

There are \$14,000,000 (face value) of these securities up as collateral security for the \$7,121,887.12 still due the Chicago bankers who advanced the money to secure the depositors in Walsh's banking institutions when the great crash came in 1905.

For years Hill has been known to be a close friend of Walsh. It was said at the time of the failure of Walsh's banks that Hill and his associates found for Walsh the "backing" that saved his railroad properties from being sold under the hammer.

RAIN WANTED IN TOWN BUT WILL HURT COTTON

Rain fell here this morning and there are evidences of further precipitation this afternoon, bringing joy to the hearts of the wheat farmers and less pleasant feelings to the hearts of the cotton growers. The rain is necessary to wheat growers so that the ground may be broken for next year's crop, but it may injure cotton as there is still about half the crop out that would be damaged by any heavy rain. Rain is more than welcome in town on account of the dust which has been very disagreeable in the unsprinkled districts and the cloudy aspect of the sky today has raised hopes.

ELECTION SUIT.

Seeking to Enjoin Republican's Name on Official Ballot.

By Associated Press. Louisville, Ky., Oct. 7.—A petition was filed in the court here today asking an injunction against the placing on the official ballot of the republicans' ticket the name of James Grinstead, candidate for mayor of Louisville, and the present incumbent.

The suit was instituted by George Todd, the independent candidate for mayor of Louisville, who claims that Grinstead, his opponent, is ineligible for the office of mayor, having been elected one term.

VALLEY SALOON ROBBED.

Seventeen Dollars Secured by Breaking Cash Register.

The Wichita Valley Saloon, located near the railroad chute, was robbed last night of \$17.50. The cash register was taken out of the building and broken open and that sum secured. The officers were notified this morning but there is no clue, as the robbery took place between midnight and 5 o'clock this morning.

CHICAGO CAPITALISTS CONCLUDE VISITS HERE

The party of Chicago capitalists who have been inspecting Wichita Falls during the past few days left for their homes this morning, well pleased with what they saw and with increased admiration for this section of the state. They were taken out into the surrounding country in automobiles during their stay here and were taken out for rides on the railroads out of this city, being given every opportunity to see what the country looked like.

The primary object of their visit here was to inspect the Northwestern and to see that it was actually built, it being their intention to take some of its bonds.

It is believed, however, that the building of a road to the country west of here, which has long been contemplated, also interested them and their visit here may have been with that idea in view. They visited the western portion of this section in automobiles and were shown over that territory.

GOVERNOR ACCEPTS TAFT'S INVITATION

WILL MEET THE PRESIDENT AT KING'S RANCH IN CORPUS CHRISTI.

PRESIDENT IS RESTING

He is Now Out in the Wilds of California and Will Make No Speeches There.

Texas News Service Special. Corpus Christi, Tex., Oct. 7.—Arrangements are progressing at the mansion of Mrs. H. M. King here for the reception of President Taft and party on October 22nd, to which Governor and Mrs. Campbell have accepted an invitation. Campbell declined to attend the El Paso festivities at the meeting of Presidents Taft and Diaz, because Taft omitted Austin in his Texas itinerary.

By Associated Press. El Portal, Cal., Oct. 7.—President Taft and his party left here early today for Yosemite Valley, traveling by stage coach for the wonderful Mariposa group of big trees.

The little settlement of Chinquapin is the selected place for luncheon to be served. Night will be spent at Wawona at a lonely tavern on the outskirts of the Yosemite Valley, where the party will arrive between four and five o'clock this afternoon.

The president will spend three days in the valley and during his stay no speeches will be made.

MISS ELKINS RETURNS HOME

HEARST ONCE MORE TO BE CANDIDATE

IS ENTHUSIASTICALLY NOMINATED FOR MAYORALTY OF NEW YORK.

WORK OF INDEPENDENTS

Four Thousand of Them Meet—Nominated by a Former Republican Opponent.

By Associated Press. New York, Oct. 7.—William Randolph Hearst is again a candidate for political honors, having been placed in nomination for the mayoralty of this city by some four thousand of his friends who held a meeting last night. They adopted a platform declaring their distrust of both republican and democratic platforms.

The action of the meeting has caused some surprise, as it was not known that Hearst retained as much strength as was evidenced last night.

William Ivis, who was the republican candidate for mayor four years ago against Hearst and McClellan, nominated Hearst last night. Paying his respects to Judge Gaynor, he said:

"New York as a municipality should have three parties. The existence of only two parties here is always a guarantee that the issues and the fruits of the victory will be syndicated and divided between them. If you men gathered here tonight see fit to form an independent party, with William Randolph Hearst as your standard bearer, I bid you Godspeed and hope that all your other candidates, your platform and your rank and file may be inspired and imbued by the wholesome honesty, integrity and generosity of your leader.

"Justice Gaynor is carrying the banner for the gang. He is the stalking horse for Tammany. He leads the vilest tacked that has ever been placed before New York. In spite of his judicial position he has for months devoted himself to a cleverly framed and adroitly executed conspiracy whereby the two beneficiaries are to be the Judge on the same hand and the band of political criminals on the other.

"Justice Gaynor has told us that he has a right to take any man's vote, but there are some votes in New York that no decent man should care or dare to take. The Tammany ticket is not entitled to the serious consideration of any man who pretends to be a friend of the city."

Last night at mile post 103 the rear wheel of engine No. 34, of the local trade, broke half into and threw one car off the track and tore it up considerably, causing about four hours delay. No. 5 had to leave over the Katy tracks.

WILL BUILD AT GALVESTON.

Government Will Establish Quarantine Station There.

Texas News Service Special. Washington, Oct. 7.—Government action today assures the establishment of a big national quarantine station near Galveston. It is announced by the board composed of Surgeon H. White, Captain Oakes and Lieutenant Harwell, who are chosen to select the site. The members will go to Texas and inspect the submerged land south of Bolivar, roads, containing a thousand acres.

The establishment of a station indicates the efforts of the government to turn the tide of immigration through Galveston instead of New York.

GRAIN DEALERS MEET.

Address by Senator Beveridge is Feature of the Session.

By Associated Press. Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 7.—The Thirtieth annual meeting of grain dealers of the National Association, opened in this city yesterday and will continue until Friday. It is expected the attendance will reach nine hundred. Senator Beveridge will address the convention today.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES WILL BEGIN TOMORROW

By Associated Press. Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 7.—A dense fog prevailed here today, and there is considerable speculation as to the weather conditions for tomorrow, when the first game of the Pittsburg-Detroit post-season series is scheduled to take place.

A part of the Detroit team arrived today and the members of the national commission have also reached the city. All is in readiness for the first game. Over two hundred and fifty police will be stationed in and around the Forbes field.

By Associated Press. Detroit, Mich., Oct. 7.—The five thousand reserved seat tickets for each afternoon of the world's championship series of baseball games to be played in this city on next Monday and Tuesday sold as fast as the ticket sellers could push them through the windows today. The supply was exhausted long before the demand was satisfied. Only general admission tickets are now left for the two games.

KING'S MOUNTAIN DAY OBSERVED AT CHARLOTTE

C., Oct. 7.—King's Mountain Day, the anniversary of the battle of King's Mountain, which was fought October 7th 1780, during the struggle of the colonies for independence from Great Britain, was fittingly commemorated today. On the battlefield a monument erected by the United States, at a cost of thirty thousand dollars, was dedicated and at Fort Watuga the Daughters of the American Revolution dedicated a monument.

RAILWAY COMMISSION ENJOINED.

Mississippi Road Objects to Rate Fixed on Un-Compressed Cotton.

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 7.—On application of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley railroad, Judge Niles, of the federal court, granted a temporary injunction restraining the railroad commission from enforcing the new freight rates on uncompressed cotton, which is effective tomorrow. It is alleged the rates were in violation of the federal constitution and seeks to regulate interstate commerce.

Curtis Makes Two Short Flights.

By Associated Press. St. Louis, Oct. 7.—Glenn Curtis today made two short flights in his aeroplane. Only about a dozen people were present on account of the early hour. An industrial parade, illustrating the progress of St. Louis manufactures and commerce is being held today.

A WHITE MAN IS ROBBED BY NEGROES

THE VICTIM IS KNOCKED DOWN AND CUT IN JAW AND ARM BY HIS ASSAILANTS.

STABBED FOR RESISTING

Affair Took Place at Eleventh and Ohio—Injuries Will Not Prove Fatal.

Dan O'Reilly, a well known bricklayer if this city, is in a dangerous condition this morning as a result of an encounter with two negroes late last night near the corner of 11th and Ohio. He received a deep gash in his jaw, requiring the taking of six stitches by the physicians; also a cut in the right arm.

Mr. O'Reilly is unable to talk this morning and the details of the affair are missing, as there is no clue to the assailants. It is thought that he was accosted by the negroes and robbed of a small amount of money he had in his possession, but that resistance on his part led one of the blacks to use the knife on him. The negroes then fled, but the noise had attracted the attention of someone nearby and the police were notified and Mr. O'Reilly was brought to town and a physician summoned to attend to his wound. He lost considerable blood and was in a rather critical condition for a time, but is believed on the road to recovery this morning. The wound was deep, but the knife did not pierce any vein or artery, otherwise death would almost certainly have ensued.

The affair took place only two blocks from the business section, but there is no street light at that point and not many houses in the neighborhood. Mr. O'Reilly was en route home from a tent show when the encounter took place.

THE DAY AT FREDERICK.

News Notes From Up the Northwestern Road.

Special to The Times. Frederick, Okla., Oct. 7.—After an exciting chase, Officers May and Wright captured a negro boot-legger here yesterday. The officials' suspicions were aroused several days ago and the negro was taken into custody yesterday, after being pursued out of the city. The negroes here evidenced a disposition to protect him, but the officers were determined.

A barn belonging to W. A. Holloway, living near this city, was destroyed by fire yesterday morning, the total loss being about two thousand dollars. The fire is believed to have originated by cotton pickers smoking in the barn, which was used for sleeping quarters.

YOUNG BROKER SUICIDES.

Was of Opinion That He Was Losing His Mind.

Before the arrival of the British and German squadrons sent to this country to participate in the Hudson-Fulton celebration there was considerable discussion as to whether Grand Admiral von Koester of the German navy or Admiral Sir Edward H. Seymour of England held the higher rank. It was argued that because the British navy provided no title beyond that of admiral of the fleet the title of grand admiral would give the German commander the post of honor over Seymour. This, however, was settled promptly when Grand Admiral von Koester arrived in New York. He said the question never should have been raised, as Admiral Seymour ranked him by one year in date of commission. Both the admirals, together with the Italian, French and Dutch admirals, were the guests of Rear Admiral Beaton Schroeder of the Atlantic fleet on the day they reached New York.

Lovers of horse racing will not be disappointed when they visit the San Antonio Fair. The anti-racing legislation passed in Texas has not lessened the San Antonio International Fair Association, and the "hoss" racing will go on as usual. The purses will be just as large as they have ever been and there will be just as many of the thoroughbreds on hand to compete for the money. If anything, the racing programs this year will be more diversified than ever before, embracing a wider scope. Harness racing will also be given a place on the program.

For those speed maniacs who like to inhale the gasoline fumes as the "Red Devils," the "Gray Wolf," the "White Ghost," or "Blue Whistler" pass by and fade in the distance, there will be diversion also. The best automobile racing drivers in the country who have done big things on the Vanderbilt, Savannah or other courses, will be here to pilot their cars around the track. That there will be some new international records is assured because of the recent improvements made on the track. The curves of the course have been raised fifteen degrees which will permit the drivers to take these as fast as the straightways and that is what counts in the making of new records. There will be no such thing as a slow time on this track, which is improved to such an extent that it does not take second place with any track in America. In a few words, it is as good as the best.

The racing features should prove an interesting diversion at the San Antonio Fair, which is greater and better this year than ever before. The fair opens November 6th, and closes on the evening of November 17th, and all railroads will operate low rate excursions.

WITH COUNTERFEIT MONEY.

Little New York Girl Buys Lavish Feast for Friends.

New York, Oct. 7.—A week ago little Miss Rosie Werblinsky, 9 years old, found a \$50 Confederate bill while rummaging through her father's trunk, where it had reposed among a lot of souvenirs for the last four years, in her home.

Rosie, a pretty child with rosy cheeks, big brown eyes and black hair, didn't know the bill was bad but something put it into her head to take it, anyway. She went to Mrs. Rachael Feinstein's grocery at 31 Market street and asked for a half dozen eggs and a quart of milk, tendering in payment the \$50 note. The grocery woman gave the child \$49.74 in change.

 For Wichita Falls and vicinity

PROSPERITY IN WICHITA COUNTY
 While a general drouth prevails over Texas, Wichita county seems to have done fairly well this year.
 Up to the present-time a little the rise of 3000 bales of cotton have been turned out by the gins in this city. Burk Burnett, Iowa Park and Electra, and about that many more will be ginned before the season ends. This of course, is not more than half what the yield in cotton would have been had the season been favorable.
 In addition to the fairly good cotton crop produced, the acreage to corn was greater than last year, but the yield was cut short by the hot dry weather that prevailed just at the time that rains were needed, but notwithstanding this draw-back more corn was produced in the county this year, with a bad season, than was produced last year with a favorable season and plenty of rain, caused by the increase in acreage.
 The Red River country, in and around Burk Burnett, seems to be the best corn producing country in Wichita county, and last year a total of 120,000 bushels was shipped out from that place alone. Up to the present time 80,000 bushels have been shipped from that place and it is estimated that the total shipments of corn for this season will not fall short of 150,000 bushels.
 There are corn shellers located at both Iowa Park and Electra, and while a great deal of corn is being shipped from these places, it is impossible for the Times to secure the figures showing the total number of bushels shipped out so far. Later, these figures will be given.
 So long as conditions above set out prevail in Wichita county, there is no cause for alarm. The people are prosperous, and most of them have money in the various banks as shown by the splendid statements issued by these institutions at the last call.
 The Texas Department of Agriculture has sent out bulletins on the 'pomological' possibilities of this state. We haven't the slightest idea what 'pomological' means, but we are deeply grateful to know that Texas has it.
 It develops that since young ladies have quit conducting Chinese missionary classes, the Chinks have quit attending, all of which goes to throw considerable light on some recent happenings.
 There are in these United States about four and one-half persons asking themselves, 'Detroit or Pittsburg?' to everyone that is still puzzled by the query, 'Cook or Peary?'
