## EVERYTHING QUIET AT AMARILLO NOW

### RANGER WHO STARTED RECENT FRACAS DISCHARGED FROM STATE'S SERVICE.

## ROGERS MAKES REPORT

### Says That Rangers are Supported by Better Class of Amarillo's Citizens.

Austin, Tex., Oct. 22.—That everything is lovely in Amarillo, and that there is very little prospect for more trouble between the rangers and citizens, is the substance of the report of Captain Rogers, of the ranger force, to Adjutant General Newton this morning. Captain Rogers returned from the Panhandle this morning, he having gone to Amarillo in an endeavor to settle the difficulties between the rangers and local authorities.

"The better class of citizens in Amarillo are siding with the rangers in this controversy," said Captain Rogers, "and I do not anticipate any further trouble.

The ranger whose conduct was more than anything else directly responsible for the recent outbreak, was discharged by Captain Rogers, and it is believed that this will have a soothing effect upon the conditions at Amarillo. Assistant Adjutant General Phelps says that the rangers will remain in Amarillo under Captain Ross.

### SHOT BY MEXICAN.

#### Traveling Salesman Seriously Wounded at Amarillo.

Amarillo, Tex., Oct. 22.—D. A. Irish, who was shot and wounded by a Mexican here last night, will, it is believed today, recover. The Mexican fired a bullet into Irish's breast, it being later extracted from his back. Irish is a traveling salesman from Oklahoma City.

A traveling salesman by the name of Irish was in Wichita Falls up to a day or so ago, and is thought to be the same man mentioned in the above dispatch.

### TAILOR SUICIDES.

#### Shreveport Man Ends Life in Fit of Despondency.

Every train arriving today adds to the throng. Taft is to speak at the fair grounds tomorrow afternoon, and will be the guest of honor at a twenty-five dollar a plate banquet in the evening.

## BURNED BUILDINGS ARE NOW BEING REPLACED

Work was started this morning on the re-construction of the Wichita Investment Company's building, which was destroyed by fire on October 10th in the blaze which threatened that entire block.

The two stores are to be rebuilt exactly as they were before the fire, at a cost of about five thousand dollars. The south wall of the building can be partially used for the new building and the north wall is still practically intact, which lessens the expense.

Work is being gotten under way on the Stonepher building on 7th street, which was destroyed by fire last August. It is understood that a two-story building will replace the one-story structure which formerly occupied that site.

### OIL CASES POSTPONED.

#### State's Attorney Allows Anti-Trust Suits to Go Over.

### NEGRO STRANGLES WOMAN.

#### Wife of Penitentiary Warden Dies at Hands of Black Brute.

### INVESTIGATION STARTED.

#### State Inspector of Oklahoma, Looking into Explosion.

McAlester, Okla., Oct. 22.—State Mine Inspector Hanratty is today looking into an investigation of the cause of the explosion yesterday in the Harts-horne mine of the Rock Island Mining Company, which killed ten men. James Johnson was the only man in the entry who was not killed, and while he is badly injured, he will recover.

## TAFT TALKS TODAY AT CORPUS CHRISTI

### DELIVERED ADDRESS BEFORE INLAND WATERWAYS CONVENTION.

## IN HOUSTON TOMORROW

### President's Stay in Texas Nearly Over. Leaves for St. Louis Sunday Morning.

Corpus Christi, Tex., Oct. 22.—The address of President Taft was the leading feature of today's session of the convention of the Interstate Inland Waterways League. The president arrived this morning on the revenue cutter "Wisdom" and was welcomed by a large and enthusiastic delegation, which included Governor Campbell and several congressmen. Secretary of War Dickinson accompanied the chief executive.

After attending the waterways meeting this morning, the president returned to his brother's ranch this afternoon for a match game of golf. At 8 o'clock this evening he will leave for Houston, where he is due to arrive tomorrow morning.

Saturday evening and early Sunday morning will be spent in Dallas, the president then leaving for St. Louis to make a four days' trip down the Mississippi River to New Orleans.

### STABBED WITH HAT PIN.

#### Girl Attacks Two Men Who Attempt to Rob Her Home.

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 22.—In a hand to hand encounter with two masked white burglars at her home near Mesquite, Miss Lena Barrantine, aged sixteen stabbed one of the robbers with a hat pin before they bound and gagged and chloroformed her, late yesterday afternoon.

J. D. Barrantine, a farmer, the girl's family were in the field when the men entered the house and demanded money.

The girl declared there was none in the house, and bravely attacked the intruders. She was later found unconscious, wrapped in a blanket, by her family. Her condition is not serious. The burglars were trailed several miles by hounds, but were not captured. The house was searched, but nothing was taken.

## ASK DAMAGES IN SUM OF \$600,000

### SUIT FOR THAT AMOUNT FILED IN DISTRICT COURT OF THIS COUNTY.

## VIOLATION OF CONTRACT

### Cases Were Transferred Here From Hartley County—437,670 Acres of Land Involved.

Suit for damages in the sum of six hundred thousand dollars has been filed in the district court of this county by Alexander MacKay and Murdo MacKenzie against Eric P. Swenson, Swan A. Swenson, Walter O. Wetherbee, Jno. J. Emory, Sigmund-Newstadt and Jas. Stillman. This suit was originally filed in the district court of Hartley county, but has been transferred here.

The suit is based on the sale of about 437,670 acres of land in Dickens, Crosby, Kent and Garza counties.

This land was the property of the Espuela Land and Cattle Company, Ltd., of England, previous to 1905, and during the fall of that year E. P. Swenson made this company an offer of three dollars per acre for the land and twenty dollars a head for the cattle on it. At that time the directors of the company were at odds with each other and could not reach any agreement as to the disposition of the property, the majority, however, being opposed to the sale of the land at that time. The plaintiffs knowing of this, determined to make a bid of three and one-half dollars for the land. Swenson heard of their prospective bid and proposed to go in with them for the purchase of the land if they would withdraw their tentative offer. They entered into an agreement with him as to their share of the property. This agreement is rather complicated in its details, but provides for the issuance of stock in a company to hold the land and provides that the plaintiffs are to have a partial interest in the land for their services.

Acting on this agreement, the plaintiffs allege, they engineered the deal and finally secured the consent of a sufficient number of the stockholders of the Espuela Company in England, to the sale of the land and property for a total of \$526,000, or about \$2,730,000 in American money. To buy this land it was necessary to outfit Howe and Washburn, a Minneapolis concern, that was also trying to secure the land. Swenson became associated in the deal with the other defendants above mentioned.

After securing control of the property, the plaintiffs allege, the defendants would not give the plaintiffs any authority in the control of the land and the plaintiffs further allege that the intention and scheme of the defendants throughout the transaction was to defraud them of their share of the property that their services in bringing about the sale of the property are worth six thousand dollars for which sum they petition. They petition that their equitable interest in the property be established and that a trustee or receiver be appointed to administer the company's affairs. If the plaintiffs are not entitled to these remedies, they ask damages for breach of agreement and contract in the sum of six thousand dollars, and that if they are mistaken as to being entitled to this remedy, they ask the sum of six thousand dollars as compensation for their services, in addition to their actual expenses, which are estimated at five thousand dollars.

The plaintiffs are represented by Cowan, Burney and Goree, and the defendants by Coke, Miller and Coke. The plaintiffs are owners of a large tract of land adjoining that in question in this suit and the plaintiffs also own another large tract adjoining it.

The Swensons mentioned in this suit, are the same family that has been instrumental in the building up of Stamford, Texas.

## KEMPNER DISPOSES OF HOLDINGS HERE

### WILEY BLAIR, FRANK KELL AND J. A. KEMP PURCHASE HIS INTEREST IN LOCAL ROADS.

## \$350,000 IS INVOLVED

### Transaction Covers About One-Third of Southern's and Northwestern's Stock.

The holding of H. Kempner, one of the leading stockholders in the Wichita Falls and Northwestern and the Wichita Falls and Southern, have become the property of Messrs. Frank Kell, J. A. Kemp and Wiley Blair, according to an announcement at the road's office this morning.

The transaction involves about \$350,000, or slightly over one-third of the entire capital stock of the two lines.

Mr. Kempner is a resident of Galveston, and has been associated with these enterprises since their inception. He was unable, however, on account of his not being a resident, to take any active part in the affairs of the road and this is understood to have led to his disposing of his interest. It is stated that his other interests in this city remain intact.

The significance of the transaction lies in the fact that the control and management of these roads is kept more closely in the hands of Wichitans whose progressive policy, as far as it has been carried out, has resulted in much benefit to the roads involved.

### FATAL MINE EXPLOSION.

#### Rock Island Mines at Hartshorn, the Scene of Accident.

McAlester, Okla., Oct. 22.—Joe Solis was killed and three other miners badly injured in an explosion yesterday in the Rock Island Coal Mining Company's mine at Hartshorne.

When the explosion occurred twenty-six hundred miners were working in the mine. A dozen were engaged near the opening of the shaft affected, and others may die. Dan Hughes, William Pinkson and James Johnson were seriously injured. The rescue of the entombed men was undertaken immediately. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

The body of John Bomroski, a second victim, was recovered yesterday afternoon. It is thought six others who were entombed may be alive. Hughes is probably fatally injured.

### SHOOTING AT HILLSBORO.

#### W. J. Osborne Wounded in Back—Two Under Arrest.

Hillsboro, Tex., Oct. 22.—James Davis, a farmer residing near here, and his companion, James Parker, are under arrest as a result of the wounding of W. J. Osborne.

Davis and Osborne are neighbors.

#### G. R. Peters of Texas & Mexico, Meets With Fatal Accident.

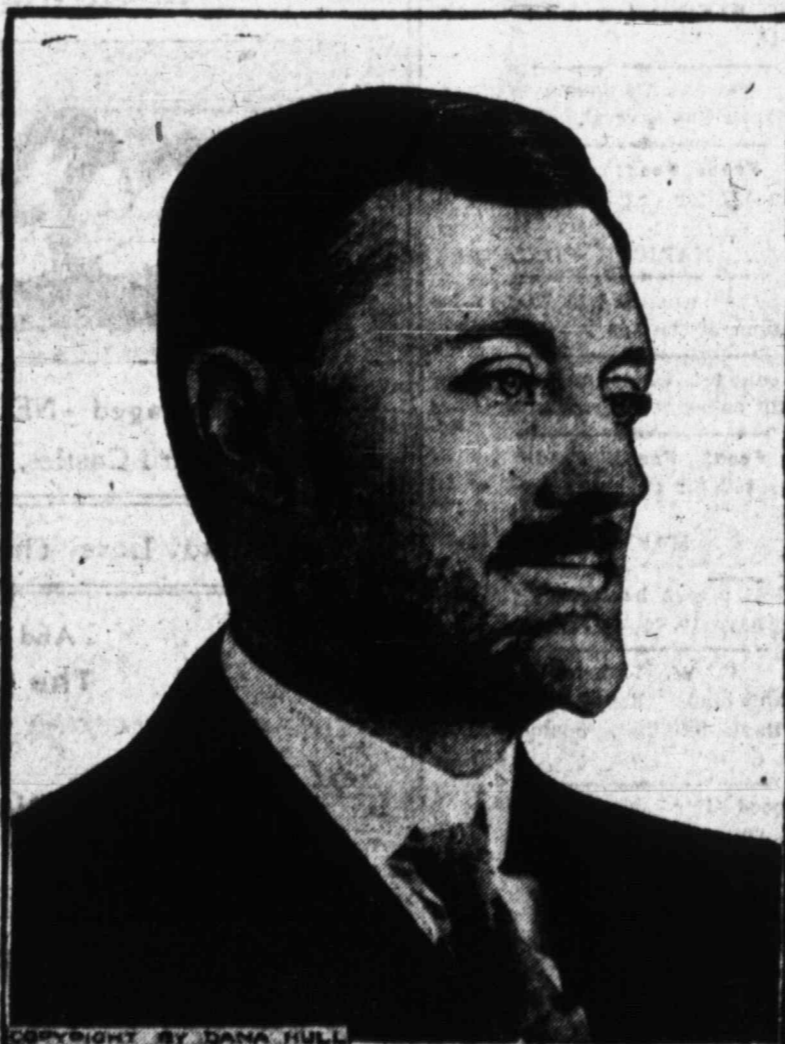

### THE DEER'S HORNS.

They Present All the Phenomena of Animal and Vegetable Growth.

Why and how is the deer so peculiarly unlike any other of the bovine race, the horns differing so materially from all the horned cattle in its composition, growth, maturity and decline? It presents all the phenomena of animal and vegetable growth. It sprouts from the brain without any prolongation of the frontal bone. It rises and breaks through the sinews and takes root on the bone, growing the same as a vegetable. It is nourished by and secretes albumen upon the surface and disposes of the fibrin the same as an animal.

It is clothed with a skin and hairy coat very different from those on the rest of the body. This covering and hair possess a property unknown in other animal bodies—that of being a styptic to staunch its own blood when wounded. It carries marks of the age on the buck by putting out an extra branch each year, which shows an additional power each year to produce them. And this power does not exist in the female. So this difference is more distinctly marked than in any other class of animals. Again, the horns possess properties unknown in any other animal matter. It is entirely inodorous, capable of resisting putrefaction and almost impervious to the effects of the atmosphere.

And still water at 300 degrees F. will dissolve these horns readily, even though they are not soluble in alcohol and resist the action of acids and alkalis. It is the only vegetable animal substance that we know of that does not perpetuate itself by procreation.

The male and the female are sustained by the same nutrition and elements, and only the male produces horns. This phenomenon is quite as much of a curiosity as the absence of the horn in the buck after shedding.—Exchange.

### SAT IN THE SENATE.

An Outsider Who Innocently Made Himself at Home.

The American people once elected a tailor to the presidency, and doubtless many manipulators of the shears and goose have sat in the seats of the mighty by election, but only once did a tailor make himself at home on the floor of the United States senate when he had no constituency to represent.

The tailor was Hermann Moritz Riedel of Philadelphia, who visited Washington in April, 1898, to attend the exciting scenes during the impeachment proceedings against Andrew Johnson, a fellow craftsman. And this is the account of how he witnessed these proceedings as published in the Washington Republican of that day:

"A good looking Teutonic friend of ours a day or two since made an earnest appeal to our Muggins for a ticket to the senate to listen to what was going forward at the impeachment trial. Muggins, as is his wont, in the kindness of his soul consented to furnish Teuton with the tailors' pasteboard which effects the open sesame to the senate chamber and also assured our friend that he would accompany him to the gallery and find him an eligible seat. Muggins and Teuton started to work their way in, but Muggins was detained outside of the door for a few moments, and our German friend went on and passed the vigilant sentinels at the outer door and went directly to the entrance of the senate chamber and was admitted by the gentlemanly ushers under the belief probably that he was a member of congress and passed through the vestibule and took his seat in the first vacant chair and there remained during the entire session in the confident belief that he was entitled to the seat."

The descendants of Hermann Riedel are living in Washington now. The tailor, who was a "top notcher" at his trade, according to all accounts, died in 1877, having declined a pension after serving as a marine during the civil war.—Washington Post.

Heat one quart of milk to 75 degrees F., add one and one-half tablespoonfuls of sugar and one-fourth of a yeast cake dissolved in one tablespoonful of lukewarm water. Fill sterilized bottles to within one and one-half inches of the top. Cork and shake. Place the bottles inverted where they may remain at a temperature of 70 degrees F. for ten hours, then put in the icebox or a cold place and let stand forty-eight hours, shaking occasionally to prevent the cream from clogging the mouth of the bottle. It is refreshing and nourishing.—Woman's Home Companion.

## BEING SICK IN CHINA.

What Happens When a Devil Jumps Down a Patient's Throat.

It is the custom for a Chinaman to visit the barber every week to have a general overhauling. First, the head and face are shaved; second, the ears are scraped and cleansed with a small brush made of duck's hair; third, the upper and lower eyelids are scraped with a dull edged knife, all granulations being smoothed away, and then an application is made with a duck's hair brush of salt solution.

This is the reason why you will find so much blindness in China. They take no antiseptic measures whatever. Finally the patient's back is massaged, and after paying a fee of 3 cents and no tip he leaves the shop, feeling clean outside, but now must consult his regular physician.

After going through the usual examination, which is a form of military inspection, the doctor diagnoses the case and treats it unless a devil happens to jump down the patient's throat. If this has happened the doctor can do the patient no good until he promises to set off a hundred firecrackers and to make a daily visit to the joss house. This done, he receives the usual pills for those vacated by the devil.

These pills may consist of spotted rhinoceros horns, said to be a wonderful cure for intestinal troubles. The spotted rhinoceros horns come from southern China, and in the market at Singapore a single specimen will bring \$25.

Tiger bones when ground to a powder and mixed with Chinese wine make a great blood tonic which is used by all classes of Chinese in northern China. The recipe is held by a firm in Shanghai that has become very wealthy by the sale of this tonic.

Old deer horns are boiled down to make the medicinal glue which binds the fifty ingredients composing the average Chinese pills. As in these you may get anything from a pinch of gunpowder to powdered cobra tail dust it is not the fault of Wong Yik Chee if just the right kind of specific escapes the patient.

Equal in medicinal efficacy to the above are three high grade tiger remedies, the eyeball, liver and blood. As may be imagined, tiger eyeball, the genuine article, can be prescribed for only the exceedingly wealthy Chinese. Similarly the liver, when dried and reduced to a powder, is worth its weight in gold all over China. Tiger blood, when evaporated to a solid at a temperature of 110 degrees and taken as a powder, is believed by Asiatics to transform a craven into a hero.—Medical Record.

### DENVER COMPLIES WITH LAW.

Will Erect Work Sheds Near its Childless Shops.

At last the mystery of the big lumber shipment to Childless has been solved, and it is neither a flour nor an oil mill.

The Index investigated the matter thoroughly and this week received information that told for what and where the material would be used.

The material is for the construction of five hundred feet of double track car sheds to be built at the Denver shops. Last session of the legislature a law was passed requiring railroads to build sheds over all rip-tracks so that carmen could work during all kinds of weather, and like the policy of the Denver, this road is the first to comply with the law.

The sheds will be built just west of the car shops and will be about thirty feet wide and high enough for engines and all classes of cars to pass underneath. They will extend westward from the car shops for a distance of five hundred feet.

In conversation with some of the local officials it was learned that the shed will accommodate from twenty to thirty cars and will be large enough that one hundred men can work at one time and not interfere with each other. The shed will be made of very heavy material and will be erected with the same permanent character that all Denver shop buildings are erected in Childless.

Ample fire protection will be given the shed as a six inch main now parallels the proposed site. Work will commence immediately and the Texas Building Company, of Fort Worth, has the contract.—Childless Post.

### HARMON AS A DEMOCRAT.

Among the other things said by Governor Harmon in his Dallas address, which has the true democratic ring about it, is the following excerpt from that speech:

"They use to make fun of the men who believed in democratic principles and platforms and who continued to vote the straight democratic ticket in campaign after campaign, whether or not there was hope of immediate success. I want to declare to you that there is no better man than he in whom the principles of old-fashioned democracy are so embodied that instinctively he votes the democratic ticket and supports the platform, and he can't help it. It is not enough for democrats to have all powers limited, defined and distributed and then intrusted to the officers chosen by the people for fixed terms and with specific instructions and they insist that these instructions of the party shall be observed. These bounds must be maintained and respected because they safeguard the personal liberty of the citizen, which national independence and popular government are simply means to secure. They know that new conditions from time to time require the increase and the extension of governmental activities, but they are not swift to discover occasions for these, especially when they are directed against results, while the causes are left to operate undisturbed."

Contrary to his expressed determination, Governor Campbell at last came to his senses and attended the meeting of Presidents Taft and Diaz, just as any other self-respecting, sensible governor should. We are glad indeed that the governor of our great state saw how small and contemptible it would be to sulk over his imaginary grievance and by staying at home, deprive his great-hearted people of the honor that was justly theirs. Had Gov. Campbell persevered in his first intention, his action would have disgraced the state which he represents, and his own character would have gone down in history as unworthy of the honorable title of Southern gentleman. As the executive head of our state it devolves upon our governor to play the part of host toward any distinguished visitors from abroad, and if there is one thing for which Southern states have ever been distinguished, it is for genuine, unfeigned hospitality. Ours is the biggest state in the union in more respects than one, and we are truly glad no littleness was manifested by Governor Campbell on this notable occasion.—Childress Post.

The Iowa Park Herald is authority for the statement that during the past six weeks \$70,000 has been paid for cotton brought to that town. This means that approximately 1,100 bales at an average price of \$65.00 per bale have been marketed at Iowa Park during that time. It is supposed that the \$70,000 covers only the price paid for cotton, and if that is so then there must have been in the neighborhood of 550 tons of cotton seed sold, of which the Herald makes no mention. But even if the price for which the seed was sold included in the \$70,000 paid out for cotton, it shows that the farmers in and around Iowa Park raised a much better cotton crop this year than was at first thought; even better than that of 1908.

In spite of everything that is being said to the contrary, Wichita Falls is growing as fast today as ever in her history. There are more carpenters, more painters, paper hangers, plumbers, brick masons and tin workers finding employment here today than ever before, and if things were at a standstill, as claimed by some, such conditions would not exist. There has been no decline in the price of city or county property. On the contrary, every piece of property which has changed hands during the past few weeks has netted the owner a handsome profit on his investment.

Straw votes, to be sure, do not count for much, but when there is an impending campaign tests of that nature are continually being made. The Quannah Tribune is authority for the statement that a straw vote was taken at the court house in that city the other day on the candidates for governor, and to the surprise of many, the result was that three-fourths of those voting favored Davidson, with Poindexter and Brooks even seconds and neither Cone Johnson or Colquitt seem to have secured a single vote.

With the price above thirteen cents and the yield fully as good, if not better, than that of 1908, cotton farmers in Wichita county have no complaint to make. From the best information obtainable from the numerous gins throughout the county, the total yield promises to be in the neighborhood of 8,000 bales.

The Ballinger-Pinchot scrap is over, the Cook-Pearcy controversy is being arbitrated, both Bryan and Bailey have left Texas and the Crane-Knox mixup is over. Won't somebody please start something?

The fact that an Arkansas woman was willed four million dollars by a rejected suitor, holds out no consolation to womankind. Such things never happen outside of Arkansas.

Taft's joy at being in Texas is still further accentuated. He now learns that the fall cleaning-up is in progress by Mrs. Taft at the White House.

### Notice to Prohibitionists.

The Times:

With the saloons out of Wichita county, we would in-effect have state prohibition, as we would then have a territory larger than many states without saloons. The petition being circulated asking that the election be postponed, is an effort to defeat local option or any other kind of prohibition in Wichita county.

## FRAUD BY TELEGRAPH

Bold Swindles Perpetrated by Use of the Wire.

### THE WAY A BANK WAS FOOLED

A Lot of Nerve and a Little Telegram That Was Properly Delivered by One of the Company's Messenger Boys Made a Winning Combination.

Ninety-nine men out of a hundred will accept as gospel truth the contents of a telegram when it comes from the hands of a messenger boy. They buy and sell, pay out large sums of money, start on long journeys and do countless other things upon the suggestion of the little yellow or white paper slips with their condensed messages without in the least questioning their authenticity. This is an interesting fact, upon which hinges an enormous amount of the country's business, and it is also a fact upon which hinge some of the cleverest and boldest frauds in criminal records.

A lot of nerve and a little telegram was a combination that made possible a smooth swindle on a Des Moines bank. A well dressed man, apparently a business man of large affairs, called at the paying teller's window with a draft or check on an Omaha bank and asked if the Omaha bank had telegraphed notice that the draft was good. He got "no" for an answer and then informed the teller that such a telegram might be expected at any moment. Soon afterward the telegram arrived, delivered by a messenger boy, appearing to have come from the Omaha bank and authorizing the Des Moines bank to pay the draft. When the stranger appeared again he was given the \$500. When the Des Moines bank people took up the matter by wire with the Omaha bank it found that the latter institution had not sent the telegram, and then it was discovered that the whole transaction was a fraud.

But how could the swindlers send a telegram from Omaha bearing the bank's name? They did it in this manner: An accomplice of the Des Moines man stepped to a telephone booth in Omaha and called the telegraph office. "This is the — bank," he said. "Send a messenger at once to get a telegram for Des Moines." Then this accomplice hurried to the entrance of the Omaha bank to meet the messenger and there handed him the message for Des Moines. The telegraph company had no reason to believe otherwise than that the bank had actually signed the message, and transmitted it. The Des Moines bank also accepted the telegram as genuine because it bore every mark of genuineness, and it paid out the money to the swindlers, who timed their fraud so that they got out of reach of the law on trains that left immediately after their game had been worked.

In two smaller western towns a similar game was worked, only for seven or eight times the amount. An alleged horse buyer appeared in one of the towns and made purchase of a carload of fine animals to be delivered and paid for at a later day, preceding which he made the acquaintance of the officers of one of the banks. On the day fixed for the delivery of the horses the alleged buyer deposited in the bank a draft for a large amount drawn on a bank in another town a hundred miles away. At the same time the bank received a telegram purporting to come from the distant bank authorizing the payment of this draft. The bank believed the telegram, paid out the money and then discovered that the telegram was fraudulent. It had not been sent by the second bank, but by a confederate of the alleged horse buyer. Later developments disclosed that this accomplice had called up the telegraph office in the distant town by telephone. "This is —, cashier of the — bank," he said. "Please send this telegram for me." Then he gave the message authorizing the first bank to pay the horse draft, and this message the telegraph company sent without suspecting that it was fraudulent.

Some years ago an eastern man was induced to invest in worthless mining stock on the basis of a fraudulent telegram purporting to come from an expert he had sent out to investigate the mining property, but which was in reality sent in a manner similar to the above by a confederate. This eastern man's faith in telegrams cost him something more than \$10,000.

The story of a fraud with an amusing twist comes from across the water, with a London man of rather convivial habits as the victim. This man was forgetful and used to leave at home his office and safe keys. He also had a practice of leaving the city surreptitiously for a day now and then for a convivial time with friends, all unknown to his wife. One day this business man went on one of his periodical jaunts, and a rogue who knew his habits ventured to send this telegram to his wife: "Please send my keys. Love, Freddy." In due course of time the keys were delivered at the office door, and the rogue was there to receive them. He ransacked the whole office at his leisure, safe and all. Late that night the business man came home and was teased by his wife for his forgetfulness. This was news to him, but he kept his counsel. The next morning he discovered that his office had been robbed.—E. K. Mann in Pittsburgh Dispatch.

## THE SLAYER OF MARAT

Charlotte Corday and the Act That Made Her Famous.

### HER PLANS FOR THE MURDER

The Way They Were Worked Out and How They Were Put into Execution. Her Own Tragical End and the Final Act of the Brutal Headman.

Among the instances of fanatic zeal for country and people the act of Charlotte Corday, who was born at St. Saurin, France, July 27, 1768, and who was beheaded at Paris July 17, 1793, stands out in tragic force.

Her childhood and early youth were full of privation, although she was of a noble family. She was educated at a convent in Caen and then went to live with an aunt in the same old town of Normandy.

She had a serene and lofty beauty, was tall and graceful, and her manner was full of dignity.

She spent all her leisure in reading, and her books were always those that related to heroism and devotion to country. When the revolution broke upon France, Charlotte eagerly took up the reading of politics and public questions. When the Girondists were obliged to fly from Paris they went to Caen and began to hold meetings and form plans for future operations in Paris.

The Girondists were the true republicans and got their name from Gironde, as it was the deputies from this district that had formed the Republican party in the national assembly. The massacres had terrified them, and they had tried to stop the violent measures in the reign of terror.

Charlotte felt a very madness of enthusiasm as she listened to the fiery eloquence of these men who denounced Marat. Danton and Robespierre escaped much of the censure due for their share in the frightful work of cruelty and death. It was upon Marat that the Girondists poured their eloquence, for it was he who had pursued and ordered the death of their leaders in Paris. In the depths of her heart a purpose was formed to save her people from this monster and at any cost to herself.

Into Charlotte's life a tender and respectful love had come to add its influence in these days of strange tumult and calm purpose. She and a young man named Franquetin had been writing each other, and she had given him her portrait and told him that he might at least love that. When this lover marched away to Paris with the Girondists and the neighboring volunteers, she bade him a calm farewell, for she knew she was going to save him.

After her execution Franquetin went home to his native village in Normandy. In the tender care of his mother he gradually faded, for his heart was broken the day his love perished. When he came to die he requested that Charlotte's portrait and letters be buried with him, and his grave holds them sacredly.

Charlotte began to prepare for her journey to Paris and the tragedy she had planned. Every effort was made to hide the appearance of a concealed purpose. When she arrived at Paris she at once set about her plans to find Marat. As a preparation she went to one of the shops of the Palais Royal and bought a dagger shaped knife, paying for it 60 cents. This she hid in the folds of her dress. Her plan had been to kill Marat in the very convention, where she thought the deed would be avenged by killing her on the spot.

But Marat no longer went to the convention. He was ill with a disease that was slowly killing him, and his body was in a state of disorder and irritation that gave him an agony of suffering. He was only comfortable when in the warm water of his bath. He lived on the first floor of a house in the Rue des Cordeliers, and connected with his home were all the affairs of his journalistic work and from here all his pamphlets and journals were sent out.

After writing two letters asking for an interview, in which she would give him some important news about suspected persons, she got no reply. Then she took her way to the house, insisted that she must see him, and when forbidden entrance by Marat's wife she still urged the importance of her errand. Marat heard the sound of their voices and shouted out for a reason of the noise that bothered him. When told that it was the woman who had twice written him he bade her come in. The wife, against her will, let her pass.

Marat was in his bath, wrapped in an ink stained sheet, and was writing on a board laid across the bath. Asking her errand, he took down all the details she gave him. When he had the name of each Girondist who was at work in Caen he told her that in a week they would be brought to the guillotine. Then as she stood beside the bath she plunged the knife into his heart, and he died with a cry to his wife to come to him.

Just before her execution she wrote to the Girondists at Caen that she anticipated happiness "with Brutus in the Elysian fields" after her death, and she also wrote tender and loving farewell letters to her relatives and friends.

When she had suffered death the executioner lifted up her head by the hair and struck it a brutal blow with his fist. Just at that moment a gleam of the sun so fell upon it that there was the effect of a blush upon the dead face.—Boston Globe.
