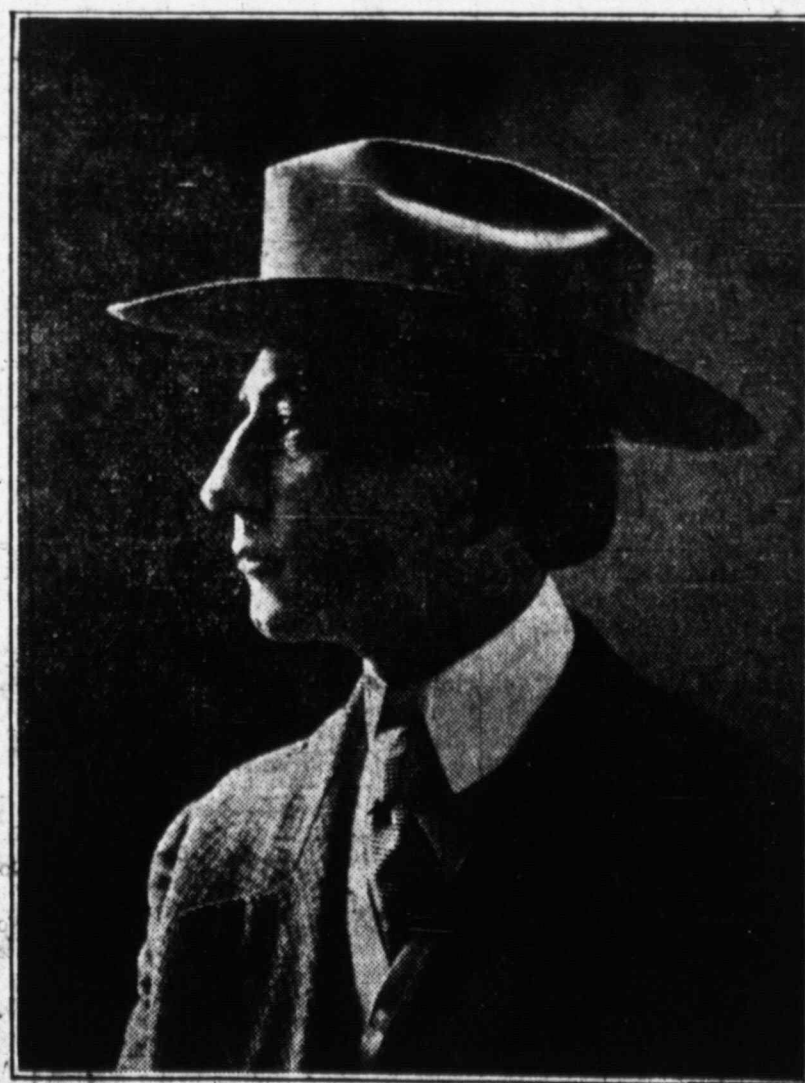

## JOHNSON AND POINDEXTER.

Come Johnson or nobody—that is the choice of the prohibition wing of the Texas democracy, according to the assertion of many of the leaders and followers.

The prohibition leaders assembled at Dallas Saturday to hear Mr. Johnson and Judge Poindexter, the two leaders in the competition for prohibition support in the race for the democratic nomination for the governorship. None of the other candidates for prohibition backing in this race were heard, because none other was deemed worthy to be heard at this time. The action of the prohibition leaders gave public notice that their choice would be between Mr. Johnson and Judge Poindexter.

Judge Poindexter told them that he would vote for submission of a prohibition constitutional amendment, but would not sign a bill giving this state statutory prohibition. He said that he had examined the law and had become convinced that statutory prohibition would be unconstitutional. Mr. Johnson said he also favored submission, but he went further; he broadly intimated that under circumstances he would sign a bill giving Texas statutory prohibition.

Neither gentleman touched on the middle issue. By middle issue I mean the enactment of a law forbidding the drinking of intoxicants on the premises where sold. This law would not be statutory prohibition, but would close every saloon in Texas, and would thus gain most of the ground sought to be gained by the prohibitionists. Under such a law the breweries and distilleries could continue in business in Texas, but the retail trade in their products would have to be in their own a grocery basis. Liquors would have to be sold in packages for consumption elsewhere than in the place of sale. This would cut out the worst evils of liquor traffic, and would eliminate saloon influence in politics to a very large degree.

Judging from what Judge Poindexter said about statutory prohibition, it seems likely he would vote a law forbidding the drinking of liquor on the premises where it was sold.

Mr. Johnson's statement leaves no doubt he would sign such a law.

Inasmuch as the prohibition leaders are known to be determined to obtain a law of this kind, in the event they again fail to procure the submission of a prohibitory amendment, it is apparent they must choose Mr. Johnson rather than Judge Poindexter, as their candidate. For they must have in the governor's office a man who will go with them as far as they can go in the legislature.

The prohibition leaders are reasonably confident that they can elect a two-thirds majority in both branches of the next legislature. But they have no certainty. Their opponents profess equal confidence of their ability

to elect more than one-third of the members of both branches. While the prohibition leaders do not intend to quit fighting for a constitutional amendment, they mean to take what they can get at each legislative session. Thus, at the last session they obtained a further strengthening of the local option law in several respects. They tried for more, but took what they could get. If submission falls in the Thirty-second legislature they will undoubtedly try for such a law as will close the saloons.—Frank Putnam in Houston Chronicle.

## 'WHO COMMENCED IT?'

The Fort Worth (Texas) Record, condemning Mr. Bryan for his action on the tariff question, says:

'Pray, who first called attention to democratic tariff differences? Who voluntarily came to Texas to raise an issue? Who served notice that the tariff position of the Texas democracy must be repudiated or appeal would be taken to the national democratic convention? Who challenged the soundness of view deliberately expressed by eighteen democratic senators? Who proffered a tariff platform which every democratic congressional candidate must approve or reject? Who was it that voluntarily appeared upon the scene as the champion of free raw material and challenged answer to his argument here and elsewhere among democratic constituents?'

Yes, who did 'commence it?'

What state brought an indictment against the only tariff law passed by the democrats since the war? Who repudiated in the senate and house the national platform of the party, and even the doctrine that platforms were binding? Who divided the democrats of congress on the lumber question, on the hide question and on the question of iron ore?

Who divided the Texas senators on the lumber question? Who divided them on the question of iron ore?

Mr. Bryan stands with a large majority of the democrats of the nation in his position on the tariff question. Is he responsible for discord when he defends the democratic position on the tariff? Who says that he must avoid Texas in his speech making tours, and if he is to visit Texas, who says that he must change his views to suit democrats who advocate protection for protection's sake? Mr. Bryan expects to speak elsewhere and he expects to defend the democratic position.

'If this be treason, make the most of it.'—Commodore.

### A SOUTH SEA ROMANCE.

The Mutiny Long Ago on the Bounty, a British Man-of-war.

Who has not heard of the mutiny of the Bounty? The romance of it still lingers from one end of the Pacific to the other. The descendants of the mutineers of the British man-of-war and their dusky wives are living and bear English names made famous, or infamous, more than a century ago.

The British man-of-war had gone to Tahiti. The commander, Blythe, was harsh and cruel to his men. The women of Tahiti loved the fair skinned sailors and sought to hide them from Blythe, their oppressor, but they were captured, and the ship sailed away, but only to return. When it returned, in command was Fletcher Christian, midshipman, and a score of mutineers. The brute Blythe and his loyal companions had been set adrift in an open boat. Marvelous to relate, after traversing thousands of miles of open ocean they reached the Australian coast. Here they found a haven of refuge at a British outpost. For twenty years all trace of Fletcher Christian and his companions was lost, although searching expedition after expedition was sent to Tahiti by the British government.

Each of the mutineers save the remorseful Fletcher Christian took unto himself a wife. As it meant death to their husbands to live in Tahiti, they helped the men they loved to man the boat that bore them away to seek some desert island. After sailing for many days in the extreme southern tropical sea the rock of Pitcairn arose before them.

Twenty years later a British merchantman sighted by chance the lone rock in the southern Pacific and sent a boat ashore. To the astonishment of the crew, dusky men and women ran down to the beach to welcome them in their own tongue and claimed to be "English." Only one old man among them, Adams, of pure British blood still survived. He was found, Bible in hand, teaching in the little Sunday school which he had built and where he had educated the children of the colony and taught them the tenets of the Christian faith.

When the news reached England a British man-of-war was sent for the last of the mutineers of the Bounty. Aboard was a king's pardon for Adams, so that, after all, he died a British subject, surrounded by his dusky children and grandchildren. The colony was then removed from the faraway southern isle to Tahiti, but homesickness overcame its members, and they returned to the verdant rock.—New Idea Magazine.

**ODD JOBS ON WARSHIPS.**

Many Ways For the Bluejackets to Make Extra Money.

The possible methods of making extra money on shipboard are manifold. "Tailoring" is one of the most profitable. While a ship's tailor is detailed to most of our ships, his duties are limited to making necessary alterations in the uniforms which are issued to the members of the crew. Many enlisted men own sewing machines, upon which they do repair work, and they also do odd jobs for officers, such as pressing and cleaning. A handy man with the needle can also make a handsome sum by doing fancy work. Some of the most delicate embroidery work has been done by sailors.

The ship's barber also makes a comfortable living in addition to his regular pay, and the distribution of prizes at target practice enriches the coffers of the gun crew by a considerable sum. Men who are detailed to duty on board submarine boats are allowed an additional \$5 a month and besides \$1 a day for every day the boat is submerged. Bluejackets detailed as signalmen, as cockswains of power boats or in charge of holds are allowed extra pay. A crew messman receives \$5 a month for performing that somewhat menial function, and the man who is not ashamed to "take in washing" can easily double his navy pay. Every bluejacket is expected to perform the laundering himself, but there are always men who prefer to pay for having the service done.

One of the novel methods of earning an honest penny is for a man with a descriptive knack—usually a yeoman—to prepare an interesting letter upon the cruise of the ship or some of the strange ports visited, the honors paid the vessel, the entertainments offered and describing the customs of the inhabitants. These letters are manifold and sold to the members of the crew for 50 cents to \$1 a copy—and usually cheap at that. The parents or relatives of the sailor boy thus are kept informed of his adventures and experiences and he is relieved of a task that is irksome to most boys.—John R. Cox in National Magazine.

**STAR GAZING.**

The Study of the Constellations as a Pastime.

Probably every reader has often admired the beauty of a starlight night. A little careful observation on such a night will show that the brighter stars may be divided into groups or "constellations," as the astronomers call them, most of which are known by the names of animals or legendary persons, such for example as "the Great Bear," "the Swan," "Hercules," "Andromeda," etc. The easiest method of learning these "constellations" is from some one already acquainted with them, but if the beginner is not fortunate enough to know any such person the majority can be learned from any cheap star maps such as are sometimes contained in almanacs.

Now, if the budding astronomer will notice the position of any of these groups or constellations at a particular hour of any night and then look a few hours afterward he will see that during the interval the stars which appeared low down in the east have risen to the south in a somewhat similar manner to the apparent motion of the sun and moon, while closer attention on several evenings will show a circular or rotary movement around the north pole of the heavens, the motion being the opposite way to the hands of a clock.

Near the north pole is a bright star called the "Pole star." This star is easily found when the observer has once noted the seven bright stars of the "Great Bear," the two outer stars of the four forming the "square" known as the "pointers" point almost directly to the Pole star. This majestic movement of the stars around the pole of the heavens is a most sublime and wonderful sight.—Country Side.
